Ask Rusty – Must I Pay Income Tax on Social Security Benefits?

Dear Rusty: I do not recall the rules on my income tax obligation for Social Security benefits. Can you please explain these rules to me? Signed: Senior Taxpayer

Dear Senior Taxpayer: I'll be happy to review the rules about income tax on Social Security benefits for you. If your combined income from all sources is low enough, your Social Security benefits aren't subject to being taxed by the IRS. But some of your Social Security benefits will become taxable if your combined income from all sources exceeds certain thresholds, and the thresholds are dependent on your tax filing status (single or married).

Fuel Costs And Electric Bills

Hoosiers are paying more at the grocery and gas pump and may be noticing higher electric bills as well. We want to share background on what's driving Duke Energy electricity costs and what we're doing to help.

Since mid-2021, costs for coal and gas to produce the energy that powers Indiana homes, businesses and assembly lines have increased significantly. Fuel accounts for a significant portion of our electric costs, averaging as much as 30% of a total bill. That's why when there are volatile energy markets, it can have a big impact.

In fact, Duke Energy Indiana is seeing the highest sustained prices for fuel that we have witnessed in a decade. Global demand and tight fuel supplies as well as labor shortages at coal mines and railroads are affecting the cost of the power we produce as well as what we purchase in the energy markets. We also

have been working to overcome supply chain challenges to ensure we have sufficient supplies of fuel available for summer and winter—the times of highest electric demand.

These are not permanent rate increases. Fuel costs rise and fall, and we pass those costs to our customers with no markup, so customers pay what we pay. Our priority is to purchase fuel at the best possible price, through steps such as long-term contracts and using a diversity of suppliers. To lessen the impact on customer bills, we are spreading recovery of some of these fuel costs over a longer period to reduce the rate impact.

Unfortunately, as we approach the summer, the bill impact will continue to increase, and we expect that to continue throughout the year. If you are struggling financially to pay your electric bill, contact us at 800.521.2232. We can discuss payment plans

We also recommend tools such as High Bill Alerts and Budget Billing that can help customers to manage their bills. Senators Braun, Manchin Introduce Bipartisan Bill To Address Gaps In Opioid Approval Process

On Thursday, U.S. Senators Mike Braun and Joe Manchin (D-WV) introduced the Ensuring the FDA Fully Examines Clinical Trial Impact and Vitalness before Endorsement (EFFECTIVE) Act which would allow the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) to deny a new drug application for an opioid analgesic drug on the basis of the drug not being clinically superior to other commercially available drugs. FDA Commissioner Robert Califf requested this additional authority to aid the FDA as it considers whether to approve new and more powerful

"The opioid epidemic has permeated every corner of Indiana and left communities devastated from the loss of life and opportunity. Drug overdoses are now one of the most common causes of death in Indiana. I'm proud to join with Senator Manchin on this bipartisan solution to slow the growth of the crisis by tightening up the FDA approval process for opioid drugs

by taking efficacy into account when approving new ones," said Senator Braun

Braun. "Last year, more than 107,000 Americans and 1,490 West Virginians died from drug related overdoses," Senator Manchin said. "It's heartbreaking to lose so many of our fellow Americans and West Virginians to drug overdoses and it's far past time for Congress to take comprehensive, meaningful action to address this crisis. The EFFECTIVE Act would address gaps in the FDA's approval process by allowing them to take efficacy into account when approving new opioids to the market, limiting the approval of redundant, more harmful drugs. I'm proud to introduce this bipartisan bill with my colleague Senator Braun and encourage my colleagues on both sides of the aisle, and FDA leadership, to support this critical step in combating the drug epidemic that continues to ravage our nation."

The EFFECTIVE Act would allow the FDA to

deny a new drug application for an opioid analgesic drug on the basis of the drug not being clinically superior to other commercially available drugs. This bill would provide further authority to the FDA so they can review the public health impact of every new opioid approval and deny new drug applications even if the pharmaceutical company sponsored clinical trials show that a particular drug is "safe." Importantly, this bill fulfills a request from Dr. Califf to ensure that the FDA is able to fully implement the recommendations from the National Academy of Sciences, Engineering and Medicine's (National Academies) 2017 report, Pain Management and the Opioid Epidemic. Dr. Califf asked the National Academies to complete this report to highlight what more the FDA could be doing to address the drug epidemic. However, five years later, no meaningful progress has been made on any of the recommendations made

AG Todd Rokita Warns Hoosiers To Be On Guard Against Scams Ahead Of Memorial Day Weekend

Whether you're heading to the Indianapolis Motor Speedway or hanging out at a backyard BBQ, Attorney General Todd Rokita is warning Hoosiers to be wary of scams. With recent storms, scammers will be out in full force trying to sell you scams related to clean-up, repair, and rebuilding.

"Hoosiers can avoid scammers and ultimately protect their wallets by doing research, asking the right questions, and requiring full written contracts," Attorney General Rokita said. "It can be tempting to accept anyone's help after a thunderstorm or tornado damages your home, but it's crucial to take a step back and fully vet the

contractor."
Unfortunately, far too

many fly-by-night con artists appear on people's doorsteps, promise to make needed repairs and then disappear forever with their victims' down-payments in their pockets.

"Storm threats don't come just from wind, rain, and tornadoes," Attorney General Rokita said. "They also come in the form of unscrupulous schemers who use those weather emergencies to cheat consumers out of money. We are here to help safeguard Hoosiers from their tactics."

Attorney General Rokita is sharing the following tips to help Hoosiers avoid falling victim to storm-chasing scammers:

• Be skeptical of people promising immediate clean-up and debris removal.

• Check out contractors' reputations before enlisting their services.

• Ask for IDs, licenses, proof the contractor is both bonded and insured.

• Get more than one estimate for work.

• Don't believe any promises that aren't in writing.

Never pay in cash.
Don't pay the full amount for the project up front.

Salvation Army Prepares For Increased Food Demand As Enhanced SNAP Benefits End

June 1st marks the end of emergency enhanced SNAP benefits for Hoosiers statewide. In anticipation of increased demand, The Salvation Army Indiana Division is working to ensure that feeding programs and food pantries run by the organization across the state can continue to meet the needs of their communities.

Indiana's COVID-19 public health emergency ended on March 3, 2022, making May 31 the final day that SNAP recipients would receive the maximum benefit allowed in accordance to the number of people in their household. Starting on June 1, benefits will be based on a formula that includes several eligibility factors, including household income. A permanent adjustment to the program made in October 2021 means that most households will receive higher benefits than they did pre-pandemic, but they will still experience

a drop from May to June.
The USDA has provided examples of how these changes will affect households of difference sizes and circumstances.

Pandemic and Beyond" page of the USDA website

The Salvation Army has already seen an increase in visits to its food pantries and hot food programs over the past several months as inflation has made it harder for Hoosiers to put food on the table. According to the USDA, between April 2021 and April 2022 grocery store prices have risen by 10.8 percent. Fresh produce, milk, eggs, and meat prices are continuing to skyrocket with farm-level egg prices predicted to increase us to 76.5 percent in 2022. These higher prices mean that struggling households are bringing home less food each time they go to the store, pushing them to find supplemental food at organizations like The Salvation Army.

"The cost of food, housing, medical, and transportation has not been put into consideration regarding the ending of the pandemic emergency funds," said Dena Simpson, Divisional Director of Social Services for The Salvation Army Indiana Division. "Individuals and families are in recovery mode and facing a number of challenges."

These challenges include:

With inflation outpacing wage increases, the results have been devastating. The Salvation Army is working with partner organizations, food banks, donors, and community volunteers to meet the increased demand. Food costs continue to rise for The Salvation Army, as well, as provider food banks like Feeding America anticipate spending 40 percent more to purchase bulk food in 2022 compared to 2021.

In addition to providing food in many of the communities where The Salvation Army serves, the organization is also helping struggling households with financial assistance to help with rent and mortgages, high utility bills, prescription costs, and gas cards to get to work and medical care.

In Logansport, IN,
The Salvation Army's
food pantry, "The Lord's
Cupboard," offers food
boxes to local families
on Tuesdays and Thursdays. These boxes often
include household goods
and often clothing to help
families make ends meet.
This ministry is in addition to a lunchtime feeding program that operates
Monday through Friday
and provides around 300

hot meals to individuals in need each week. With inflation and supply chain issues putting additional strain on the program, The Salvation Army's administrator, Lieutenant Elis Pomales Morales, is working harder than ever to keep up with increased need in his community.

"We are blessed to have Tyson meat processing here in town," Lt. Elis said. "They give large donations to meat to Emmaus Mission Center, who then shares it with our food programs. The U.S. Postal Service also held a food drive, which has helped to keep our pantry stocked. All of these donations help us with the cost of food, but last year we could prepare a meal for just \$2.50 and today it costs between \$3.00 and \$3.25

per meal."
The chicken donations are especially appreciated, as the USDA recently reported that the price of chicken rose 27.9 percent between March 2021 and April 2022.

Other large Salvation Army feeding programs across the state are having to find creative ways to keep down costs while meeting increased need. In Evansville, IN, the daily feeding program provided over 188,000 meals to the community in 2021. They are depending on the generosity of donors, food suppliers, and volunteers to keep up in 2022 and the expected jump they will see over the summer.

"The Salvation Army Indiana Division is anticipating an increase of individuals and families facing food insecurities.," Dena Simpson added. "Our pantries across the state need supplies as we continue to meet the needs of families in our communities and offset the exorbitant cost of housing, transportation, medical, and other needs we consider basic."

Crawfordsville Masonic Temple Foundation, \$40,000 - Examples of neo-classical architecture such as this local structure, constructed in 1901, are rapidly disappearing. In an effort to prevent this from happening here, these funds will be used to restore 87 exterior windows in the Masonic Temple. With these and other planned restoration and repair efforts, the historic building will continue to serve our community for many years to come.

Walnut Township Community Organization, \$5,149 - This all volunteer organization takes on many community events for the town of New Ross and surrounding area such as an annual Valentine's Dance, Easter Egg Hunt, Hometown Fish Fry, Community Day, Candy Corn Carnival, and the Jingle Bell Jamboree. Events require a lot of supplies and props, which need to be stored from year to year. These funds will be used to purchase and install a new storage barn for this purpose.

North Montgomery School Corporation, \$15,575 - A portion of the funds will be used for the medical, dental, vision, and mental health needs of students in need as well as new AED equipment. In addition, HALO vape and aggression detectors which alert administrators immediately to these behaviors will be purchased and installed in rest rooms as a way of deterring these harmful activities.

History, Arts & Culture Art League of Montgomery County, \$2,425 - The art league owns several paintings by local artists from the late 1800's. The paintings are in need of restoration and repair. These funds will cover the cost of cleaning and repair of seven paintings. Once cleaned and repaired, they will be on display at the Crawfordsville District Public Library for everyone to see and appreciate.

Lew Wallace Study Preservation Society, \$5,000 - The Carriage House, part of the National Landmarks site, serves many critical needs for the Lew Wallace Museum. The building is showing signs of deterioration. In order to determine a plan for restoration and rehabilitation, a full architectural and engineering study is needed. These funds will leverage the LWPS's own dollars along with a grant from Indiana Landmarks.

the early periods of a sport are almost always highly collectible, especially of Hall of Famers," savs Al Crisafulli, Auction Director at Love of the Game Auctions, an internet sports and memorabilia auction that helps families sell collectibles. "But don't assume sports cards or other memorabilia have to be old to be valuable. Modern cards of such stars as Tom Brady, Mike Trout, LeBron James, Michael Jordan, Derek Jeter and others can sell for lots of

money."

He is offering tips to help determine if your belongings are valuable:

Older Sports Cards Cards from the 1960s and earlier are collectible, and those from before the 1940s can be extremely valuable. Bigname Hall of Famers like Babe Ruth, Ty Cobb, Lou Gehrig, Honus Wagner, Mickey Mantle and others bring high prices.

With old cards from the 1880s and early 1900s, look for tobacco and candy brands, such as Old Judge, Piedmont, Sweet Caporal or American Caramel. Really old Sports memorabilia from the 19th and early 20th Century, such as photographs, postcards, bats, gloves and balls are also collectible.

When opting to sell sports items, consider a specialty auction, such as Love of the Game, which has the expertise to professionally research sports items and maintains lists of bidders specializing in this area, to get top dollar. More information is available at loveofthegameauctions.com.

Do you have major current stars, like Mike Trout, Patrick Mahomes, Tom Brady and LeBron James? Or do you have greats from the recent past, like Michael Jordan, Kobe Bryant, Magic Johnson, Derek Jeter or Joe Montana?

Check if your cards are

denoted as Rookie, Prospect, Draft Pick or other indicators they're from a player's first season. And condition is king, as cards that look pack fresh with sharp corners and a well-centered image command highest prices. Additionally, unopened packs and boxes from almost any year can be valuable.

Memorabilia Do you have old advertising posters depicting sports stars or famous entertainment personalities together with food, tobacco or sporting goods brands. Many original signs, store displays and promotional items are collectible, especially those dating from the early 1900s into the 1960s. But low-quality reproductions aren't. Look for memorabilia spotlighting sports heroes, superheroes, early Walt Disney characters and Star Wars subjects.

So, while you're spring cleaning that attic, basement or garage, don't rush to the garbage. Before throwing out old "junk," determine if it's valuable!

U TIME

pretty close to forgetting that Memorial Day is just that, a memorial honoring America's fallen heroes and heroines.

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In a 2019 Opinion article by West Point graduate Meaghan Mobbs she wrote that people have a tendency to forget the purpose of Memorial Day, pointing to a 2001 Gallup Poll that found that only 28 percent of Americans knew the

actual meaning and pur-

pose of Memorial Day.

Mobbs reminded us that Congress declared a National Moment of Remembrance to remind forgetful citizens what the day is all about. It called for "the people of the United States, in a symbolic act of unity, to observe a National Moment of Remembrance States who died in the pursuit of freedom and peace." It was to take place every Memorial Day at 3:00 PM local time. Its purpose: "to remember and renew the legacy of Memorial Day with greater strides made to demonstrate appreciation of those loyal people of the United States whose values, represented by their sacrifices, are critical to the future of the United States."

A lot of good that did. Most of America's younger citizens still don't know what Memorial Day means. As Mobbs put it in her article, "We need fewer moments of silence and more moments of talking about service and sacrifice to our younger generations. It is not in the multitude of silence

that change occurs, it is in moments when thousands of men and women who've 'borne the battle' raise their voices in memory of those who have gone before ... If we are to truly honor those who gave their last full measure of devotion, we must be active, not passive, in our strides to impress those values upon the broad public."

no income tax on their benefits. But single filers with combined income between \$25,001 and \$34,000 will have half of their SS benefits received during the tax year become taxable, and single filers whose combined income exceeds \$34,000 will see up to 85% of their Social Security benefits become taxable. These single filer thresholds apply also to those filing as Single Head of Household or Qualifying Widow(er), and to those filing as "married-filing separately" if they lived apart for the entire tax year. But the threshold is zero dollars for married couples who file separately but lived together at any time during the tax

year.
To clarify what "combined income" is – the IRS uses something called your Modified Adjusted Gross Income, or "MAGI," to determine if your Social Security benefits should be taxed. Your MAGI is your normal Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) from your tax

return, plus any non-taxable income you may have had, plus 50% of the Social Security benefits you received during the tax year. If your MAGI is over the thresholds described above, a portion of the SS benefits you received during the tax year will be included in your taxable income. If it is not, you pay no income tax on your benefits.

To be sure you're aware, when you file as "married/jointly" income from both partners counts when determining your MAGI for income tax purposes.


