

Baird Introduces Legislation To Prioritize Veterans' Healthcare

Congressman Jim Baird (IN-04) introduced the VA Same-Day Scheduling Act to ensure Veterans get the timely attention and treatment that they deserve when contacting the VA.

"Veterans and service members make tremendous personal sacrifices to defend our great nation, and our appreciation for their service shouldn't end when they complete active duty," said Congressman Jim Baird. "As a fellow Veteran, I know firsthand how difficult it can be to receive timely medical care and secure medical appointments. Reports that the VA is not prioritizing our Veterans' time as they should is not only unacceptable, but in serious cases, can have a profound impact on our Veterans' health. Our Veterans have sacrificed so much in service to our great nation: it's time that the service they receive at the VA better reflect this country's

gratitude."

"I'm proud to join Representative Jim Baird in introducing this vital piece of legislation to improve veterans' experiences and care with the Department of Veterans Affairs," said Congressman Salud Carbajal. "The bipartisan VA Same-Day Scheduling Act would require that veterans who make a phone call requesting care are able to schedule their appointment during that phone call. I've fought to improve VA telephone services for as long as I've been in Congress, and I will continue to champion this cause because our brave veterans deserve access to quality and timely care. "No matter the conflict, our veterans never wasted a second jumping into the fight," Congressman Brian Mast said. Scheduling Act improves veterans' experiences with the VA by prioritizing customer service. This commonsense legislation guarantees that any Veteran who makes a phone call requesting care is able to schedule their appointment during that phone call.

The VA Same-Day Scheduling Act is narrow in scope to guarantee priority for an established patient of the VA. This bill is also specific to care administered by the VA to avoid issues carrying out this task related to the community care system. The VA Same-Day Scheduling Act removes any ambiguity in scheduling VA-provided care over the telephone and provides the Department considerable flexibility by making the bill applicable 120 days after enactment, allowing ample time for appropriate adoption of this law.



U.S. Soybean Farmers Weigh In On Vilsack's **Rural Climate Initiative**

Washington, D.C. Feb. 7, 2022. Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack today announced a new \$1 billion investment in partnerships that support climate-smart farming, ranching and forestry practices and that expand market opportunities for those climate-smart commodities to increase their competitive edge.

The American Soybean Association was engaged in that program announcement on Monday.

"ASA appreciates USDA's announcement of the new Partnerships for Climate-Smart Commodities initiative, which we hope will help soy farmers throughout the country and the agricultural value chain to address climate change," said Brad Doyle, ASA President and Arkansas soy grower. "America's soybean farmers wel-

come opportunities to grow sustainable markets for their crops, including as food, feed, biofuels, and other biobased goods, and through export programs like the Soy Sustainability Assurance Protocol. Unlocking a new climate-smart commodity marketplace is a positive next step for our industry, and we are pleased to see what innovations this pilot program delivers."

ASA commented on the early stages of the partnership program in November. As soy growers learn more about these new revenue stream opportunities, ASA reiterates that the industry has established long-term goals for sustainability, and soybean farmers work day to day through good farming practices to do their part and remain committed to the environment

and a so sincere (NOT!) thank you to former President Obama and his wonderful healthcare plan, the surgery had to be authorized by the insurance company. In fairness, I get it. This ain't gonna be a cheap process. But it also wasn't like I was going in for a nose job. You might think bypass surgery gets some priority.

In all fairness, I should also point out that my wife and I asked for a short delay because we were in the middle of moving – but that didn't have anything to do with the insurance snafus we went through for two weeks.

After that got worked out, I got COVID. No, I am not making this up. Heck, I still don't have all my sense of smell back. So finally, everything was set to go for Monday, Jan. 31. However, a nurse called me the night before and said that the surgeon had an emergency heart transplant come up, so my surgery was postponed.

Eisenhower, and Lyndon Johnson. She also helped organize the March on Washington, and with Anna Arnold Hedgemen, persuaded the men to allow at least one female speaker.

Jane Bolin- Bolin notched at least three "firsts" in her achievements, including the first Black (and American Indian) woman to earn a law degree from Yale (1931), the first NYC assistant corporate council (1934), and the first Black female judge in the US (1939). But she didn't "fuss" about the firsts; she focused on the work. Bolin worked with Eleanor Roosevelt to reduce juvenile crime. She ensured that private child care agencies receiving public funding could not

discriminate based on race or ethnicity and ended the assignment of probation officers based on race or religion.

Ella Baker- "There would not be a SNCC without Ella Baker,' reads the leading line from SNCC, the Student Non-violent Coordinating Committee. Baker organized the first conference at Shaw University in Raleigh, NC. She appealed to Dr. King for the seed money to hold the conference. Though Dr. King hoped it would become a wing of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, she encouraged the students to envision their own organization. She believed in organizing people to lead themselves. SNCC adopted non-violent direct action, and believed, like Baker, that voting is a key to freedom. She remained active in the Civil Rights Movement until she died in 1986.

Pauli Murray- Orphaned after her mother's cerebral hemorrhage and her father- a graduate of Howard University, teacher, principal in the Baltimore school system, was beaten to death by White guard in the state hospital, Anne Pauline Murray moved to North Carolina to live with her grandparents. She graduated high school at fifteen. After refusing to attend segregated colleges, she moved to New York City to attend Hunter College. While there, she befriended Langston Hughes and met W.E.B. Dubois. She wrote poetry and changed

her name to Pauli. Trying to support herself through the Depression, she applied to a graduate program at UNC-Chapel Hill, but they denied her entry due to race. While fundraising for the Workers Defense League she wrote FDR about caring more about fascism than racism. Her letter caused Eleanor Roosevelt to write back, befriending her. She ended up attending

Howard University, organized sit-ins in Washington DC, and having been denied admittance to Harvard, went to UC-Berkley School of Law. She wrote often about "Jane Crow" discrimination, catching the eye of the Methodist Church, which was seeking to help its parishes disregard local segregation laws. Murray went on to practice law, found and then leave the National Organization of Women. After years of teaching, she finally became the first African American woman to be ordained an Episcopal priest.

Of the thousands of DC and Marvel characters in the vault, a few like Groot, emerge to become beloved heroes. Millions of amazing women are not covered in these lines or textbooks. What marvels await if you crack the vault, expand your universe, and learn and share the stories of heroes that speak to you. For starters, follow a Black History Everyday post, read books by authors different from your usual, and seek the friendship of people different from you.

Honorable mentions: Octavia Butler who has been awarded Hugo and Nebula awards for science fiction. Her book Parable of the Sower is a prophetic voice to the present moment. Mae Jemison, Sister Rosetta Tharp, Mary McLeod Bethune, Claudette Colvin, Audre Lorde, Shirley Chisolm, Marsha P Johnson, and if you are a proper Hoosier, Madame C J Walker.
