The online platform created by the Indiana Department of Insurance (IDOI) for reporting cybersecurity events is now live. The new online form was created as a result of the Indiana Insurance Data Security Law that went into effect on July 1, 2021. The Indiana Insurance Data Security Law requires insurers and other entities licensed by the IDOI to develop, implement, and maintain an information security program, investigate any cybersecurity events. and notify the IDOI of such events. The law also established the IDOI as the regulatory body to receive, monitor, and enforce cybersecurity events involving licensed insurers and entities under Indiana Code Title 27

Ask Rusty - About Income Tax On Social Security Benefits

Dear Rusty: I just started receiving my Social Security in February of 2023. I am also working part time at a company 24 hours a week. My question is... I feel like I missed something when I signed up for Social Security because they are not taking any taxes out. What did I miss? How do I go about fixing it so I don't get hit at the end of the year? They are taking taxes out of my paycheck now, do they still take it out of my Social Security because I am working? Please help if I am not doing something right. **Signed: Conscientious Senior**

Dear Conscientious: Unfortunately, when the Social Security Administration processes your application for benefits, they don't usually inform you that your Social Security benefits may become part of your taxable income. I expect that's because your benefits only "may" become taxable - they do not definitely become taxable, because Social Security benefits are taxed only if you exceed a certain income threshold.

The thresholds at which Social Security benefits become part of your taxable income are different depending on your income tax filing status – those

who file as an individual have a different threshold from those who file as "married - filing jointly." And to further complicate matters there is more than one threshold for both individuals and joint filers. Here's how it works:

•If you file your income tax as an individual and your "combined income" from all sources is more than \$25,000. then 50% of the Social Security benefits you received during the tax year becomes part of your overall taxable income at your particular IRS tax rate. But if your combined income as an individual tax filer is more than \$34,000 then up to 85% of the SS benefits you received during the tax becomes part of your overall taxable income.

•If your income tax filing status is "married - filing jointly" the thresholds are higher – if your combined income from all sources as a married couple exceeds \$32,000 then 50% of

the Social Security benefits you received during the tax year becomes part of your taxable income. But if your combined income as a married couple exceeds \$44,000 then up to 85% of your SS benefits received during the tax year are taxable.

"Combined income" is also known as your "Modified Adjusted Gross Income" or "MAGI." Your MAGI is your Adjusted Gross Income on your tax return, plus 50% of the Social Security benefits you received during the tax year, plus any non-taxable interest or untaxed foreign income you had (note that withdrawals from a Roth IRA are not included). If your "MAGI" exceeds the above thresholds, some of your Social Security benefits are taxable; if you are under the first threshold for your IRS filing status they are not.

A Chat With The Navy Seal Who Shot Osama Bin Laden

"We went up the stairs. My buddy jumped on the people he thought were wearing suicide vests. He went left, I went right. And that's when I saw Osama bin Laden standing up taller than I thought." That's how former U.S. Navy SEAL Team 6 member, senior chief petty officer Robert O'Neill recalled the moments before he put a bullet in bin Laden's head. In a recent interview with Rebecca Weber, CEO of the Association of Mature American Citizens, on AMAC's Better For America podcast, he went on to describe his encounter with the founder of the diabolical terrorist organization, al Qaeda, who was directly responsible for the deaths of hundreds upon hundreds of innocent civilians throughout the world. He upped the ante on September 11, 2001 when his henchmen launched a series

of four airline bombings in the U.S., taking the lives of nearly 3,000 victims.

O'Neill continued: "He was skinnier than I thought. He had his hands on his wife, Amal's shoulder, sort of almost pushing her toward me. And he was a matter of three feet away from me. I assumed he was a suicide bomber because he was a high threat. And so I treated him as such." O'Neill continued, noting that he had no other choice but to eliminate the threat. "So, I shot him twice in the head and once more on the ground. And then I moved his wife out of the way. I knew other Navy SEALs would be coming in and we, being the good guys, I didn't want her to get hurt and I didn't want his young son that was there to get hurt. Some other guys were in there and I kind of froze. And one of my guys



CEL&P Power Outage And Restoration Efforts

At approximately 3:15 pm on Thursday, June 29, 2023, Crawfordsville Electric Light & Power (CEL&P) had two substation breakers trip offline as well as the west 138 kV transmission feed. The transmission feed did not cause an outage but did leave our system vulnerable to a system-wide outage should the east feed fail.

At the onset of the storm, approximately 1,900 CEL&P customers were without power. Two large areas were affected by the substation breakers tripping, those being the 231 north corridor, Country Club Rd, West Wabash, and Waynetown Road. Line crews began troubleshooting these areas and were able to restore power to both within 90 minutes.

Approximately 700 customers were still without power. We then used data from our automated meter system to identify smaller outage areas. At least twelve smaller areas

were identified. Many had distribution lines down due to fallen trees.

Working in two-man crews, these areas were assessed and repaired individually. CEL&P was able to re-energize the west transmission feed at 9:30 pm. By midnight, customers without power had dwindled to 100 with most being individual service issues.

By 7 am Friday morning, all but twenty-five customers had power restored. Many of these customers will need the assistance of a licensed electrician in order to have damaged services repaired prior to reconnecting power. Crews worked all night and will stay on the job until all power is restored.

Our main priority is to re-establish power quickly and safely for customers without service. Limb and tree debris clean-up efforts will begin Monday, July 3, 2023. To report a power emergency, call CEL&P at 765-362-1900.

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
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






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Saturday, July 1, 2023 **Conveying Your Concerns About Water For The LEAP Development**

Monday I attended a meeting with 300 community members, fellow elected officials.

and Purdue scientists to discuss the proposal to use water from the Greater Lafayette area to feed the LEAP development in Boone County.

Unfortunately, missing from the panel of speakers were representatives from the Indiana Economic **Development Corporation** (IEDC), who, to my disappointment, did not accept the organizer's invitation to be on hand to help clarify the ongoing study and resolve community concerns.

Unlike virtually everyone else in that meeting, I have had the advantage of having met with IEDC on this subject on multiple occasions over the last few months, but even I still have questions.

To be clear, I am thrilled the state of Indiana is aiming high with this project. Economic development should be among

our top priorities and it's important that we not slip into the very human habit of opposing new ideas just because they are different

and generate questions. But it's more than reasonable to have our questions answered and to have some key reassurances that the Wabash River and the Greater Lafayette area will be protected. From my first meeting with IEDC back in January, I have emphasized the following:

First, the scientific community at Purdue University should be heavily involved in the pre-project study. Our community is blessed with the talent and resources to not have to rely entirely on others for answers. We also need assurances that future projects and transfers of water will receive the same study.

Second, as a fiscally responsible legislator, I need more clarity on how the state will pay for the infrastructure to move water into Boone County and why this expense couldn't have been avoided by locating the project more to the north.

Third, I need more legislative assurances

than currently exist that Indiana's laws will protect Tippecanoe and the surrounding counties from too much water being moved. Likewise, I need more legal certainty that if there is an unforeseen problem, there will be a remedy that protects Greater Lafayette's resources, its businesses, and individual

residents.

After Monday's meeting, I once again reiterated these points to IEDC officials and requested that they work closely with the community. In the meantime, I will continue to communicate your questions and concerns and to request that the organization work with us to find an acceptable plan that will protect our area and benefit the state with a successful economic development

Duke Energy Restores Power To More Than 108,000 And Continues To **Respond To Severe Storm Damage**

Company is bringing in more than 1,000 additional resources to supplement statewide workforce.

Duke Energy has restored power to more than 108,000 customers who were affected by the severe and damaging storms that ripped through Indiana Thursday. Winds as high as 90 miles an hour in some areas resulted in more than 202,000 power outages. Approximately 94,200 remain out of service as of about 7 a.m.

The storm caused outages in nearly all of the 28 districts Duke Energy serves in Indiana, particularly in the Western and South-Central parts of the state. Crews have been making repairs while assessment is still underway to determine the full scope of damage.

We are bringing in a small army to supplement our statewide workforce and speed power restoration," said Duke Energy Indiana President Stan Pinegar. "Our priority is always to restore service as quickly and safely as possible, and we appreciate our customers' patience. We're also keeping an eye on the weather because there's the potential for more storms that could hamper restoration.'

The company is bringing in personnel from **Duke Energy operations**

in Ohio and Kentucky as well as the Carolinas. Contractors who regularly assist the company in storms are also respond-

"We are seeing large numbers of broken poles, trees in power lines and spans of wire down," Pinegar said. "We also had damage on our electric transmission system, which includes power lines and structures that are our major carriers of power."

Duke Energy will provide power restoration time estimates once there is more information from damage assessment. Extended outages are possible, however, in the hardest hit areas.

Power restoration process

During power restoration, the company's priority is to repair large power lines and other infrastructure that will return power to the greatest number of customers as safely, quickly and efficiently as possible. Local Library Preserves Local Memories The

Crawfordsville District Public Library is home to the Marian Morrison Local History Collection,

featuring materials on Crawfordsville, Montgomery County, Indiana and surrounding areas. Located on the second floor of the library, our Local History and genealogy section is a part of the Reference Department and features a robust online database in addition to the collection located in the building.

We often digitize fragile materials that can't be handled easily using a special high resolution scanner noused in the archives room of the library. Early photographs, letters, diaries, books and such are digitized by trained staff members and some are indexed for ease of research. Once items are digitized, links are added to the library website so patrons can access them online. New items are added regularly.

One recent addition is the Wier-Krout Reunion Book (alternately spelled Weir). The book contains minutes and officers from 1921 to 2001 and has been uploaded in five parts to the website. One of the benefits of digitization is the ability to preserve the original documents and another is that the digitized file reader has the ability to zoom in and out of the documents to make reading easier. Some of the digitized documents

are able to be downloaded to your device so you can read them without being connected to the internet or save them for your own family history. You can also share the digital documents with your family when researching your genealogy

If your family or organization has historical documents you would like considered for digitization, the library can scan a copy for the Local History webpage. You don't even have to part with the original unless you would like to donate them for our collection. The library can preserve these documents using archival methods for future generations.


One organization that recently shared documents with the library is the Mace Methodist Episcopai Church. Their membership rolls with information from 1892 onward has been recently added to the library's digital collection. The three-part document includes the family names, relations, and occupations of the congregation members. The Mace Kings Daughters Sunday School documents from 1917-1921 and 1940-1948 have also been scanned. These documents include the minutes and membership of the group associated with the Methodist Episcopal Church. If you have family from the Mace area, look for their names and read about what they were doing.

Also of interest are documents from The Grand Army of Republic. The GAR was a fraternal group composed of veterans of the Union Army, Navy,

and Marines, who served during the American Civil War. The group was founded in 1866 in Decatur, Illinois. Crawfordsville was home to the McPherson Post No. 7 of the GAR. The local history collection has many interesting documents from the McPherson Post. The Treasurer Book from 1884-1893 includes members' names, dues, credits, debits, and notes. If you are looking for someone from Montgomery County that served during the Civil War, check the GAR Membership List Ledger, 1895-1941. This ledger has an index of members. The ledger will list their rank and unit, the dues they paid, and any notes about them. Also available is the Roster and two books of minutes from the Grand Army of the

Republic. For a complete list of the digital materials available, visit the Local History and Genealogy page of the library's website at cdpl.lib.in.us/services/ local-history-and-genealogy. Toward the bottom of the page is a section titled "Explore Further" which features the "Digitized CDPL Resources. If you have local history documents or books you would like to share with the library, please contact Dellie Craig, our local history specialist, at 765-362-2242, ext. 119 or dcraig@ cdpl.lib.in.us

looked at me and said, 'Hey, are you okay?' and I said, 'I don't know'."

I said, 'I don't know'.' Rob served as a U.S. Navy Seal from 1996 to 2012 on SEAL Team two, SEAL Team Four and SEAL Team Six. During his career, he led more than 400 combat missions all over the world. He has been awarded two Silver Stars, four Bronze Stars with Valor, a Joint Service Commendation Medal with Valor, Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medals with Valor, three presidential unit commendations and three

combat action ribbons. He concluded the interview with his SEAL Team secret for coping with adversity, noting that: "Navy SEAL training is the hardest military training in the world. Eighty-five percent [of volunteers] don't make it through the very difficult trials starting with a thousand pushups a day, a thousand sit-ups a day, a thousand flutter kicks [a lower abdominal exercise]. It's a mile to the chow hall from where you're working out. So, you run six miles a day just to eat on top of an additional 12 miles a day. It's very, very hard training. But I had an instructor who explained that it's [all about] mindset. You need to get your mind into it, because if your mind quits, your body is going to follow. If your mind stays in it, you can make your body do anything. But that

instructor gave me advice for getting through the training, and it turned out to be great advice for getting through life. He said the course is not impossible and I'm living proof of it. It will make you do something hard, followed by something very hard, followed by something harder, day after day after day. It sounds hard but don't think about it that way. Do it like this. Wake up in the morning. Make your bed the right way and then brush your teeth. You start the day with three wins. That's not bad. It gets you to your 4 a.m. workout on time. And as you're feeling the pain, don't think about it; concentrate on your next goal in life, which is making it to breakfast. After breakfast, your next goal in life is making it to lunch. And after lunch, your next goal in life is making it to dinner. After dinner, do everything you need to do to get back into that perfectly made bed. And because you took the time for yourself in the morning to make your bed the right way, regardless of how bad today was, and it was probably bad, tomorrow is a clean slate. Tomorrow is a fresh start. So, when you feel like quitting, which you will, do not quit right now, that's your emotion. Quit tomorrow. And if you can keep quitting tomorrow, you can do anything in life. That's how you get through."


matically withhold taxes from your monthly benefits, and the FICA tax being withheld from your earnings are not used for that purpose. Everyone who works and earns must pay SS tax on their earnings, which are mandatory contributions supporting the federal Social Security program. But that FICA payroll tax has nothing to do with income tax on your Social Security benefits. If you are working 24 hours per week and also collecting Social Security benefits, you will likely exceed the threshold for your tax filing status, which means that at least some of your 2023 benefits will become taxable. That could, as you suspect, result in a

surprise "hit" when you file next year's income tax return. Nevertheless, fixing this is quite easy:


