Lucas Ranard is awarded Commissioners' Scholarship

Lucas Ranard, son of Jim Ranard and Kim Rater, was awarded the Commissioners' Scholarship Tuesday morning in the commissioners' meeting.

The scholarship is for four years tuition to Wabash College. The scholarship was set up on Dec. 15, 1892. The board of commissioners at that time: Jesse Carter, Roy F. Martin and Harry A. Coons donated

\$10,000 to Wabash College upon certain conditions, one of those being that Wabash College shall establish two perpetual scholarships which shall be at the disposal of the board of commissioners. This Commissioners Scholarship entitles commissioners to designate two male students who may attend


(literally). Exercising each day - watching what I ate and all that good stuff. I gained it back when I stopped.



Late IN University police officer to be honored at Tournament of Roses Parade

The family of a Hoosier man who saved lives by being a tissue donor is traveling to Pasadena, California, today to honor his life on a national stage and raise awareness about how important it is to be a donor.

Indiana University South Bend Police Officer Levell Pace was diagnosed with end-stage renal disease in 2002 and needed a kidney transplant. He was about to be placed on the national transplant waiting list when he died unexpectedly of a heart attack at age 34. He made a selfless decision to provide healing to others through tissue and cornea donation.

His widow, Melissa, and her sister, Susan Jackson, left for California early this morning from Indianapolis International Airport to join other donor families from throughout the country at the 2022 Tournament of Roses Parade.

Accompanied by Marti Cooper, a community outreach coordinator with Donate Life Indiana and Indiana Donor Network, the three will participate in a private Donate Life rose placement ceremony Wednesday, then interact with other donor families before helping decorate the Donate Life float Thursday. A florigraph was created to honor Pace's selfless decision to save lives and will be displayed on the Donate Life float during the parade on New Year's Day. Friday, the group will witness judging of all parade floats during the day and attend a New Year's Eve celebration in the evening.

Saturday, they will be in the grandstands for the parade, watching for Pace's florigraph.

Looking for the good in others came naturally to Pace, his family said. Al-

ways armed with a smile, he'd give anyone the last \$5 out of his wallet if they needed it. His spirit of giving carried over into everything Pace did, from serving his community as a police officer to signing up to be an organ and tissue donor.

Pace graduated from Jimtown High School in Elkhart, Indiana, where he played football and cultivated a lifelong love of the sport. After high school, he worked various jobs until he became a security guard at Indiana University South Bend and discovered his life's calling - to be a police officer. Around campus, Pace was known for always going above and beyond to answer the call.

His legacy lives on through those Pace helped as a tissue donor and through Melissa, who is a longtime volunteer advocate for Donate Life Indiana and Indiana Donor Network.

"My service is the best gift I can give Levell," Melissa said.

Today, more than 1,000 Hoosiers await a lifesaving organ transplant while more than 100,000 Americans are on the national transplant list. Despite age or medical history, anyone can sign up to be a donor online at Donate Life Indiana. Learn more about Indiana Donor Network online.

Indiana Donor Network's mission is to save and enhance the quality of life through organ, tissue and eye donation and transplantation. Its vision is to be a leader in organ and tissue recovery. Founded in 1987, the organization coordinates organ donation in 85 of the state's 92 counties and serves Indiana's transplant hospitals, including Indiana University Health's network

Protect your feet in 2022!

Starting a new fitness routine as part of your New Year's resolutions? Protecting your feet is critical.

"No pain, no gain" may be a motto for most workouts, but "too much, too soon" can lead to foot and ankle injuries, which can sabotage fitness goals," says Jeffrey Loveland, DPM, FACFAS, a foot and ankle surgeon and Fellow Member of the American College of Foot and Ankle Surgeons (ACFAS).

As you follow through on your New Year's resolutions, here's how to identify and treat common exercise-related foot problems, according to foot and ankle surgeons.

- **Playing through an ankle sprain** can cause further damage to tendons, which may take much longer to heal or possibly require surgery. What's more, you may be overlooking a more serious injury. "Seek treatment for potentially-sprained ankles right away," says Dr. Loveland. "Untreated or repeated ankle sprains may lead to chronic ankle instability, a condition that causes persistent pain and a 'giving way' of the ankle."

- **A stress fracture** may feel like an ankle sprain initially, but you'll also notice swelling without bruising, and pain during normal activities or when touching the area. If you experience these symptoms, have your foot and ankle evaluated.

- **Dr. Loveland** explains it's best to seek treatment for pain or swelling around your Achilles tendon post-workout. Untreated Achilles tendonitis may worsen over time, leading to stiffness and fatigue in your injured leg, or even a ruptured tendon, which would require surgery and several months' rehabilitation.

- **If heel pain** lasts more than one-two days or worsens when you stand after sitting for extended periods of time, you may have plantar fasciitis, a common overuse injury

resulting from inflammation of the tissue extending from your heel to toes. If caught early, your foot and ankle surgeon can recommend at-home conditioning. In later stages, the problem is harder to treat and takes longer to resolve.

An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure, according to foot and ankle surgeons, who offer these healthy tips:

- **Start gradually.** Increase the length and intensity of workouts gradually to avoid overuse injuries. Stretch before and afterward.

- **Dress right.** Dr. Loveland explains shoes that don't provide arch support or heel cushioning can cause plantar fasciitis, and shoes that are too small can cause a neuroma (a thickening of the nerve tissue), which may require injections, medication or physical therapy. Be sure to also stick to cotton or non-slip socks to avoid blisters.

- **Use good technique.** Good form prevents injuries to tendons and ligaments. "Incorrect posture or misuse of equipment can decrease stabilization in the foot and ankle, leading to joint sprains and muscle strains," Dr. Loveland says.

- **Avoid bacteria.** The gym is a breeding ground for fungus, viruses and bacteria, including increasingly common, drug-resistant strains like MRSA (methicillin-resistant Staphylococcus aureus). "Water shoes provide a barrier between your feet and locker room floors as well as pool decks. Cover cuts, cracks and ingrown toenails, since these areas can act as entry points for bacteria. If you have a red or swollen cut that isn't healing, have it examined," Dr. Loveland says.

- **Seek the expertise** of a foot and ankle surgeon at signs of injury or pain. To find one near you, use the "find a physician" search tool at FootHealthFacts.org.
