

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

WHIN Partners With Israeli-Based Sol Chip Ltd To Expand 10-County LoRaWAN Network

Wabash Heartland Innovation Network (WHIN) has partnered with Sol Chip Ltd, an Israeli based company, to build a weather station and soil monitoring solution. By utilizing WHIN's next generation 10-county LoRaWAN infrastructure this partnership will allow for the expansion of WHIN's dense weather network in west central Indiana. Phase I was successfully completed earlier this year, and Phase II is currently in execution.

WHIN's weather station and soil monitoring network currently operates on a cellular network. Phase II has begun and involves further integration of additional sensors on 20 weather stations in the region. The additional

sensors will be integrated into the SolTag platform using SDI-12 soil moisture monitoring tools that measure soil temperature and moisture in several soil depths.

Connected devices control everything from home security systems to thermostats and TVs. While convenient, these connections open the door for possible malicious activity. Top Considerations Identity theft is the unauthorized use or attempted use of an existing account, use of your information to open a new account, and misuse of your information to commit fraud.

Data thieves gain access to information from a variety of places, including your mailbox, home and business trash, public dumps, public records, and social media.

What You Should Know

How to identify your risk

You are at risk if you store personal information on a home or work computer, or if you bank or shop online. The following scenarios may be signs of compromised data:

• You see unexpected withdrawals from your bank account.

• You do not receive your bills or other mail.

 You receive bills for health services you did not use, or your health plan rejects a legitimate

medical claim. Regularly check your credit report to ensure

you do not see: • A new account you



did not open.

 Unfamiliar accounts listed.

 Negative items. How to keep your

information safe online There are basic steps you can take to secure your information and data:

• Dispose of personal information by shredding documents using a crosscut shredder.

• Use strict privacy settings on your computer, devices, and browsers.

• Keep passwords private, and do not write your passwords down. You may consider using a reliable password manager.

• Be mindful about the personal information you share on social media.

• Be cautious of what you download from the internet. Navigate directly to websites when you need to initiate a download. Do not download anything or click links from sites or emails that someone sends you.

 If your Social Security number is requested by a vendor, ask why it is needed and how it will be used and protected.

• Remember that there is nothing wrong with telling someone that you are not comfortable sharing personal information.

Keeping your information safe also means ensuring your devices,

including smart phones, laptops, desktops, tablets, and other devices, are secure:

• Update your software regularly.

• Change your passwords regularly. • Use two-fac-

tor authentication.

• Use antivirus or anti-malware software to protect against malicious software that disrupts computer operations, gathers sensitive information,

gains access to private computers, or displays unwanted advertising. Password protect

your laptop to prevent unknown users from accessing it. Avoid opening

emails or attachments from unknown senders.

• Back up your files to an encrypted flash drive or external hard drive.

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

Witham Health Services Receives Naloxone Vending Machine

Witham Health Services announced yesterday the placement of Indiana's newest naloxone vending machine at their facility located in Whitestown at Anson at 6085 Heartland Drive, Zionsville, IN 46077. The machine is one of 19 to be placed statewide and will be available for use by the public. Gov. Eric J. Holcomb first announced the initiative in Dec. 2021.

"There is no single solution to ending this epidemic that has taken the lives of thousands of Hoosiers," Gov. Holcomb said. "We can, however, take thoughtful steps to help shake the scourge of addiction from our communities. Naloxone vending machines are a practical tool to prevent overdoses and save lives."

Naloxone, also known as Narcan, is a medication approved to reverse an overdose from opioids and is given when a person is showing signs of opioid overdose to block the deadly effects of the overdose.

The vending machines are manufactured by Shaffer Distribution Company and programmed to dispense free naloxone kits. Each kit includes a single dose of naloxone, instructions for use, and a referral to treatment for



substance use disorder. The machine holds up to 300 naloxone kits and is free to access.

Overdose Lifeline, Inc., an Indiana nonprofit dedicated to helping those affected by substance use disorder, is partnering with the Family and Social Services Administration (FSSA) Division of Mental Health and Addiction (DMHA) to identify jails, hospitals, and other community sites interested in a vending machine to distribute the lifesaving medication. Machines have already been placed in public areas of St. Joseph, Wayne, DuBois, Marion, and Monroe County jails, Tippecanoe County Community Corrections, Clark Memorial Hospital, Scott Memorial Hospital, Union Hospital in Vigo County, and an Eskenazi Health Center in Indianapolis.

Overdose Lifeline will purchase the vending machines using federal grant funds totaling \$72,600 made available through DMHA. There is no cost to entities that implement a vending machine.

"We must continue to ensure widespread access to naloxone, given the lingering impact of COVID-19 and the increased supply of fentanyl in our 92 counties," said Douglas Huntsinger, executive director for drug prevention, treatment, and enforcement for the state of Indiana. "Every life lost to a drug overdose is one too many. Naloxone offers the opportunity to get individuals with substance use disorder on the path to long-term recovery.

Indiana reported a 21% increase in fatal overdoses during the 12-month period beginning in Dec. 2020

and ending in Dec. 2021, according to provisional data released in May by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

"This machine gives Boone County residents zero-barrier access to a medication that could mean the difference between life and death," Kelly Braverman, President/CEO Witham Health Services said. "Witham is proud to be the recipient of one of the state's first naloxone vending machines, and we applaud Governor Holcomb's commitment to address the drug epidemic. From our recent Community Health Needs Assessment residents of Boone County ranked mental health and substance abuse 1 & 2 top areas of concern. This is a great extension to the Mental Health in the Emergency Department Program Witham has in place where patients who come to our Emergency Departments with a mental health crisis have the opportunity to receive immediate treatment from an Integrated Wellness mental health professional and get support 24 hours a day.

Indiana Chamber Launches Talent Resource Navigator To Aid Employers And Individuals In Upskilling Workforce

The Indiana Chamber of Commerce today launched a first of its kind online workforce center with live customer service to help Hoosier employers and individuals better identify and access in one place the vast number of educational and training programs and supports available across the state.

The Talent Resource Navigator is a web-based tool that facilitates person-to-provider introductions and enables state agencies, educational institutions and other nonprofit community partners to manage and update their own offerings on the site. The Navigator is managed by the Indiana Chamber's charitable nonprofit, the Institute for Workforce Excellence, which is dedicated to helping employers attract, develop and retain high-skilled, productive talent in Indiana.

Designed to provide timely and relevant career development information, the Navigator is available at no cost. Individuals and employers can deepen engagement with the Navigator by setting up free accounts to obtain personal technical assistance and customer support from the Navigator support team.

Site visits are personalized and intentionally guide and connect individuals and employers with vetted education and training information and best practices and programs based on the user's input into the site.

"The search for how you can make yourself a more desired worker and ways an employer can strengthen the skills of its workers just got much easier, because the Talent Resource Navigator connects Hoosiers with the exact workforce resources that are right for them," states Indiana Chamber President and CEO Kevin Brinegar. "We are thrilled to bring this tool to the public and to broker introductions between those in need of talent development support and the trusted partners and providers from around Indiana that are equipped to meet their needs.' Examples of those engaged through the Navigator with employers and individuals include community and technology partners, higher education institutions and Indiana state agency representatives. In addition to the "hundreds and hundreds" of opportunities for professional growth that are listed on the site, it features information on in-demand skills and the credentials needed for available jobs and emerging careers. A \$2.5 million Lilly Endowment Inc. grant to the Institute for Workforce Excellence enabled the creation of the Navigator and the ongoing curation of the online information. "Across Indiana there are many high-quality education and training resources available to help individuals enhance their job skills and advance their careers and to help employers support their employees' career development. But connecting to those resources can be challenging," says N. Clay Robbins, Lilly Endowment's chairman and CEO. "By consolidating and curating this important information in one place, the Navigator holds the promise to help strengthen Indiana's workforce to the benefit of individual employees and their employers."

The site is available in Spanish and the Institute for Workforce Excellence plans to offer additional language options in the future.

"Maintaining a 21st Century skilled and ready workforce requires maximizing the full array of our state's many public and private training offerings," says Governor Eric J. Holcomb. "The new Talent Resource Navigator will serve as another important tool to connect employers, nonprofits and individuals with opportunities across the state, many of which are free, like Indiana's Next Level Jobs. Workforce is an all-handson-deck effort, and I applaud the Indiana Chamber and Lilly Endowment for their efforts."

One feature of the Navigator exclusively for employers is the Talent Pipeline Assessment, which evaluates and benchmarks their current talent development strategies against recognized best practices. Once an employer's self-assessment is completed, the Navigator will suggest aligned resources based on those results and notify the employer when new resources are added.

Todd Hurst, executive director of the Institute for Workforce Excellence, explains how the clearinghouse aspect of the site will be enhanced. "While the Navigator already houses a robust collection of pre-populated resources, we encourage organizations and providers to claim and update their existing pages or submit new programs/resources that aren't currently included. "The goal is for this platform to be very interactive, so our many partners across the state can share their own information (verified with data or testimonials) to reach broader audiences. It's exciting to think about the potential for all the opportunities we can showcase for workers and employers." The Navigator is intended to evolve and grow with utilization, adding more local, state and even national talent development resources over time. Starting later this month, the Indiana Chamber will host webinars for users to learn the ins and outs of the Navigator. Soon thereafter, Hurst says, the Institute team also will be bringing the tool to regional partners and events. "Indiana's future prosperity is dependent on developing and retaining Hoosier talent. We hear that from employers. We hear that from state officials. We believe the Talent Resource Navigator is an important effort to ensuring that happens," Brinegar concludes. accent made it hard to read his angle when he asked, "How is America doing?" Uber drivers, taxi drivers, strangers in pubs, even a monk all asked then ventured opinions.

Why were they probing for my perspective? Each had their own motivation, perhaps pinging my responses to compare to what they saw in the news or to their own government? Maybe it's because what happens in America affects them? I'm not sure how much they look to the U.S. as a safeguard of democracy. At least one driver seemed amused that the former president insists he won the last election in spite of what the courts and local officials say. I couldn't help but ask what they thought of Boris Johnson.

Great Britain was gussied up for the Queen's Jubilee Weekend when I landed. Flowers cascaded down storefronts celebrating her. Though the monarch opens Parliament and has the mandate to govern, neither she nor any other monarch has intervened in Parliament matters for 300 years. While in Scotland in June, we spent a morning watching BBC as members of Boris Johnson's party called for a no-confidence vote regarding Johnson. The former prime minister Theresa May dressed up in a ball gown to cast hers. Johnson survived though we learned that

Scottish members of Parliament, called MPs, had voted against him.

The taxi driver in Glasgow among others said that though they disliked Johnson, they thought he was a proven leader. A few weeks later, while we were in Dublin, Johnson was forced to resign. Too many of his lies caught up with him. On top of his denials that he attended office parties during the lockdown, Johnson denied knowing that one of his appointees had assaulted associates. Yet Dubliners and Londoners both decried his resignation as a shame, citing his staunch support of Ukraine.

It's worth noting that the BBC sounded awfully partisan in its reporting about Johnson, as if wishing him out of office. I know a lot of Americans who think the media did that to Donald Trump. Rory Stewart, a former UK Secretary of State for International Development and Conservative Party MP - that's the same party Johnson headed – told Yale News on July 12 that Johnson was "doing extraordinary damage to our government and our unwritten constitution." I was this many years old when I learned that some democracies don't have written, codified constitutions. Five in fact: the UK, Israel, Canada, New Zealand, and Saudi Arabia. In conversation, my

compared their prime minister to our recent presidents. In my head, I had assumed our democracies were more alike, but I soon learned democracies come in all stripes - the Pew Research Center reported in 2019 that about 57 percent of the world's nations were democracies of some kind, though about 28 percent have slid backward into a blend of democracy and autocracy.

The most stable democracies have five qualities that most of us learned first in high school: checks and balances to prevent one person or group from being too powerful; freedom of speech and association because we have different views and the point of democracy is to air these, to form coalitions or parties, and work out differences without resorting to violence; free and fair elections where all adult citizens can vote for who they want and can trust the outcome of elections; transparency and openness so people know who is responsible for decisions and can hold them accountable; finally, active participation by the public so elected officials truly represent their constituents.

That brings us to two kinds of democracy: representative, like our federal government, or direct democracy. More on that later. Both the UK and USA are representative and balance powers with two houses in their legislatures. The UK House of Commons and House of Lords make up its legislature. It has a prime minister and a figurehead in the monarch.

The UK has more representatives for its population than the USA. The House of Commons has 650 representatives so every MP (Member of Parliament) represents about 100,000 constituents. (There are just under 67.5 million people in the UK this year.) That said, the U.S. House of Representatives has 435 members for all 330 +million Americans. That means each of our representatives has to do their best for about 764,000 people.

We have 100 senators in our upper chamber to their 760 members of the House of Lords. Notably, until 1913 neither Americans nor the British elected members of their upper chamber. We started directly electing senators after the passage of the 17th Amendment. The British MPs in the House of Lords are appointed or simply inherit their membership. Our Senate was designed to have two members equally represent each state to counterbalance populism and to give equity to the voices of less populous states.

The takeaway is that there are loads more of us for every U.S. Congressperson which underscores how critical our active participation is. You've heard the adage to be a smart consumer because businesses don't look out for the little guy. Advocate for yourself and do your research. When it comes to representation, we might apply similar strategies. Advocate for your perspective. Speak up. Speak loud. Speak often, or they won't hear.

It might be different if we lived in a direct democracy, but the Founding Fathers figured that would fail. James Madison wrote in Federalist Paper 55, "Had every Athenian citizen been a Socrates; every Athenian assembly would still have been a mob." In short, not even a country run by the wisest could govern themselves peaceably. We all just see the world in different ways. We need democracy to work out how to live together.

Interestingly, some New England towns like Switzerland govern by direct democracy, and 27 of our states have options for limited direct democracy. For example, the recent Kansas vote on an amendment that would have further regulated abortion was decided by the people. An overwhelming majority of Kansans came out to vote against it. In contrast, Hoosier representatives debated, wrote, and passed the new law restricting most abortions in our state.

This is how direct and representative democracy can play out. When

legislation is mitigated by representatives, then voters are trusting people who have various philosophies on how to do their job. Some legislators believe they have a duty to represent the views of the people who elected them, setting aside their personal judgment or beliefs. Some believe that their party's manifesto is the mandate they must follow, so they usually vote with the party. Others believe it is their responsibility to trust their own best judgment or moral / ethical framework to do what is best for the people, regardless of what polls say a majority wants.

Each of these has a name, and each may have a value, but what is critical is that representatives are humans, just like us. We've given them certain powers with their position, but we should never give up our own agency and power. That's why active participation matters. We might think our letter is just one drop of water in an ocean, but our calls, letters, and votes add up.

The people are the only censors of their governors: and even their errors will tend to keep these to the true principles of their institution. To punish these errors too severely would be to suppress the only safeguard of the public liberty. The way to prevent these irregular interpositions of the people is to give them full information of their affairs thro' the channel of the public papers, & to contrive that those papers should penetrate the whole mass of the people. The basis of our governments being the opinion of the people, the very first object should be to keep that right; and were it left to me to decide whether we should have a government without newspapers or newspapers

without a government, I should not hesitate a moment to prefer the latter. But I should mean that every man should receive those papers & be capable of reading them.

I get it that some people have stopped reading already. Shoot, some stopped as soon as they saw the words Founding Father. We have become so polarized as a nation that the famous flag from yesteryear with the image of a snake and the words "don't tread on me" no longer is historical. Today, it's political. But if we can take the politics out for a second . . . there's some weird stuff going on. Yeah, yeah, do me a favor and tune out the Trump devoted fanatics and the Trump haters. You'll never get an accurate picture of reality from either one. And try, just try, to listen with an open mind for a moment. This is not a conspiracy theory.

Shoot, for years I heard that the media was in cahoots. I always laughed at that one. Heck, I know these folks and believe me when I say we are nowhere near smart, or organized enough, to pull anything that complex off.

The thing is that our world is upside down today. We have a federal government spending money that not only they don't have but our grandchildren won't have. We have a president who might be a crook, has dementia or is just completely incompetent – and I honestly am not sure which. We had a (insert adjective here) event on Jan. 6 that put a blinding spotlight on increasing frustration with business as usual inside the beltway (from all sides). We just decided to hire thousands upon thousands of men and women who will have the job of checking up on all of us and our taxes (and if anyone tells you that's not the job they are either a liar or a fool). That aforementioned federal government is publishing material aimed at emboldening adolescents into the world of transgenderism while at the same time somehow turning the notion that men might not be men and women might not be women .

And this doesn't even touch on questions like

that newspapers were a perfect watchdog to help keep things straight. Yet the hired hands in Indiana and other states are doing their best to kill the Fourth Estate.

For the record, and let me be emphatic here, I am about as biased as biased gets when it comes to newspapers. But the crazier things get the more important newspapers are. And most of us (yes, "most") take an approach to this that pretty much stays in the middle and doesn't stray too far right or left. Before anyone loses their minds on that, let me repeat the word "most." No one, no group, is perfect. There are always outliers. But

hearts I believe we are doing our best to be fair and honest.

The simple truth, dear reader, is that we need you. And, as Mr. Jefferson so eloquently wrote, the nation has always needed us. We're not perfect in the newspaper world, and maybe some have lost their way. From this little corner of God's country, I hope you will support the ones who haven't.


