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
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
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
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
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Boone County Couple Charged In 2020 Arson

A Boone County couple now face charges following a multi-year investigation of a 2020 arson fire in Indianapolis.

Leslee Pettit-Myers, 51, and her husband Michael G. Myers, 49, face charges stemming from a Dec. 10, 2020, arson fire that occurred in the 7000 block of West 93rd St., in Indianapolis. Pettit-Meyers has been charged with felony arson and leaving the scene of an accident while Michael Myers was charged with obstruction of justice.

The fire first was reported by a neighbor who heard a commotion outside his home before a white vehicle drove away from the scene, just before fire became visible from the structure. Fire crews arrived to extinguish the blaze and determined an accelerant had been use on the first floor of the residence.

Other neighbors reported similar accounts of the same vehicle at the

property just before the fire and witnessed it crash into a nearby street sign as it left the area. One neighbor was able to identify a partial license plate of the car, which was provided to investigators. The car was traced back to Pettit-Myers, and cell phone records placed her in the area of the arson and accident at the time they occurred.

Investigators say Michael Myers, of Zionsville, took the white 2016 Tesla Model X to a repair shop in Louisville, Ky., after the incident for extensive front-end damage. An employee of the business said the driver indicated an "unauthorized person" was driving the car at the time of the damage and he did not want to turn the car in to his insurance company. A Tesla representative also confirmed the event data recorder in the vehicle indicated a crash at the same time the neighbors reported the accident had

occurred.

Investigators were able to determine the site of the arson was adjacent to a home that previously belonged to Pettit-Myers' parents. The owner of the home where the fire occurred told investigators he and Pettit-Myers had previous altercations during the process of selling the house after the death of her mother in

This case was a joint investigation conducted by the Indiana Department of Homeland Security and Pike Township Fire Department, with significant assistance from the Indianapolis Metropolitan Police Department, Indiana State Police, Louisville Metropolitan Arson Bureau and United States Secret Service.

Senator Braun, Leader McConnell, 31 GOP Senators Call On President Biden To Withdraw Julie Su Nomination For Labor Secretary

The letter was signed by Senator Braun, Senate Republican Leader McConnell, Senate Republican Whip John Thune, Senator John Barrasso, Senator Marsha Blackburn, Senator Katie Britt, Senator Ted Budd, Senator Bill Cassidy, Senator John Cornyn, Senator Kevin Cramer, Senator Mike Crapo, Senator Ted Cruz, Senator Steve Daines, Senator Deb Fischer, Senator Lindsey Graham, Senator Bill Hagerty, Senator John Hoeven, Senator Cindy Hyde-Smith, Senator James Lankford, Senator Mike Lee, Senator

Cynthia Lummis, Senator Roger Marshall, Senator Markwayne Mullin, Senator Rand Paul, Senator Pete Ricketts, Senator James Risch, Senator Eric Schmitt, Senator Rick Scott, Senator Tim Scott, Senator Thom Tillis, Senator Tommy Tuberville, Senator Roger Wicker, and Senator Todd Young.

The Senators write,
"Her track record and
unwillingness to provide
clarity to her past positions

The letter voices concern about Su's time as head of the California Labor and Workforce Development Agency:

"In her capacity as the head of California's Labor and Workforce Development Agency, Ms. Su was the architect of a law that forced independent contractors in the state to reclassify themselves as W-2 employees, and she did not hesitate to express her willingness to enforce this law, threatening investigations and audits to the wage claim process for workers who did not comply."

As well as concerns with how her approach to the franchise business model would affect small businesses:

"Strong concerns from the small business community have also been expressed over Ms. Su's approach to the current franchise business model, citing her support of California legislation that gave authority to government appointees to make decisions regarding wages and working conditions at independently owned restaurants across the state."

Electric Vehicle Pros and Cons a smaller carbon footprint than used gasoline cars and the ever-increasing maintenance needs of

Dear EarthTalk: What are the environmental and other pros and cons of ditching the gas guzzler for an electric vehicle (EV)?

Transportation accounts for almost a third of all U.S. greenhouse gas emissions, making the switch to EVs a welcome change for environmental advocates. But is ditching your old conventional wheels for a shiny new EV really the best thing for the planet? To evaluate how eco-friendly a car is, you should consider the environmental impacts of its three life stages: its creation, operation and disposal.

Studies conclude that manufacturing a vehicle accounts for around 25 percent of its lifetime carbon footprint. Making a car creates a lot of pollution as raw materials have to be extracted, transported and manufactured. In fact, according to the environmental consulting firm Ricardo, 46 percent of an EV's total carbon footprint is generated before it even travels a mile. Keeping your old car eliminates the environmental effect of manufacturing a vehicle.

An important question arises: Do the negative environmental impacts of manufacturing EV batteries outweigh the benefits? A report by CarbonBrief concludes that EVs have

a smaller carbon footprint than used gasoline cars in about four years and a smaller carbon footprint than new ones in around two years. EVs also benefit the environment by eliminating tailpipe emissions and having better fuel economies than gasoline-powered cars. And while the sustainability of EVs ultimately depends upon the mix of renewable energy in the grid where you live, even with the current renewable energy percentage, driving EVs tends to be beneficial. The more renewable energy you charge your car with, the better: So consider choosing your utility's greener options or purchasing Renewable En-

ergy Certificates (RECs).

EVs themselves pose
a bit of a difficulty when
it comes to responsible
disposal. Recycling EV
batteries can be difficult
as the design and chemicals vary greatly from
one battery to another.
Most batteries aren't even
designed to be recycled.
While much is being done
to address this issue, it
remains a significant contributor to toxic waste.

Financially speaking, according to a report by GetJerry, EVs cost an average of \$56 per month more to insure than gasoline-powered cars. They are also more expensive to repair. But in spite of these down sides, operating an EV comes with certain economic benefits. It can help you evade the ever-increasing gas prices

and the ever-increasing maintenance needs of an aging gas-powered vehicle. It also may be eligible for tax incentives and credits. And prices of battery EVs are seeing significant reductions: According to EVI-USA, "Experts expect that their prices will be at par with diesel or petrol vehicles between 2025 and 2027."

To conclude, over their full life, electric and hybrid vehicles have significantly lower carbon footprints than normal cars. But, EVs tend to be a bit more expensive. If investing in one is out of reach, you can reduce your transport-related issues by walking, biking or using public transport whenever possible.



some passing young or at birth, basically nine growing up. His story of how he became a minister is amazing and how he preached to himself as he worked out in his fields. Thus, it culminated with him being deathly sick, no doctor being able to figure out his malady. Arminta saw a doctor in a dream and Jesse was hauled to Crawfordsville to see Dr. Benage (Arminta recognized him from her vision) - within 48 hours Rev. Jesse was as good as new and preaching away. (Chapman Brothers Portrait & Biographical ... p 345). The couple were amazing singers and led revivals in song many times over.

Jesse Goben was the son of James and Elizabeth (Kline) Goben, James the son of William "Billy" Goben who was said to have been a native of Ireland. In 1776 Billy married Rebecca Brandy of Dutch descent. Billy was a Revolutionary Soldier. Jesse received his name from his mother, Minty's father, Jesse Leonard Plunkett.

One of Jesse and Arminta's five sons to grow to adulthood is my subject today, although mention of the others will likely crop-up as well. William P. Goben was born right here in MoCo on the 20th of May in 1849 and passed away 15 February 1926. As with some of his brothers, he probably went to Wesley Academy near Waynetown. Overall, he was a carpenter but did some farming and other such work and toward the end of his years, he and wife owned a boarding house. The carpentry helped the most, I guess as in April of 1892, he (and some of his brothers which I could never pinpoint but I'm guessing Jesse and Matthias Vancleave, possibly John L., but John has a story of his own about that time and depending on which paper and who you probably would have talked to whether he did all the shenanigans he was accused of doing is questionable; however, since there were large discrepancies when he was county treasurer and again as county auditor, who knows)? John and MV also liked to race and purchase horses, plus they both moved to Illinois not long after the troubles.

Ohhhh, hmmm!! At any rate, Will was the major force behind the Goben Fire Escape that was patented. Many since the Chicago fires had worked on perfecting fire escapes but this was somewhat unique as it had moveable (all automatic) sections that went down a flight, the person quickly moved to another moveable platform and the first returned to pick up someone else trying to get out. Sounds a bit confusing but it had much praise, many followers and several buyers (especially hotel owners) of the affair (yep, they could use it on all the windows at the same time). Ironically, several companies from Chicago purchased such.

Will P. was first married to Ann Elizabeth "Lizzie" McIntire on 20 October 1881 and their daughter Sally Belle

(oops?) was born the next year on the last day of May in my little hometown (had no idea until researching this). She was but 5 years old when her mother passed away. The Review poked a bit of fun (12 Feb 1898) at Sally saying that she visited Linden on Sunday and that she admired gray houses. Evidently her husband Thomas Endean lived in one near there. They married and presented Will P. with two grandsons (Paul William and Edward). Sally lead a pretty long life compared to the other gals in the families, passing 21 Dec 1958 of lung and colon cancer which she had suffered from for about five years!

Will P. was married again to Dorcas Foster (20 April 1891) at the home of his father's good friend, Matthias Van-Cleave and they were blessed with one beautiful and vivacious daughter, Jessie Lee (born 17 April 1894) I assume named for Gpa'. Again, Will lost his wife, Jessie her mother and Sally her stepmother as Dorcas died at just 40 Aug 11, 1904.

Guess the third time was the charm as Will married for the third and final time to Martha White McClure who survived him. She lost a son in 1925 (or late 24) living in Washington DC of unknown causes at just 40 years old. That year, Will lost his beloved daughter Jessie who had married Rev. Russell Pittman. They were so happy, married for seven years (she was a wonderful helper and he an admired preacher) and finally expecting their first child, only Jessie developed a poisoning in her stomach and died before giving birth. Think it is neat that the Pittmans and Will and Martha travelled far and wide together before all this happened.

William P. Goben (sometimes spelled Gobin) didn't seem anyway to be a big joiner but upon his death, his obituary was emphatic about making sure the reader realized that Mr. Goben was "widely respected for his honesty, sincerity and deep devotion to his family and friends!" Sounds like Jesse J's (photo of what I imagine Will looks like – Jesse was handsome, huh photo of the Gobens from Cliff Gobin on Ancestry)- clone and that's a good thing all the way around!

of the same name, and variations of the human figure in an adjoining space. Both sections touch upon characteristics of his personal identity

To Walk a Mile is a story about the passage of time for Kochanowski as an artist and craftsman. Beyond the physical representation, the work boots become a metaphorical extension of the sculptor's inner self. The worn and weathered boots speak of resilience in the face of challenges and the ability to endure long hours involved in the family business as a blacksmith, shaping iron. By the end of each year, he is left with a pair of worn-out work boots after creating several works of art, forging iron, and taking countless steps.

The absence of shoelaces recalls the resourceful habits which were passed down by the artist's grandparents who fled war-torn Poland after World War II and immigrated to the United States. When shoes wore out, the shoelaces were always salvaged and kept in a box for another day's use.

Two particular attributes of this exhibition lie in the range of sizes portrayed in the boots – from oversized weathered boots in cast iron to elegant verdigris bronze, then finally miniature

boots blushed with gold. Moreover, the choice of material further enhances

the narrative of artistic growth and transformation. The progression from cast iron to bronze and finally to gold, also signifies the artist's increasing mastery of his chosen medium.

In the adjoining space, Kochanowski took the opportunity to showcase purely visual expressions with variations on the human figure. The artist delves into abstractions of the body, many from his own proportions; fortifies and memorializes his mentor in cast iron friendship; and analyzes gesture and space in formal planar studies. It is the style Kochanowski has used in his public artworks.

Nearly 400 Hoosiers Receive Teaching Scholarships

The Indiana Commission for Higher Education has awarded nearly 400 scholarships to the seventh class of Next Generation Hoosier Educators. The number of scholarships expanded significantly this year due to recent legislation authored by Representative Robert "Bob" Behning with bipartisan support from the 2023 Indiana General Assembly.

"What I have learned is that being a teacher goes beyond the classroom where each day they are tasked to be not only a teacher but a mentor, counselor, role model, etc.," said Next Generation Hoosier Educators Scholarship recipient Emma Seits. "This scholarship confirmed the gut feeling I recently had on becoming a teacher. I look forward to the relationships and impact I will make on my future students."

Emma Seits1Selected through a competitive process based on academic achievement and additional factors, recipients will receive \$10,000 annually (up to \$40,000 total) for committing to teach in Indiana for at least five years after graduating college.

A total of 598 students

applied for the 2023-24 Next Generation Hoosier Educators Scholarship. Applications were received from students representing 263 high schools in 88 of Indiana's 92 counties. Additionally, 75 percent of applicants were Indiana high school seniors with the remainder comprised of current college students.

To qualify for the scholarship, students had to either graduate in the top 20 percent of their high school class, earn a score in the 20th percentile on the SAT or ACT, or have at least a 3.5 cumulative GPA.

"We are encouraged by the overwhelming support from our legislative partners to grow Indiana's teaching pipeline by further leveraging the Next Generation Hoosier Educators Scholarship," said Indiana Commissioner for **Higher Education Chris** Lowery. "Recipients of this scholarship are driven, passionate and committed to making a positive impact in Hoosier classrooms and communities."


To continue earning the scholarship in college, students must earn a 3.0 cumulative GPA and complete at least 30 credit hours per year.



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
