We Americans tend to think our democracy is exceptional, it's a bulwark, it's resilient, and perhaps indestructible. But a de-

mocracy is an enormous institution based on human interdependence. Like any healthy relationship, its internal strength increases when it works hard at maintaining its core values. It's more likely to thrive when it shares company with like-minded friends. For

this reason, we might benefit by checking in on our democracy. How well

is it holding up to the stress test it's undergoing in a period of polarization, trauma after the pandemic, and the erosion of democracy world-wide.

Skeptical about claims of democracy's vulnerability? In 2019, the Wall Street Journal published "The Global Crisis of Democracy." While the world had eighty-six democracies in the year 2006, an explosion of sorts from the ten that existed in 1900, one in six democracies failed in the last decade, reported WSJ's Larry Diamond.

Democracy doesn't tend to keel over. Death by coup is uncommon. It dies more like a tree, bit by bit, rotting from the inside, dehydrated, starved, assaulted by bugs, which is why Freedom House, an advocacy group for democracy, political rights and civil liberties, mea-



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
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

AG Todd Rokita Works with Bipartisan, Binational Colleagues on Border Problem; Confirms Causes and Effects on Indiana

Attorney General Todd Rokita worked with bipartisan, binational colleagues on the border failure last week at a collaborative summit near the southern border. Joined by 5 bipartisan attorneys general from US states and 14 Mexican attorneys general, the event hosted important discussions about human trafficking, drug policy, the cartels who are taking advantage of our open southern border and opportunities for binational

legal cooperation. "We are directly interacting with my Mexican counterparts and Mexican non-governmental organizations who acknowledged, among other things, that President Trump's 'Remain in Mexico' policy was effective in reducing the sex trafficking of children," said Attorney General Rokita. "This summit gave me the ability to hear that the drug cartels are driving a significant amount of this crime to inland U.S. states, like Indiana, a lot of the Fentanyl they are sending is originating in China, and the Left's open-border insanity makes it possible on a grand scale. There was no disagreement from anyone that enforcing our border would dramatically improve the situation for both Mexican citizens and US citizens, like those

living in Indiana."

It is estimated that half of illegal aliens entering the US at the southern border are from countries other than Mexico and Central America, utilizing Mexico as a land bridge to the US.

"For example, children from other countries are also victims of Biden's refusal to enforce the rule of law at the border," Attorney General Rokita

Summit participants expressed concern for what they see as an increase in children's organ harvesting and reported that 80% of women are sexually assaulted while journeying to and across the southern border. Approximately 60% of children have been violated by the time they are trafficked across the border.

Attorney General Rokita said participants discussed how parents of illegal alien children are sold the American dream for their kids by the cartels, told that if they trust their kids to the cartels, the kids will have a new, rich life in the US. Instead, kids are then told that their parents didn't make full payment for their trip and they must now be sexually exploited in order to compensate the cartel for their journey. It's reprehensible and those in charge of our

country are allowing it to happen because of their open border insanity.

"Many of those kids and the drugs end up in Indiana, and it's just as despicable for statewide politicians, woke corporations, and Indiana's fake news to ignore these atrocities," said Attorney General Rokita. "We are all border states when it comes to the effect of open borders."

Illegal aliens who cross the southern border reach Indiana within 48 hours. The current construction of I-69 in Texas means they will arrive even more quickly to Indiana, the Crossroads of America.

As fentanyl overdoses, drug trafficking, and human trafficking increase across Hoosier communities, the problem must be addressed at its root.

Attorney General Rokita continues to fight the Biden administration's weak policies regarding illegal aliens and has joined two multistate lawsuits to date that would force the Biden Administration to enforce previously enacted laws pertaining to the southern border. Last week, he announced an 18-state amicus brief, filed with the United States Supreme Court, in support of President Trump's successful "Remain in Mexico" policy.



AG Rokita Invites Hoosiers to Start Their Search Engines at Indianaunclaimed.Gov

Attorney General Todd Rokita invites Hoosiers to race over to IndianaUnclaimed.gov to search and claim their funds and/or property. You might recover enough to buy a lot of milk in Victory Lane.

"With Indiana as the only state in which the attorney general oversees unclaimed property, I'm waving the green flag to all Hoosiers to search today and recover what is rightfully theirs, Attorney General Rokita said. "This race day is the perfect time to search unclaimed property and see if you're a winner."

Recovering your unclaimed property is safe, secure, and simple. Search for your name at the IndianaUnclaimed. gov database — which, by the way, includes some Hoosiers who share a name with some pretty famous racers such as Mario, Foyt, Andretti. and who still have funds waiting to be claimed.

In 2021, Attorney General Rokita's office returned over \$48 million in unclaimed property to its rightful owners.

To keep track of all your assets, Attorney General Rokita recommends Hoosiers get in the driver's seat and:

- Keep a record of all bank accounts.
- Indicate your interest in and awareness of all accounts by contacting the holder at least once every three years.
- Record all stock certificates and be sure to cash all dividends received.
- Record all utility deposits, including telephone, cable, and electricity deposits.
- Cash all checks promptly no matter how
- Update your address with all businesses

when you move. • Talk to loved ones about any safe deposit

boxes you own. Once unclaimed property is in its custody, the Unclaimed Property Division at Attorney General Rokita's office conducts outreach efforts to locate the rightful owners or heirs.

Individuals and/or businesses have 25 years to claim money once it is reported to the Unclaimed Property Division.

Just this year, \$19,505,033 million has been returned to Hoosiers. \$746,413,505.22 million is waiting to be claimed — and you could be next to cross the finish

sures democracy by the number of civil liberties and freedoms a nation retains or surrenders.

As people, we know that all institutions require shared values, a vision, and mutual work. We read books on how to strengthen marriage or parent better, and we have an opportunity now to discuss and address the work we, citizens in a small town, can do to protect and strengthen our democracy. The Montgomery County Democrats is sponsoring a discussion on the book How Democracies Die by Steven Levitsky and Daniel Ziblatt on May 24. Whether you join the discussion, the book is worth reading.

Levitsky and Ziblatt open it with a call for party gatekeepers to prevent candidates who use autocratic and authoritarian language and policies from gaining credibility. Most of us aren't party gatekeepers. We are voters trying to live our lives and retain our liberties. The book's first argument takes little time to finish before the authors move on to what is relevant for those of us on front porches and at kitchen tables.

What is in our locus of control? The two unwritten principles that Levitsky and Ziblatt say have preserved us - mutual tolerance and institutional forbearance. We can realize that citizens hold competing values at times

and that democracy is not a system of winner take all. Mutual tolerance means accepting we will make incremental change.

"Democracy is grinding work," write the authors, that requires "negotiation, compromise, and concession. Setbacks are inevitable, victories always partial." They acknowledge that these constraints are frustrating but those who are committed to democracy accept this way of governing. Mutual tolerance means putting away the language of war and making enemies of each other. If not, we may find ourselves, as Levitsky and Ziblatt write, in the place the US was after the Civil War with 600,000 dead and asking, "What could we have done to prevent

In the decade after the Civil War, the US reeled with the loss and yet remained deeply divided. The book lays out how the division over slavery so polarized Americans that even Congress had given up on mutual tolerance and institutional forbearance. There were over 125 incidents of violence in Congress in the three decades leading up to the war. That violence reads like a symbol as powerful as John Gottman's Four Horseman of the Apocalypse. Other symptoms of its internal sickness include increased use of executive powers, packing the courts, changing the

rules of the game such as who can vote, silencing media, and weakening or buying out opponents, say the authors.

All of this is to enact a single-party system. Two parties barely represent the variety of values and goals in the US. This lack of mutual tolerance, by which we mean that "as long as our rivals play by constitutional rules, we accept they have a right to exist, compete for power, and govern." It works with forbearance when we "exercise control, restraint, and tolerance" though we might have a legal right to do everything we can to destroy or undermine another. It's the willingness to not resort to governing by executive orders, packing the court, or constantly resorting to a filibuster. It could mean much more, like not packing bills with unrelated legislation to play dirty on how a representative voted or achieved a win. All of these are tactics that either of America's two parties have used more frequently in the past four

decades. The Civil War broke American democracy, the authors note. In the era after Reconstruction, southern states resorted to single-party systems because, as South Carolina Senator John C. Calhoun wrote: "We (White Americans) would exchange conditions with them (Black Americans)" and our nation

anarchy, poverty, misery and wretchedness." The virulent discrimination is evidence of the deep polarization that prevented mutual tolerance and forbearance. Tragically tolerance only re-emerged after Rutherford B. Hayes ended the Reconstruction Act. The costs for Black Americans were radical: disenfranchisement from voting, subjugation to Jim Crow Laws, and segre-

gation. It is difficult to

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by other authors, fan fiction stories are often posted online rather than traditionally published. However, sometimes a writer will be so inspired by the story they are telling that they take it in a new direction and about his adventures. publish something that is its own stand-alone novel. For this display, we featured some of these

A few of the books on the display are famous (or infamous) for being fanfiction. For example, a lot of people are aware that Fifty Shades of Grey by E.L. James (FIC Jam) started out as a Twilight (YA FIC Mey) fanfiction. Other books are much less well known or would not traditionally be thought of as "fanfiction". For example, The Aeneid by Virgil (873 Vir). Despite being over 2,000 years old, Virgil's Aeneid fits the description of modern fanfiction surprisingly well, in fact, one could probably argue that it is the first recorded example of fanfiction. In The Iliad by Homer (883 Hom) Aeneas is a background character. He is mentioned only once or twice. Virgil takes this side character and writes a whole book

Another famous book you may not associate with fan fiction is The Adventures of Sherlock Holmes (FIC Doy), but fanfiction actually saved the famous detective. Sir Arthur Conan Doyle famously killed Sherlock in 1893 by throwing him off the Reichenbach Falls. This death was meant to be permanent because Doyle hated writing the Holmes stories. Fans were devastated. They wore black mourning armbands and began to write their own Sherlock stories, lots and lots of stories. So many stories that Doyle was inspired (or maybe forced) to bring the sleuth back to life. This is considered by many to be the birth of modern fanfiction.

And the tradition of fans writing Sherlock fanfiction has not diminished in the past 100 years. Our display features many books (not written by Doyle) that tell tales of Sherlock Holmes, and there are dozens more in our collection.

While I love that I got to include ancient Greek, Roman, and Victorian books on this display, I understand that that is not everyone's cup of tea. There are plenty of other great (and more on this display. I highly recommend Carry On by Rainbow Rowell (YA FIC Row). It is a fanfiction of a fictional book series called "The Simon Snow Series". The Simon Snow Series is definitely supposed to be the Harry Potter books (j FIC Row). Fans of the wizarding world will notice many similarities between the adventures, villains, and characters in Carry On and Harry Potter. If you are in the

mood for a romance, check out The Love

Hypothesis by Ali Hazelwood (FIC Haz). The two main characters in this enemies to lovers romance are clearly modeled after Rey and Kylo Ren from the latest Star Wars movies (DVD) FIC Sta). After by Anna Todd (FIC Tod) is also featured. It started as fanfiction about the band One Direction. Plus, there are many more!

I hope that everyone can find something to read on this display, and who knows, maybe it will inspire someone out there to write their own








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
