### Richard Gregory 'Dick' Harshbarger

Richard Gregory 'Dick' Harshbarger, 96, rural Crawfordsville, passed away, at 9:42 p.m. on Saturday, Dec. 4, 2021 in his home surrounded by his loving family.

He was born in Montgomery County on July 2, 1925, to the late Grover L. and Dessie 'Marie' Cope.

Mr. Harshbarger was a 1943 graduate of Crawfordsville High School and enlisted in the US Army. Richard was a member of 'The Greatest Generation'...even though he had an appendectomy while in basic training, his platoon carried him onto the ship to make the 20-day trip to Germany, refusing to leave him behind. He was

stationed in England, France and Luxenberg. While serving he was awarded the EAME Theater Ribbon with three 'Bronze Stars,' which he never discussed. After three years of service, he returned home to farm and work in his shop. He was a very talented mechanic and was well known for his mechanical skills. On April 5, 1947 he married Julia 'Judy' Ehrie and she preceded him in death on August 21, 2020. For some time he raised hogs on his farm and worked as a substitute mail carrier. Mr. Harshbarger worked hard so he could always put his family first!

He was a member of Liberty Chapel Church where he built many friendships...he and Judy enjoyed lots of class parties and pitch-ins over the years. Mr. Harshbarger loved farming and working with his sons. In his later years he enjoyed mowing the yard and the surrounding road side ditches, which he did until two months ago. For the past few years, anyone traveling past his house could find him sitting in his favorite chair on the front porch where waves were often exchanged.

# Mike Pence, Roe v Wade and 2024

There have been two topics of Mike Pence for president stories in recent weeks. The first has been about Pence taking his nascent campaign to Iowa, New Hampshire and South Carolina, preparing for an upstart 2024 campaign. The second is the many articles saying he has little to no chance, particularly if former president Donald Trump runs.

And now comes the Mississippi abortion case that was heard Wednesday morning by the U.S. Supreme Court, described as the most direct challenge to Roe v. Wade since the Casey case three decades ago. According to the AP, the Supreme Court had never agreed to hear a case over an abortion ban so early in pregnancy until all three Trump appointees - Justices Neil Gorsuch, Brett Kavanaugh and Amy Coney Barrett - were on

While we won't know whether this Mississippi case overturns Roe, or changes the dynamic of the timeline for fetal viability for several months, this represents the culmination and goal

of Mike Pence's political career. And should the Supreme Court overturn Roe v. Wade, it would become his most profound achievement.

Pence spoke at the National Press Club on Monday at a Susan B. Anthony event, saying, "Today as the Supreme Court prepares to hear oral arguments in those hallowed halls, we are here to declare with one voice 'no more.' I'm very hopeful and I do believe that Roe v. Wade will be overturned whether it's now or in the future."

He urged the high court to throw the Roe v. Wade decision to the "ash heap of history," a phrase that has echoed throughout his congressional and vice presidential career

Pence has been in a political purgatory since he resisted President Trump's coup d'etat on Jan. 6, surviving the mobs chanting his name in the shadow of a gallows erected on Capitol Hill, then moving to certify the Electoral College victory of Democrat Joe Biden after the insurrection was quelled. He was the only Trump administration official to attend Biden's inauguration, and has been the subject of frequent barbs from Trump via emails to supporters and quotes in a hail of tell-all books describing the chaotic and seditious end to the Trump

presidency. Polls show Trump with a huge early advantage over Pence and the rest of a possible GOP field. A YouGov poll conducted in November showed Trump leading Florida Gov. Ron DeSantis 44 to 21%, with Pence at 4%.

As we all know, Donald Trump reached out to Pence about joining his ticket in April through July 2016, finally settling on the Indiana governor over New Jersey Gov.

Chris Christie for two key reasons: 1. Pence looked like a vice president according the constantly screen testing Trump. 2. He brought along the GOP's evangelical voting bloc that had been uncomfortable with Trump's history of womanizing while straddling the Roe v. Wade political divide.

It was Pence who articulated the importance of the Federalist Society's SCOTUS list of potential nominees, with their willingness to overturn Roe. It was Pence who was the driving force behind President Trump's nominations of Justices Gorsuch, Kavanaugh and, finally, Notre Dame's Amy Coney Barrett, that have set in motion the most ardent challenge to Roe which was heard on Wednesday.

"President Trump had me interview all of the finalists for the Supreme Court," Pence told Christian Broadcast Network News on Wednesday. "I was able to spend time with Justice Brett Kavanaugh and Justice Amy Coney Barrett and Justice Neil Gorsuch before they

were appointed. I will tell you that they are men and women of integrity and conviction and I'm just going to be joining a great chorus of Americans that will be praying that they have the courage to seize this moment for life."

Should the Supreme Court strike down Roe, or set in motion a stateby-state recalibration of fetal viability, it will not only change the political dynamic in dozens of state legislatures, but it could also revive Pence's political muscle with evangelical voters, creating a viable lane to the 2024 nomination, particularly if Trump's brand fades and he decides not to risk a second embarrassing loss.

As NBC's Meet The Press Daily asked on Wednesday, does the new six-to-three conservative court rule against a constitutional right for women to have abortions in this country? And two, if so, what does American politics look like in a post-Roe world? Especially in these hyper-polarized

"For nearly the last 50 years, Roe has provided

stability to an uncomfortable and controversial issue," the MTP analysis observed. "But if you get rid of Roe, every single state will need a position on fetus viability, weeks when you can/can't have an abortion, parental notification, sonograms and possible exceptions (like on rape, incest or threat to the mother's life). And every single primary and general election could be dominated by those specific positions – all in a nation where a majority of Americans believe that abortion should be legal in all or most cases, and where even more say they support Roe v. Wade."

While Trump has been focused on his "Big Lie" on the "stolen" 2020 election and a plethora of teeming "RÎNOs" that need to be eradicated from the Republican Party, he has been virtually silent on perhaps his most profound impact as president, which is setting up SCOTUS for this very moment.

## BBB Warning: beware of Medicare scams as special enrollment period ends today

To give people who may have found themselves without health insurance because of the COVID-19 pandemic a chance to sign up for healthcare coverage, the U.S. federal government opened Medicare.gov starting Oct. 15, 2021, and it will be open until tomorrow, Dec. 7,

As with any open enrollment period, scammers

see this as the perfect time to try and take advantage of you and steal your personal information. Scammers have a great way of making their tactics seem legitimate, a Medicare scam can even come in the form a brochure or a "cold call" to your home. Senior Medicare Patrol has some great tips on what constitutes a Medi-

such as receiving unsolicited phone calls or in-home visits. You can read more of the tips from Senior Medicare Patrol.

BBB also has some tips to help you avoid open enrollment scams:

Be wary of anyone who contacts you unsolicited. People representing Medicare or ACA plans don't contact you by phone, email, or in person unless

you are already enrolled. Be especially cautious of threatening calls that require quick action or immediate payment.

Decline promotional gifts in exchange for personal information. Keep a healthy level of skepticism any time a broker offers you free gifts, health screenings, or other special deals. Never sign up with a broker who offers

you an expensive "sign-up gift" in exchange for providing your Medicare ID number or other personally identifiable information.

Beware of dishonest brokers who offer "free health screenings." Some brokers offer this to weed out people who are less healthy. This is called "cherry picking" and is against the Medicare rules.

Guard your government-issued numbers. Never offer your Medicare ID number, Social Security number, health plan info, or banking information to anyone you don't know.

Hang up and go to official websites. You can enroll or re-enroll in Medicare at Medicare.gov or in a marketplace health plan at Healthcare.gov.

this example:

"Oh, you're a graphic artist," they say. "How cool!

"No, I'm a graphic designer."

"There's a difference?" "If you owned a horse farm," I'd say, "I could make you one awesome catalog to help you sell your livestock, but whatever you

do, don't ask me to draw

that horse."

I still dabble as a graphic designer, usually for friends. I seldom charge my friends. One of the reasons I got out of the business was because I seemed to have more friends than custom-

I make it a point to keep my design software up-todate, even though my skills really aren't.

From time to time, the software company treats us to new features when they make upgrades to their program. The company promotes these improvements in a series of bullet points that catch our attention. This time, new ones are

introduced for 2022.

Bullet point No. 1 touted a nice "capture" feature, which allows the user to poach layouts from other documents to speed things up. No. 2 described a new scalable user interface that should make working easier for us older designers, who often can't see their own computers, let alone the tiny

type on the screen. No. 3 was an upgrade they call "Inclusive Terminology." To show you how daft I am, I thought they had made improvements to the story composition editor, or even the font management tools. Nope. It seems that the company is, well . . . let me put it in their own words:

"We have replaced non-inclusive terminology to support core [company] values of diversity and inclusion."

At no time using their software to create designs did I feel insulted, nor do I believe I was insulting, disrespecting or disparaging to anyone else — unless you are British, and caught the one time I accidentally used an obscure curse word on a brochure I made for a floor covering company.

If they are making word changes to their User Manuals or their Licensing Agreement, go for it. No one reads those anyway. However, changes are coming to the program itself.

The foundation of their application is currently called the "Master" page. From it, the designer can build an entire publication quite easily. In 2022, the Master page will now be called the "Parent" page.

Before we go further, let me make one thing perfectly clear: I get it. It took me awhile to see it, but I really do get it.

My question is, though, how far are we willing to deconstruct the English language before we can find words that don't offend anyone? Are parents now outraged that they are held in the same regard as slave owners? I suppose their children might see a correlation, but it demonstrates how quickly a single word can be misconstrued without understanding the circumstances of its use.

What complicates it is that some words have multiple meanings.

I'm surprised that a company that specializes in communication has missed the value of context. There are very few words that won't insult someone when they are removed from the

conditions in which they are meant to be understood.

Will Red now be referred to as the "Democratic Socialist" color? Could the "Square" tool be dropped in favor of the "Socially Awkward" tool? And will "Utilities" end up as "They / Themtilities".

OK, I know I'm way over the top, here. The satire is intentional; mockery

My point is that if you want a more encompassing, relevant society, don't start by making it more difficult for people to communicate with each other. The time will come when many of us will be afraid to open our mouths, while others will find it impossible to keep

theirs closed. We may be there now. One of my favorite tools in this graphic design program is the "Shear" tool. With it you can push one corner of any rectangle, and automatically create a rhombus. Don't worry, designers. It's not gong away soon.

For 2022, however, its name is being updated to shear nonsense.

keg during the regular season, which included the County Tourney, but not the Sectional. No team outside Montgomery County . . . or Crawfordsville . . . could claim the prize, and the school that owned the keg at the end of the season could cherish it until the next basketball season rolled around. To determine who would first own the keg, the names of all of the nine county schools were placed into a hat . . and Alamo became the first recipient on Nov. 1, 1957. Little did they know it at the time, but that was the first and last time that the Warriors would possess the trophy. Three weeks later, Alamo lost to

Darlington, and the Alamo teams never possessed it again up to the time the little schools closed in 1971.

Each time a school won the keg, they decorated it with ribbons of their school colors and paraded it around before each game. A metal plate, with the school's name and the date they won it, was permanently attached. During the 14 years that the keg was around, it changed hands a total of 30 times. New Ross won the keg six times . . the most of any school, while Darlington, New Market and Linden each won it five times. Coal Creek won it four times, Waveland and Ladoga

twice, and Waynetown once. The longest stretch in which a school owned the keg was two years and 10 months by Darlington in the late 1960s when the Indians went undefeated for two years. The New Ross Blue Jays owned it for two years and two months in the early 1960s when Keith Greve was their coach

The shortest time that the keg was held was seven hours . . . by Darlington. I know all about that, as I was on that team. We beat an undefeated New Ross team in an afternoon game at the County Tourney on Jan. 16, 1965 . . . and promptly lost the keg to the Coal Creek Bearcats by a score of 47-45

in the championship game that evening! However, three weeks later we won it back from Coal Creek in a regular game. I knew we could keep it the rest of the year and into the 1966 season, as the only team we had to face was Waynetown, who had just an average team. But fate was not on our side. One of Waynetown's players gave me a deliberate uppercut to the jaw during the first quarter, causing me to be out of the lineup and down in the locker room for nearly the remainder of the contest. We lost the game and the keg. That same Waynetown player swooped up the keg from our cheerleaders and ran around

the gym, whooping and laughing. We were not happy campers!

Darlington owned the keg when the little schools closed in the spring of 1971, and they were allowed to keep the keg in their trophy case. A few years later, it was decided that the keg should be in the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame at New Castle, and that is where it can be found today. It would be impossible to say how much that little wooden keg meant to all of the players, cheerleaders, students, and fans who were involved in Montgomery County basketball during those 14 years that it was in existence. Nothing else has

evoked more emotion . . . be it tears of happiness or tears of sorrow . . . than the "county keg."

Oh yes . . . that player who elbowed me in the jaw in 1965 . . . he was a prisoner at the county jail after I had been elected Montgomery County Sheriff in 1994. He requested to be a trusty, an inmate worker with his own private cell. But as they say in a certain board game . . . "SOR-RY!'

South Montgomery School Corporation - \$9,000 -Funds are used to assist students with health related needs such as medical, dental, vision and mental health care and related health and welfare expenses.

History, Arts & Culture

Athens Arts Gallery- \$4,000 - Athens will partner with preschool agencies to offer art history and art exploration classes with a professional artist. The instructor will co-construct awareness with children through the visual arts, and will encourage the children to develop competencies, and confidence, to use the visual arts as a tool for learning

Carnegie Museum- \$5,899 - Growing programs create storage woes. This grant will allow for the purchase of

shelving and other storage options, along with exhibit supplies. Improved efficiencies will result in improved programming.

Historical Society - \$9,000 - The funds will be used to safeguard the historic Lane Place. A portion will be used for building repairs and a portion for tree care.

### **HUMAN SERVICES**

Children's Bureau of Indianapolis -\$3,360 - This will allow them to offer emergency assistance to more Montgomery County families with children. Children's Bureau works with other local agencies to support local families with children with essential needs.

Pam's Promise Transitional Housing \$18,727 - This will be used to replace the aging, failing furnace and air conditioner at the Spring Ledge house with a new, more energy efficient system.

Sylvia's Child Advocacy Center -\$29,027 - A part-time advocate will be hired to serve local victims of sexual abuse and trauma. Currently there is no local service. Victims must either leave the county for assistance or do without.

Wabash Ave. Presbyterian Church - \$2.500 - WAPC has for many years, graciously set aside space for local recovery support groups. These funds will purchase books and materials and add new, brighter, more energy efficient lighting to the recovery room.

Women's Resource Center - \$6,500 -Funds will be used for medical services and for items for their Great Expectation's educational program. WRC is an invaluable link to the local health care system.

### YOUTH

Achaius Ranch - \$25,000 - This COVID-19 Operating Grant will help shore up finances so that the Harmony Project, a trauma recovery program, can continue in 2022. It debuted this year and was a big success. The negative effects of the pandemic make it more important than ever.

Boys & Girls Club - \$39,000 - This COVID-19 Operating Grant helps ensure the financial stability of the club so that afterschool programming may continue. This provides children a safe place to go so that their parents may work.

Montgomery County 4-H - \$30,000 -This will allow 4-H to purchase a new range hood and exhaust. The plan is to create a demonstration kitchen for both in person and virtual education. The kitchen is used not only by 4-H but by many community groups too.


