leaves for her compost heaps in her little blue truck. In her quest to use natural garden methods, she has several compost areas scattered about the property. She grows comfrey to use as fertilizer, compost accelerator, and mulch. Fish emulsion, along with rotted sheep and rabbit manure are utilized as organic fertilizers. She is probably the only person on the block who rakes leaves INto her garden in the fall, using them as winter protection for plants and any small insects and critters who live there.
