



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Appeals Court Hands Pro- • Meeting Notes -**Life Side Another Victory**

The 7th Circuit U.S. Court of Appeals on Monday vacated judgments invalidating several Indiana laws protecting unborn children and the health of their mothers — handing the Office of the Attorney General and all Hoosiers vet another victory in the fight for life.

The decision involved the ongoing case Whole Woman's Health Alliance v. Rokita — a legal battle that began with a lawsuit against the state back in 2018.

"Our team has fought long and hard in this case as part of our larger effort to build a culture of life in Indiana," Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita said. "With the U.S. Supreme Court's decision in the Dobbs case, it is clear that life is winning. But we will stay relentless in doing the right thing for unborn babies and their mothers' well-being."

The lawsuit filed in the Whole Woman's Health case amounted to a fullscale assault on Indiana's slate of abortion laws. Although Rokita's team already had prevailed in defending most of those laws, a handful of injunctions remained.

Among other things,

laws affected by Monday's ruling include minimum facilities requirements for surgical and chemical abortion clinics as well as requirements that medical personnel advise women that human physical life begins at fertilization and that "objective scientific information shows that a fetus can feel pain at or before twenty (20) weeks of postfertil-

ization age." Rokita's office had previously secured a stay of injunctions barring enforcement of requirements that only physicians may provide medication abortions; that second-trimester abortions may only be performed in hospitals or ambulatory surgical centers; that women considering abortions receive in-person counseling; and that women considering abortions receive in-person examinations. The judgments against these laws have now been formally vacated as well.

Last week, Rokita announced another historic pro-life legal win after a federal district court granted his motion to lift an injunction on dismemberment abortions, which occur well after an unborn baby is fully developed.

The Third Volume Of Parents' Bill Of Rights Available

Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita recently released the third volume of the Parents' Bill of Rights — this time focusing on school choice, the liberty of parents to choose where their children attend school.

"It is a parent's sacred duty to raise their children according to their values. Above all others, parents are the ones best suited to make decisions on their children's behalf, including the schools they attend," Rokita said. "I will always fight for parents' fundamental

"I will always fight for parents' fundamental and constitutional rights to direct the upbringing and education of their children."

Among other things, the latest installment of the Parents' Bill of Rights outlines laws and processes enabling parents to:

· enroll students in private schools through Indiana's school choice programs;

· transfer students from one public school to another; or · homeschool.

Indiana has one of the most robust school choice programs in the country, with over 35,000 students receiving Choice Scholarships in 2021.

"In addition to making sure parents are well-informed of their rights," Rokita said, "I will continue advocating for legislation that puts the needs and interests of parents and students ahead of other entrenched forces such as teachers' unions."

Last session, the Indiana General Assembly passed into law two proposals supported by Rokita — one requiring public comment be allowed at school board meetings and another protecting biological females participating in girls' sports.

The Parents' Bill of Rights continues to highlight for parents and taxpayers areas in which they may find gaps and omissions in state law. Future legislative priorities could include mea-

sures 1) requiring schools to make curriculum available for parents to view and 2) prohibiting curriculum that teaches the concept that people should be treated differently solely because of their race, religion, sex, or other characteristics.

Rokita released the first volume of his Parents' Bill of Rights in June 2021. That installment focused on school governance, curriculum adoption, standards adoption, and civil rights complaints.

The second volume, released in November 2021, detailed parents' rights regarding medical decisions for their children, such as access to student health records, vaccination requirements, and educational accommodations.

A fourth installment is also in the works. It will cover religious liberty in schools, making clear that students have a right to practice their faith inside the schoolhouse gates.

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

es and strangers have benefits for you individually, and for our community.

Talking to people you don't know has benefits for you: it actually makes you happier. A study of college students asked them to count how many people they talked to in a day, and divided conversation partners into two groups: strong ties (good friends) or weak ties (someone you don't know very well). Unsurprisingly, students who had more interactions with strong ties were happier. What is more surprising is that, independent of interactions with strong ties, students who had more interactions with weak ties were happier, and reported feeling a greater sense of belonging to the community. This relationship is not simply the result of personality, because the same person was happier on days they talked to more weak ties than on days they talked to fewer weak ties.

So if talking to people we don't know very well makes us happier, why don't we do it more often? Another study suggests that people avoid talking to strangers because overestimate the costs and underestimate the benefits. This study asked people to engage in conversations with strangers that reveal personal information; it found that people systematically underestimate how interested the other person will be in their stories, and overestimate how awkward they will feel in the conversation. People also underestimate how connected they will feel after talking to a stranger. Talking to strangers makes you happier than expected, so you probably avoid such conversations more than you should.

Talking to people you don't know also has benefits for society as a whole. People who have more interactions with people they don't know very well have stronger support for democratic institutions such as free speech.

One of the problems with our democracy is that people rarely talk to others who disagree with them. We live in our own little bubbles, and social media has made this sorting worse. Unfortunately, having an interest in politics seems to make things worse; the greater

someone's interested in and knowledge of politics, the less likely they are to talk to someone they disagree with. This separation robs us of the opportunity to hear and understand the view of the other side. The continuation of our democracy depends on seeing people who disagree with us as real people with rational reasons for their views, rather than as evil people who must be defeated. Talking with someone who disagrees with your position increases your awareness of the arguments for the other side, and also makes you more likely to support the free speech rights of those you disagree with.

Unfortunately, technology is changing our lives in a way that reduces the number of interactions we have with people we don't know. Tellers have been largely replaced by ATMs, and cashiers by checkouts where we scan our own purchases. If we work online we leave our homes less often, and when we do leave home we are often inside our cars, where we don't encounter strangers. Compared to 50 years ago, fewer people are members of clubs or churches.

While opportunities to talk to acquaintances and strangers have declined, there are still opportunities. Sometimes we interact with strangers as a part of our economic lives: we meet customers, clients, co-workers on a daily basis. Sometimes we are stuck next to people we don't know for a period of time: while waiting in line, or on public transportation. If you go outside you might meet your neighbors. Public events, clubs and organizations bring people together. Watch for these opportunities, and take advantage of them. If you seek out opportunities to talk to people you don't know, you will be happier, and your community will be healthier.

1958. It becomes Jake's obsession to prevent the Kennedy Assassination. Each attempt he makes takes a different and unexpected turn, will he be able to alter history?

If you are looking for a traditional Alternate History book, you might want to try Roma Eterna by Robert Silverberg (FIC Sil). It asks the question of what would have happened if the Roman Empire never crumbled. What would have happened when they encountered the prophet Mohammad? Or how would they have interacted with the Mayan Empire? And even further down the line, what would have happened in the age of space travel?

My favorite Alternate History story is River of Teeth by Sarah Gailey (FIC Gai). In real life, the United States government once considered a plan to import hippopotamuses into the marshlands of Louisiana to be bred as a meat source. As Hippos are incredibly dangerous this plan was luckily abandoned, but River of Teeth is a wild west-esq story about hippo riders in the American Southwest as they travel

the rivers and bayous.
Of all the books on the display, I am most excited to read The Calculating Stars by Mary Robinette Kowal (FIC

Cow). This book is set

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


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
