Ask Rusty - Will My Social Security Benefits Ever Be Non-Taxable?

Dear Rusty: If we take our Social Security at our full retirement age (66 years and 6 months for both of us) and we both continue to work, what are the income tax consequences? Is there an age at which we can still work and draw Social Security without tax consequences on our benefits? **Signed: Overtaxed Couple**

Dear Overtaxed Couple: Regardless of when you claim your Social Security benefits, whether those benefits are subject to federal income tax depends entirely upon your income as reported to the IRS. This is true even if you collect Social Security benefits after you reach your full retirement age - there is no age at which SS benefits become exempt from Federal Income Tax. Here's how it works:

Taxation of your Social Security benefits depends on two things - first, the amount of your combined income from all sources (known as your Mod-

ified Adjusted Gross Income or "MAGI") and second, your income tax filing status (whether you file your income taxes individually or jointly as a married couple). Your "MAGI" consists of your Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) on your income tax return, plus half of your Social Security benefits received for the tax year, plus any other non-taxable income you may have had.

If your MAGI for the tax year exceeds certain thresholds, then some of your Social Security benefits are taxable at whatever your normal IRS tax rate is. If, as a couple, you file your

income taxes as "married-filing jointly," and your MAGI is over \$32,000, then 50% of your Social Security benefits received during the tax year becomes part of your overall taxable income at whatever tax rate is standard for your income. But if your MAGI as a couple for the tax year exceeds \$44,000 then up to 85% of your SS benefits becomes part of your overall taxable income. If your MAGI as a married couple is less than \$32,000 then your Social Security benefits aren't taxable.

Is The High Level Of Cocoa In Dark Chocolate Good For You?

News about your health can be quite depressing - especially these days - but the news that eating dark chocolate, the kind that contains lots of cocoa, can be good for your health, can come as a deliciously delightful surprise, says Rebecca Weber, CEO of the Association of Mature American Citizens [AMAC]. In fact, each year around this time, in the weeks before Valentine's Day, news outlets seem to besiege us with the "chocolate is good for you" message. But, suggests Weber, it would be wise to consult with your doctor before going on a chocolate binge.

"It used to be a no-no, particularly for seniors, but research in recent years suggests that, if you don't overdo it, eating dark chocolate can be good for you. Numerous studies show that regularly treating yourself with about half an ounce of dark chocolate can lower blood pressure, reduce your levels of bad "LDL" cholesterol and increase your

levels of HDL, the good cholesterol. And some researchers believe that it can improve cognitive function," says Weber.

According to the National Institutes of Health [NIH], up until the medical community began conducting deep scientific research into the negative and positive effects of chocolate, health care providers warned their patients of the potential health hazards of consuming large amounts of chocolate. Patients were told that, while it is indeed a tasty treat, it could also have ill effects on your health such as acne, obesity high blood pressure, heart disease and diabetes.

"However," says the NIH, "the recent discovery of biologically active phenolic compounds in cocoa has changed this perception and stimulated research on its effects in ageing, oxidative stress, blood pressure regulation, and atherosclerosis. Today, chocolate

Winter Storm Leaves Ice & Snow In Its Wake

Winter storm Landon, a 2000-mile-wide snowstorm predicted to dump more than a foot and a half of snow and ice across wide swaths of the United States, blew through Montgomery County last night. While the storm failed to live up to the calamitous predictions made earlier this week, it has still brought the county to a frozen halt.

The National Weather Service (NWS) office in Crawfordsville officially recorded 12 inches of snowfall from the storm. Temperatures topped out yesterday at 18 degrees before falling to a low of 11. This snowfall is now the new record snowfall by Feb. 4 in Crawfordsville.

County Administrator Tom Klein confirmed that, "County offices are closed." He went

Indiana Needs To Pass A Comprehensive Smokefree Air Law

The American Lung Association's 20th annual "State of Tobacco Control" report finds that Indiana had mostly failing grades on passing policies to reduce and prevent tobacco use, including e-cigarettes.

The "State of Tobacco Control" report evaluates state and federal policy-makers on actions taken to eliminate tobacco use, the nation's leading cause of preventable death. The report also recommends proven-effective tobacco control laws and policies to save lives.

Here in Indiana in the last 20 years, lawmakers have made significant strides to reduce tobacco use, like the decline in smoking rate from 2003 to 2020, however, there is more work to be done. The adult smoking rate is still 19.4%, and the high school tobacco use rate is 22.9%.

"While we have seen considerable progress in Indiana, tobacco use remains our leading cause of preventable death and disease, taking an estimated 11,070 Hoosier lives each year," said Tiffany Nichols,

advocacy director at the Lung Association. "And our progress on tobacco control policy has not been equal. We continue to see the unequal burden of tobacco use and exposure to secondhand smoke in communities experiencing health disparities."

Indiana's Grades "State of Tobacco Control" 2022 grades states and the District of Columbia in five areas that have been proven to prevent and reduce tobacco use and save lives. Indiana received the following grades:

1. Funding for State Tobacco Prevention Programs - Grade F
2. Strength of Smokefree Air Laws - Grade C
3. Level of State Tobacco Taxes - Grade F
4. Coverage and Access to Services to Quit Tobacco - Grade D
5. Ending the Sale of All Flavored Tobacco Products - Grade F

This year's report noted the need for Indiana policymakers to focus on increasing Indiana's tobacco tax, closing gaps in Indiana's smokefree air



law and ending the sale of all flavored tobacco products, including menthol cigarettes.

"To protect kids from a lifetime of nicotine addiction, the Lung Association in Indiana encourages the state to increase cigarette taxes by \$2.00 per pack and equalize the tax on other tobacco products, including e-cigarettes and cigars with its cigarette tax," said Nichols. "We must

also pass a comprehensive smokefree law that eliminates smoking in all public places and workplaces, including restaurants, bars and casinos, which would protect workers across the state from deadly secondhand smoke. E-cigarettes should also be included in comprehensive smokefree laws."

Federal Grades Overview
Nationally, the report

reveals significant progress in the work to end tobacco use, but products like e-cigarettes and other flavored tobacco products, including menthol cigarettes, create concern for losing another generation to nicotine addiction.

"State of Tobacco Control" 2022 also grades the federal government in five areas:

- Federal Government Regulation of Tobacco Products (2022 grade - D)
- Federal Coverage of Quit Smoking Treatments (2022 grade - D)
- Level of Federal Tobacco Taxes (2022 grade - F)
- Federal Mass Media Campaigns to Prevent and

Reduce Tobacco Use (2022 grade - A)

• Federal Minimum Age of Sale for Tobacco Products to 21 (2022 grade - I*)

*The Incomplete grade is for the FDA being more than 18 months overdue in publishing the final Tobacco 21 regulations as required by statute.

"In 2022, Indiana needs to redouble its efforts to pass the proven policies called for in 'State of Tobacco Control' to help end tobacco use. We cannot afford to wait 20 more years and allow another generation to suffer from tobacco-caused addiction, disease and death," said Nichols.

For those who file their federal income taxes as a single the thresholds are lower. If your MAGI as a single filer is \$25,000 or less, your Social Security benefits aren't taxable. However, if your MAGI as a single filer is more than \$25,000, then half of your Social Security benefits received during the tax year becomes part of your overall taxable income, and if your MAGI as a single filer is more than \$34,000 then up to 85% of your benefits for the tax year becomes part of your taxable income. But a word of caution for those who are married but choose to file taxes "married - filing separately" - if you file separately and live together at any time during the tax year,

the threshold for taxation of Social Security benefits is zero.

So, Federal taxation of your Social Security benefits depends entirely upon your combined income from all sources and your income tax filing status - your age doesn't come into the picture at all, even if you are collecting Social Security benefits after your full retirement age. Be aware, however, that a dozen U.S. states levy an income tax on Social Security benefits, so you should check the tax laws in your state of residence to see if some or all your Social Security benefits will be taxed by the state you live in.

on to say that, "We will be reviewing the road conditions throughout the day to determine if there should be a change to yellow (travel advisory condition). Roads have ice pack under the snow and crews are applying the salt-sand material to them."

Montgomery County Sheriff Ryan Needham confirmed the Sheriff's office responded to 101 calls for service, including slide-offs, crashes, and other smaller incidents. He said, "We've had a lot

of vehicle crashes, slide-offs, and property damage crashes. The roads have been bad because of the wind and so it's been an uphill battle, but we've been staying on top of it." He also confirmed there were no fatal accidents or major crimes reported during the storm.

Mayor Barton's office was unavailable for comment. Crawfordsville Fire Chief Scott Busenbark also could not be reached for comment on CFD calls and actions prior to publication.

ty-five percent of Americans rent. They pay just a little less than homeowners each year for their rent, maintenance costs, and renters insurance which averages \$9,477.

Renting seems like a good plan because you shouldn't have to worry about maintenance. Remember, everybody is short staffed these days and you may wait a while before someone shows up to fix your leaky toilet. Renters routinely complain about having to beg the property owner to do maintenance. Rent is not a secure way to live. Rent costs usually increase. The owners want

to make more money.

Senior citizens rent apartments not far from where I live. They started out paying \$550 for an apartment that included all the utilities. Most of them were thrilled. A lady who lives there now says they have increased the rent to \$850 and she expects another increase this year. She moved out of her house that was paid for to live the so called "carefree" senior apartment life. It's not turning out to be carefree.

Apartment owners set the rules. They might not allow pets or even children. You won't be able to play your radio loud and there will be

limitations on what you can do to the rental property. Plus, an apartment owner can decide they want to use your apartment for something or someone else and ask you to leave. This might be improbable, but it's possible and who needs this kind of life insecurity?

Buying a house is expensive and this may not be for you today. New three-bedroom houses are selling for over \$400,000 in a nearby Indiana neighborhood. Down the street a neighbor put his house up for sale asking \$250,000 and there was a bidding war from others who wanted the property. The sellers

reported they made much more than their asking price.

You don't have to pay a king's ransom for a house. Years ago, I bought a four-bedroom house for \$80,000 with no money down on a land contract. The interest rate was 10 percent but it was mine and when I sold it, I made \$10,000 on the deal.

A modest house on a small piece of dirt can become your castle. You can work on it along the way. Overhaul the bathrooms, the kitchen and do some painting. You can redo the floors but all in your time and on your schedule. You

just need a place where you can stay warm, dry, and rest. Owning your own house is not cheap. Paying for it, maintenance and property taxes all have to be considered, but at least it's yours. If you want, you can have a pet, kids, or loud music. You can sleep in peace.

If you are renting, you are not alone. Most of us have rented at one time or another. I lived in an apartment for over four years. You do what works for you at this time in your life.

is lauded for its tremendous antioxidant potential. However, in many studies, contradictory results and concerns about methodological issues have made it hard for health professionals and the public to understand the available evidence on chocolate's effects on health."

Epicatechin [EPI] is a flavanol found in a number of foods we eat including

cocoa. But it is said that the amount of epicatechin in cocoa is particularly high. In a paper produced by researchers Maria Angeles Martin and Sonia Ramos of the Department of Metabolism and Nutrition at Spain's Institute of Food Science and Technology, they found that: "Cocoa is a source of flavanols [epicatechin], and these phenolic compounds exert

beneficial effects on health and aging and reduce the risk of suffering chronic diseases (cardiovascular diseases, metabolic disorders, cancer). An increasing body of evidence has emerged to suggest that cocoa flavanols potentially are important chemopreventive natural agents."

Many researchers around the world have come to the same conclusion, sug-

gesting that if you have a craving for chocolate you should avoid processed chocolate treats that contain additives and have low cocoa content. What you're looking for, they say, is chocolate with a high content of cocoa, namely dark chocolate that contains 70% to 85% of cocoa.

As the Mayo Clinic puts it: "Healthy chocolate sounds like a dream come

true, but chocolate hasn't gained the status of a health food quite yet. Still, chocolate's reputation is on the rise, as a growing number of studies suggest that it can be a heart-healthy choice ... cocoa itself, unlike chocolate, is low in sugar and fat while offering potential health benefits. If you enjoy chocolate flavor, add plain cocoa to your low-fat milk or morning oats."


