1 The Indiana Department of Transportation announces State Road 236 will close in both directions on or after Friday, June 10 between N. County Line Rd. 900 E. and West St. near North Salem for construction work. Starting July 19, S.R. 236 will close between U.S. 231 and Rush St. in Roachdale for additional work in Putnam County. The official detour follows S.R. 75 to U.S. 36 to U.S. 231 back to S.R. 236.

Ask Rusty – Can My In-laws Get Supplemental Security Income?

Dear Rusty: I am wondering what the income limit is for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) eligibility. My in-laws are in their 70's, both drawing Social Security, and each has a pension from jobs they retired from. I am wondering if they are eligible to collect SSI. They have income from all sources that is over \$2100 per month, they are on Medicaid, but they have no savings and few assets. I have been told by a random family member that they are eligible for SSI, but with their income I have my doubts. All of my online hunt and peck research has made this as clear as mud. Any insight you can offer would be greatly appreciated. *Signed: Helpful Daughter-in-Law*

Law: Supplemental Security Income (SSI) is a separate (non-Social Security) federal supplemental assistance program for low income seniors over 65 and for disabled or blind people of any age, but there are income limitations to qualify for SSI benefits and restrictions on assets as well. Overall eligibility requirements for SSI are quite complex, especially for those with earnings from working (it's also notable that only legal US

residents can get SSI). Although some types of income and assets are not counted, only those with very low countable income and very few countable assets can get SSI assistance. Countable income must be less than the federal SS benefit amounts for federal SSI benefits to be paid. If your in-law's current countable income is over \$2100 per month, that alone may disqualify

Study Shows Washington State Is Where Older Citizens Are 'Living Better Lives'

The isolation triggered by the pandemic has caused many seniors to re-evaluate their living conditions, particularly those who are living alone. "To be sure, the lack of nearby or live-in family members ranks high in considering a move to a more senior-friendly locale," according to Rebecca Weber, CEO of the Association of Mature American Citizens (AMAC). And Weber points out that the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) estimates there are currently some 10.6 million seniors 65 and older who are still in the workforce and if you are one of them you'll want to seek out worker-friendly locales. By the way, she says, the BLS

estimates that the number of 65-plus seniors still working is expected to increase to 16 million by 2030, including 32% in the 65 to 74 age range and nearly 12% in the over-75 range. So, if you're a senior and looking to make a move, how do you pick a place that can address your needs? Many of you, if not most of you, would probably pick Florida as the ideal destination. If nothing else, Florida is noted for its climate and has long been considered the place to go when you retire. But a new study conducted by the senior housing experts at Seniorly.com put Florida in 28th place in its list of states where older

What You Should Know About Fighting Kidney Disease

(Family Features) When people are unexpectedly diagnosed with chronic kidney disease (CKD), their lives can be turned upside down. CKD, which is the gradual loss of kidney function, strikes Americans at a faster rate than any other non-contagious disease. When diagnosed early, kidney disease can often be treated so that it does not worsen into kidney failure. However, with no symptoms in the early stages, CKD often goes undiagnosed until the late stages. To survive with kidney failure, people must either receive a kidney transplant or start dialysis care, which involves a machine

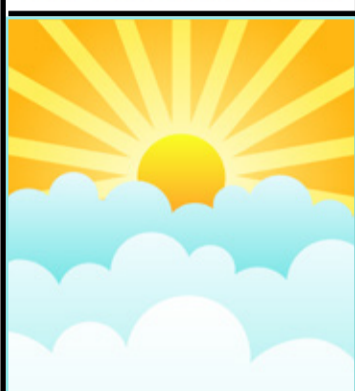

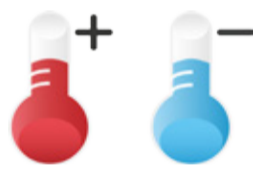

USDA Has Provided \$700M To Restore Sustainable Fuel Markets Hit By Pandemic

U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Secretary Tom Vilsack announced that the Department has provided \$700 million to help lower costs and support biofuel producers who faced unexpected market losses due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The funds are being made available through the Biofuel Producer Program, which was created as part of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act). The investments include more than \$486 million for 62 producers located in socially vulnerable communities.

"The Biden-Harris Administration is committed to rebuilding the rural economy after the impacts of the pandemic," Vilsack said. "That's why USDA is targeting resources and investments to improve the strength and resiliency of America's sustainable fuel markets. The investments we're announcing today will pave the way to economic recovery for America's biofuel pro-

ducers, stimulate a critical market for U.S. farmers and ranchers, and support our nation's transition to a clean-energy economy.

USDA is making payments to 195 biofuel production facilities to support the maintenance and viability of a significant market for agricultural producers of products such as corn, soybean or biomass that supply biofuel production. These biofuel producers experienced unexpected market losses on a combined 3.7 billion gallons as a result of COVID-19.

For example: In Iowa, Southwest Renewable Energy LLC is receiving a payment of \$3 million. It suffered a market loss on 14.3 million gallons of ethanol due to the pandemic.

In Illinois, Adkins Energy is receiving a \$774,000 payment. Its biomass-based diesel production suffered a market loss on almost 3.5 million gallons due to the pandemic.

In Texas, White Energy Holding Company is

receiving a \$21 million payment for production at two facilities. Its ethanol production suffered a market loss on 98 million gallons due to the pandemic.

The investments USDA is making today will support biofuel producers in California, Colorado, Georgia, Hawaii, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Massachusetts, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, North Carolina, North Dakota, Nebraska, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, Virginia and Wisconsin.

Under the leadership of the Biden-Harris Administration, Rural Development provides loans and grants to help expand economic opportunities, create jobs and improve the quality of life for millions of Americans in rural areas. This assistance supports infrastructure improvements; business development; housing; community facilities such as schools, public safety and health care; and high-speed internet access in

Staying Connected During Weather Disasters



citizens are “living better lives.”

“Florida, for example, which has long been thought of as a primary retirement destination, was in the middle of the pack. This is likely due to the nuances of our analysis, which sought to determine which states have made the most progress when it comes to improving the lives of older adults. So, that means a state like Florida probably didn’t have as far to go as others,” explain the folks at Seniorly.

Seniorly’s analysis compared all 50 states and the District of Columbia and had a potential top score of 306 across four main cate-

gories: physical health, mental health, finances, and social lives. “While no states reached that lofty goal, a couple of them got fairly close. Washington was the top state overall, scoring 248.8, just two points ahead of second-place finisher, North Dakota. Washington’s winning performance was powered by its strength across three of the four categories, ranking second in physical health and social factors and fifth in finances.” Massachusetts, New Hampshire and Vermont ranked third, fourth and fifth.

As for the states with the lowest scores, they were Hawaii, Arkansas, Utah, Michigan and Ne-

vada, in that order.

AMAC reached out to Seniorly for a pre-publication comment on this article. Their reply: “Much of what you read about seniors is often negative. In our work with seniors and their families we’ve seen remarkable improvements in quality of life, health and happiness. We conducted this study to show where in America the outlook for seniors has improved the most. Even the states that ranked lower in our analysis are still better off than they were 10 years ago. While COVID-19 was devastating, the lives of seniors as a whole are improv-

ify them for SSI because their countable income is more than the federal SSI benefit of \$841 per individual, or \$1261 per couple.

As mentioned, some types of income aren’t countable, but pensions and Social Security benefits do count (after a small \$20 exclusion). So if most or all of your in-law’s monthly income is from those two sources, they almost certainly won’t be eligible for additional assistance through SSI. Something else to be aware of is that any SSI benefit they might be eligible for would be offset by their Social Security payment, so if each of their individual Social Security payments

are more than \$841/month, then there would be no additional benefit from the SSI program. Here is a link at which an explanation of what types of income count, and don’t count, toward the SSI income limitation: www.ssa.gov/ssi/text-income-ussi.htm.

From the information you’ve shared about their current Social Security and individual pension benefits, it does not appear that your in-laws will be able to gain any additional benefit from the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program. The income restrictions for Medicaid eligibility are more generous and, since they’re in their 70s, your in-laws are obvi-

ously both on Medicare as well to help with their healthcare expenses.

After nearly 30 years of trying to prove a theory it has been done. That Dr. Robert Haley has proven that a toxin has proven that Sarin gas was the cause of the sickness of roughly 250,000 troops from the 1990-91 Gulf War. Following the Gulf War nearly one-third of those.

That deployed came down with unexplained rashes, fatigue, gastrointestinal and Digestive issues and Brain “fog”, neuropathy, and muscle and joint pain. Federal agencies spent years trying to prove or disprove why they had these disorders.

filtering their blood on a regular basis. The wait for a transplant can be 3-5 years or more, and 13 Americans die every day waiting to get off the kidney transplant waitlist.

Inequity in Kidney Care People of all races and ethnicities are equally likely to develop kidney disease; however, people of color are more likely to reach kidney failure.

- Black Americans make up just 13% of the U.S. population, but they account for 35% of Americans with kidney failure.
- Hispanic/Latino people are 1.5 times more likely to progress to kidney failure than non-Hispanic white people.
- Native Americans are twice as likely to go into kidney failure as white Americans.
- Asian Americans are

1.3 times more likely to go into kidney failure.

The risk for kidney failure in these communities is in part due to high rates of diabetes and high blood pressure as well as a lack of access to timely preventative care.

Multiple social and community factors contribute to inequity in health care, specifically kidney care, including systemic racial bias, language barriers, lack of cultural understanding and where people live. People in regions where there is a scarcity of health care resources can also experience higher instances of kidney failure. An estimated 22% of people with kidney failure live in rural areas. People with later stage kidney disease who live more than 100 miles away from a dialysis center are more likely

to die than people who live closer.

“To truly improve kidney health outcomes for every American, regardless of race, ethnicity or where a person lives, we must address the implicit bias and structural racism within our health care system, as well as the socioeconomic factors that directly impact kidney health outcomes,” said LaVarne Burton, president and CEO of the American Kidney Fund.

Improving Kidney Care for All

Most people with kidney disease do not know they have it because they do not have any symptoms until their kidneys are badly damaged. The only way to know how well your kidneys are working is to get simple blood and urine tests, which a doctor can order

at your annual physical. Testing is especially important if you have diabetes or high blood pressure.

When caught and treated early, it is often possible to slow or stop the progression of kidney disease and avoid serious complications like heart attack, stroke, kidney failure and death.

As a patient, you have the right to understand everything about your health. Talk with your doctor about risk factors, testing options, prevention strategies and available treatment options. If you feel your concerns are not being heard, you have the right to get a second opinion.
