**1** The Indiana Department of Transportation announces restrictions on U.S. 36 starting on or after Tuesday, June 6 for bridge maintenance work near Rockville. Old 36 Rd. through the end of June, weather permitting.

## Low Wallace Study Completes Structural Assessment Of Historic Low Wallace Carriage House

Grants from Montgomery County Community Foundation and Indiana Landmarks funded project.

The General Low Wallace Study & Museum is pleased to announce the completion of a project that studied the structural condition and long-term maintenance of the historic 1870 Low Wallace Carriage House.

This building is the oldest structure on the Low Wallace

Museum campus and was rehabilitated in 2005. It serves as the museum welcome center, education building, staff offices, and artifact storage. Since it opened to the public in 2006 almost 100,000 people have visited the building and our collections storage area has been fully utilized. With this significant use, the board and staff felt it was prudent for the long term maintenance of the building to

assess its current condition.

The assessment was completed by Ratio Architects and Lawson Elser Engineers. While the building is in generally good condition there were some areas of concern noted and the board of the Low Wallace Museum will begin planning for projects that will assure the long term stability of the building so that it can continue to serve the public.

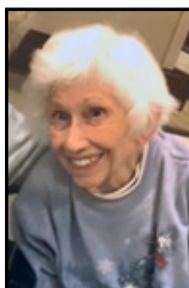

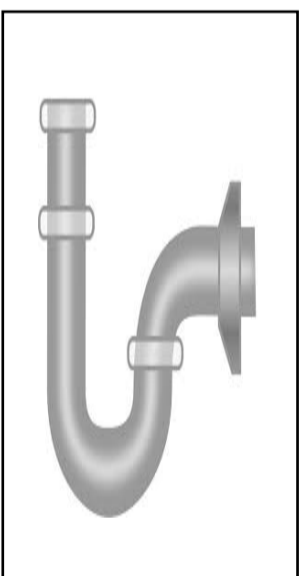



# Senator Young Bolts From Trump

“Where do I begin?” That was U.S. Sen. Todd Young’s response to a Capitol Hill reporter’s question after he became

the first current elected Hoosier Republican officeholder to say he will not support Donald Trump’s presidential re-nomination in 2024.

Sen. Young’s tipping point appears to be related to the Russia-Ukraine war. It came just hours after Trump’s May 11 CNN Town Hall in which moderator Kaitlan Collins pressed him on whether he wanted Ukraine or the Russians to win in the brutal 15-month war. Pressed by Collins on who he wanted to win, Trump said, “I don’t think in terms of winning and losing.”

“That’s why I don’t intend to support him for the Republican nomination,” Young said. “I think President Trump’s judgment is wrong in this case. President Putin and his government have been engaged in war crimes. I don’t believe that’s disputed.”

Asked his reason for refusing to endorse Trump, who has a commanding lead in GOP primary polls, Young replied, “Where do I begin?”

Sen. Young has demonstrated the political patience of Job.

Where to begin? How about Jan. 5, 2021, when then-President Trump sabotaged the sec-

ond of two Georgia U.S. Senate seats that gave Democrats control of the upper chamber? Young had served as chairman of the National Republican Senatorial Committee, raising a record amount of cash for the GOP’s effort to hold onto its Senate majority.

Or how about a day later, when Trump inspired what has become known as the Jan. 6 U.S. Capitol Insurrection? Confronted by Make America Great Again supporters outside the Russell Senate Office Building, Young told them, “My opinion doesn’t matter. And you know what, when it comes to the law, our opinions don’t matter, the law matters. The law matters. I share that conviction that President Trump should remain president. I share that conviction, but the law matters. I took an oath under God, under God!”

In the coming hours, that mob erected a gallows on Capitol Hill, and prowled the halls chanting, “Hang Mike Pence.”

In a statement on Jan. 6, 2021, Young said, “As Congress meets to formally receive the votes of the Electoral College, I will uphold my constitutional duty and certify the will of the states as presented. The people voted and the Electoral College voted. Congress must fulfill its role in turn. Like so many of my patriotic constituents and colleagues, I, too, wish the results of this election were different. But upon assuming this office, I took a solemn, inviolable oath to support and defend our Constitution, just as I did as a

United States Marine. I will not violate that oath.”

When the breadth and scope of the insurrection came into focus a day later, Young blamed it on “a failure for many of our leaders to be truthful to the American people about what precisely has happened in our elections in recent months.” Asked if President Trump played a role in encouraging the violence, Young responded, “Of course. He’s president of the United States.”

Where to begin? During the recent CNN Town Hall, Trump:

Called a Black law enforcement officer who shot insurrectionist Ashley Babbitt while she attempted to break into the House chambers a “thug”.

Repeated baseless election conspiracy theories about the 2020 presidential race.

Insisted that Vice President Mike Pence should have overturned the election.

Suggested that he would pardon many of the Jan. 6 insurrectionists.

Lied about calling for “terminating” the U.S. Constitution so he could be returned to power outside the election process.

Young, who was reelected last November and will not face Hoosier voters until 2028, then turned to his political objections to a third Trump nomination. “You want a nominee to win the general election. As President Trump says, ‘I prefer winners,’” Young said. “He consistently loses. In fact, he has a habit of losing not just his own elections, but losing elections for others. I don’t think he’ll be the

nominee. Republicans are in a winning mood. We want to win. We know he’s the shortest path to losing.”

“I can’t think of someone worse equipped to bring people together to pass legislation and advance our collective values than the former president,” Young added. “I don’t think conservatives would be well served by electing someone whose core competency seems to be owning someone on Twitter.”

Since Young’s break with Trump, there has been no outward migration away from the former president in Hoosier GOP circles, even as former governor Pence prepares to enter the 2024 presidential race.

U.S. Sen. Mike Braun, who will be before voters in the May 2024 gubernatorial primary, reacted to the CNN Town Hall, telling the Washington Examiner, “He’ll have to explain his own answers. Any of the rest of us that try to, I’m sure it wouldn’t make sense anyway.”

Braun added that the eventual GOP nominee must “have a plan that the American people are going to buy into, that makes us competitive in the swing states. When it comes to that candidate who can portray what was working so well pre-COVID and we know who that was, that was President Trump. It was not that difficult.”

# Crypto Mining’s Impact On The Environment



**Dear EarthTalk: I don't get how cryptocurrency is so bad for the environment?**

Cryptocurrency’s impact on the environment is a big cause for concern. While cryptocurrencies (e.g., Bitcoin, Ethereum) offer various benefits, such as decentralized transactions and financial inclusivity, their underlying technology, known as blockchain, has significant environmental drawbacks.

One of the main environmental issues associated with cryptocurrency is its energy consumption. The process of “mining” cryptocurrency involves complex mathematical calculations that require substantial computational power, primarily from fossil fuel sources. The Bitcoin network relies on a consensus mechanism called Proof-of-Work (PoW), which demands vast computational resources that consume more electricity than entire countries like Argentina or Ukraine. As a result, the carbon footprint of Bitcoin alone is substantial, contributing to greenhouse gas emissions and exacerbating climate change.

Furthermore, the energy requirements of cryptocurrency mining have led to the emergence of large-scale mining operations, often located in regions where electricity is cheap and abundant. These mining farms consist of rows upon rows of powerful computers running around the clock, consuming vast amounts of energy. In some cases, they rely on coal-fired power plants, a highly polluting energy source.

Another ecological concern is electronic waste. As mining becomes more competitive, miners require increasingly powerful and specialized hardware. This leads to a constant cycle of upgrading or discarding older equipment. The discarded waste, which contains hazardous materials, poses risks to both the environment and human health. Moreover, the popularity of cryptocurrencies has contributed to a surge in demand for graphic processing units (GPUs) and

other hardware, which has led to supply shortages and inflated prices, as well as the creation of new manufacturing facilities. The production of these components requires significant amounts of energy and raw materials, further straining the environment.

It’s worth noting that not all cryptocurrencies have the same environmental impact. Some newer cryptocurrencies, such as Ethereum, are transitioning from PoW to a more energy-efficient consensus mechanism called Proof-of-Stake (PoS), which requires validators to hold and “stake” a certain amount of the cryptocurrency, eliminating the need for energy-intensive mining. This transition could potentially reduce the impact of some cryptocurrencies in the future. Another option is the use of renewable energy sources for operations, reducing the industry’s carbon footprint. Additionally, more widespread adoption of PoS and other energy-efficient consensus mechanisms could help minimize energy consumption.

Of course, cryptocurrency’s recent fall from grace in the wake of crypto giant FTX’s late 2022 flame-out might be a good thing for the planet. The moral of the story on the evolution of cryptocurrency is that as we continue to explore and develop new forms of digital currency, it is crucial that we prioritize sustainability and consider the long-term environmental effects of the tools and instruments we are unleashing on the world.

## Indiana Expands Women's Access To Contraceptives

A pair of bills expanding and increasing Hoosier women's access to contraceptives are now law, according to State Rep. Sharon Negele (R-Attica).

House Enrolled Act 1568, which was co-authored by Negele and recently ceremonially signed into law, allows pharmacists to prescribe birth control pills, patches and rings as long as the woman is 18 years or older and completes a self-screening.

"With this new law, we are providing Hoosier women, especially those who may be without a doctor or insurance, with access to contraception," Negele said. "Allowing pharmacists to prescribe hormonal contraceptives will expand access tremendously, and hopefully lead to less unwanted pregnancies."

According to Negele, pharmacists would be reimbursed after prescribing

birth control to Medicaid recipients, ensuring low-income Hoosiers are not left behind. Women who receive prescriptions from a pharmacist will be required to consult with a physician within 12 months to ensure medical issues do not arise. In addition, pharmacists can object to prescribing contraceptives based on ethical, moral or religious grounds.

"This puts us in line with nearly half of the states in the country that allow pharmacists to prescribe hormonal contraceptives," Negele said. "This is a big win for Indiana and especially Hoosier women."

Negele also sponsored a new law to expand Medicaid recipients' access to long-acting reversible contraception like IUDs and implants.

Senate Enrolled Act 252 allows hospitals to reassign long-acting reversible contraception, which has

a limited shelf life, to different a Medicaid patient if the original patient did not return for implantation after 12 weeks. According to Negele, this change will not only help more women, but reduce government waste by reallocating these devices instead of letting them expire on hospital and pharmacy shelves.

"Around the state there are unclaimed long-acting reversal contraception devices and drugs on shelves, which can expire and go unused. This new law can help change that," Negele said.

Since the 2022 special session, Negele has worked on legislation making it easier for Hoosier women to gain access to birth control pills and patches.

I had no idea how to dance, and I very seldom listened to songs on the radio. The only records we owned were my parents' 78 rpm's from the 1930's and 40's. So I began tuning in to TV's American Bandstand with host Dick Clark. Ricky Nelson also sang on many episodes of "The Adventures of Ozzie and Harriett." There was absolutely no way I would ever "fast dance," so I mostly listened to love songs such as... "Teen Angel," "Only the Lonely," "Puppy Love," "Moon River," "Blue Velvet," "I'm Sorry," and "Sealed With a Kiss." Thankfully Chubby Checker came up with "The Twist," which certainly made fast dancing much easier for all of the boys...just stand there and twist around!

In the early 1960s, the Beach Boys came on the scene with their unique "California surfing sound." I purchased an adapter for our old console record player, and purchased my first 45rpm record, "Surfin' U.S.A." I also loved "409," which made me want a hot Chevy convertible when, and if, I ever received my driver's license. (That never happened...I was stuck with Dad's red and white station wagon.)

Then in February of 1964, a new musical group appeared on The Ed Sullivan Show...

that's right...the lads from Liverpool...the Beatles! I watched Paul, George, John, and Ringo...and was captivated by them. Their longer hairstyles, collarless suits, and edgy, upbeat, and catchy songs were totally unique... WOW!!! "All My Loving," "Till There Was You," and "She Loves You" were played first, and then later in the show they performed "I Saw Her Standing There" and "I Want to Hold Your Hand." That did it...I had to buy those records! I wanted to let my hair grow a longer, but my basketball coach was not too thrilled with that idea. No one made a collarless suit. But there was one thing I could buy... Beatle boots, and one of my classmates found out that Crawfordsville's own Kinney Shoes was going to receive a shipment!

My buddy drove me and another friend to the store one afternoon after school, and the Beatle boots had arrived... Great!!! The boots were \$11.00 a pair, which was a fortune for this 15-year old farm boy who earned 60 cents an hour detasseling corn and \$1.00 an hour baling hay. Oh well, easy come, easy go. But I soon discovered there was a slight problem. I wore a size 13, and the largest size he had in stock was a size 11. Hmmm, what now? I tried the boots on.

My feet were crammed in like a can of sardines. "Maybe the boots will stretch out after I wear them a few times. Yes, I know they will. Money gone. I'm happy!"

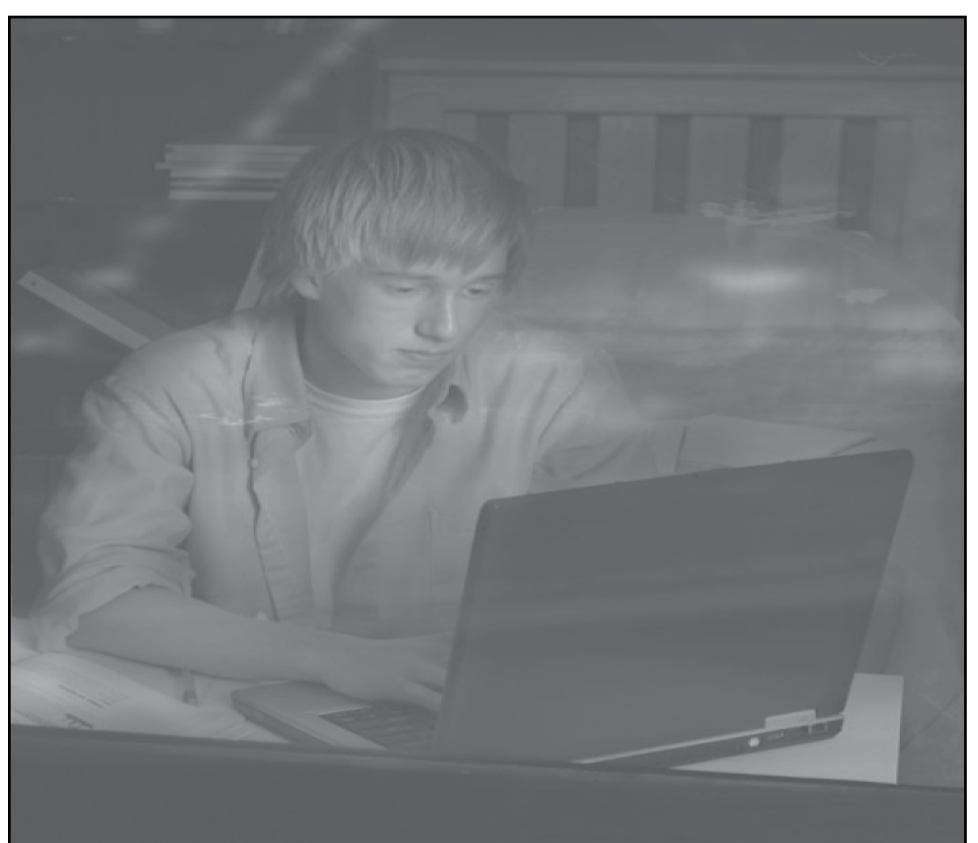
Until the next afternoon after I had worn the boots all day at school. Oh, my aching feet! I sold my precious Beatle boots two days later to a buddy...for \$5.00. Great way to learn about buying and selling and losing money in the process. (I still know how to do that.) The Beatles music remained THE group for me and most teenagers in the mid-1960s. We bought their singles and albums and listened to them on the radio. But I decided not to buy any more Beatle boots...had to stick with my "penny loafers" and Converse "All-Stars." And yes, I did the Twist a few times, but mostly slow-danced with that cute gal...and we were engaged at age 17 right after our graduation, and married that fall. The smell of Aqua Net hairspray and Chanel No. 5 perfume will do it every time... and yes, at our wedding I wore "wing-tips"...size 13.
