Traffic will be down to one lane over West Fork Big Walnut Creek and controlled by temporary traffic signals. The restrictions will be between W. County Road 1025 N. and W. Co. Rd. 900 N. through mid-September, weather permitting. This contract was awarded to Rieth Riley Construction for \$7.2 million. Crews will be performing a bridge deck overlay on S.R. 75 over Branch Ramp Run, an HMA Overlay between S.R. 234 and U.S. 136, and preventative maintenance from U.S. 36 to S.R. 234. The entire contract is expected to be completed in June of 2024. INDOT urges motorists to slow down, use caution, and consider worker safety when traveling through a work zone.

here's Frank Clements! His parents, Henry and Mary (Hamilton) were both immigrants. Henry born in Armagh, Ireland and Mary in Liverpool, England. Henry's parents (John and Rebecca Coulter Clements) came here as well with their six sons and three daughters. Henry was a local contractor and built several of the county's early roads. His brother, George E. Clements was one of my favorite doctors I have researched!

Frank was born 18 Sept 1878 right here in C'ville, educated here and at age 19 (1 Aug 1897) was assigned as the mail carrier for RR #1 at the same time WP Daggett was appointed to RR #2. Their pay was \$400 that year. In their first month, Frank carried 1,773 pieces of mail although in an interview a few years later, he said he carried 1,800 which was reported

at the time as Daggett's total (1,802). Within just a couple of years, Frank and WP were joined by Stan Jones, John Skidmore, James Hamilton, Robert Larsh, Sam Linn, Ollie Watson, Albert Yount and Frank Vancleave for C'ville's ten routes and adding 15 more for the county towns covering over 700 miles/day and most of the routes were right at 20 miles per day.

On Sept 16, 1898 in the Crawfordsville Weekly Journal our two boys had a warning to all that tampering with rural mail boxes was a penalty of the US Postal laws so don't "put bills, advertisements and other unauthorized papers" in the boxes!

Don't think their job was easy, please as it wasn't particularly so. Daggett RR #2 suffered from heat exhaustion more than once and Frank




The student board attends robotics events across the state as program ambassadors and meets with potential

# **Electric & Infrared Tech Usher In Greener Grilling**

Dear EarthTalk: I've heard that grilling generates a lot of pollution and greenhouse gases. Are there greener types of grills or grilling methods that are more planet-friendly?

We certainly do love to grill. Whether it's hot dogs, burgers, steaks, salmon or shish-kebab, chances are you and/ or your neighbors have grilled it up recently. But all that grilling can't be good for the planet or our carbon footprints. Researchers in the United Kingdom report that a typical summer barbecue for four people releases more greenhouse gases into the atmosphere than an 80-mile car journey.

There are several types of grills that can contribute to pollution, and your grill is most likely included. Charcoal grills release more emissions because they are literally burning carbon. If you live in a poorly ventilated area, charcoal grills may not be the best option since they release particulate matter into the air.

There are two major types of charcoal: lump charcoal, which is roasted wood; and briquettes, which are laced with chemicals and flammables. Both release very toxic volatile organic compounds and carbon monoxide when burned. But, between both of them, lump charcoal is the more sustainable option.

On the other hand, propane and natural gas grills emit significantly less pollutants than charcoal grills; however, they do burn fossil fuels. They are more efficient, cooking faster easier, but still release chemicals like Nitrogen oxide, although usually on a smaller scale compared to charcoal grills.

An even better option are electric grills. These might be pricier, but they do significantly reduce emissions and will last a long time without refueling. They rely on electricity from the grid, so their environmental impact depends on the source of electricity generation.

Choosing renewable energy sources, such as solar or wind power, further enhances the sustainability of electric grills. Similarly, infrared grills use infrared radiation for cooking. Instead of heating the air around

the food, they target the actual metal and food on the grill. They also lock in moisture making them ideal for cooking steaks, burgers and other meats.

Grilling is an integral part of our culinary culture, but it is essential to acknowledge and address its potential environmental impact. By embracing sustainable alternatives, such as electric grills or infrared grills, we can still indulge in grilling while minimizing our carbon footprint.

Launched in 2021, Parents' Bill of Rights empowers parents to direct children's education and upbringing by ensuring they know legal rights and responsibilities.

Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita this week rolled out the fourth update to his office's Parents' Bill of Rights a roadmap for moms and dads seeking to maximize their involvement in school governance, curriculum, medical decisions for their children and choosing where their kids attend school.

The latest version includes a new section emphasizing Hoosiers' precious freedom to practice their religious beliefs, including within the walls of public schools.

'The Parents' Bill of Rights is the result of direct conversations with parents," Rokita said. "Across Indiana, Hoosier moms and dads tell us that their children's schools spend more time indoctrinating kids with historically and scientifically incorrect anti-American propaganda and exposing them to sexual and perverted materials than teaching math, science, reading and writing. With our test scores falling behind the rest of the world, schools cannot afford one second of distraction from these subjects."

received a painful accident when he was alighting from his mail wagon, catching his foot in the hitch strap, falling hard on the pavement, breaking his face and two teeth breaking off. (CWJ 2 Feb 1900 p 12). Frank's route was out in the Shannondale area.

In June 1906, Roxie Blanche Peterman became the bride of Frank with Rev. JJ Fisher pronouncing the ceremony at her mother and stepfather's (Charles Davis) home on Liberty St. There were about 150 guests at the celebration, Roxie wearing "a charming gown of silk mull trimmed in valenciennes lace and Irish point lace." (CDJ 11 June 1906 p1). I looked that up and wow, it must have been gorgeous. She carried an arm full of roses entwined in smilax banked with ferns and palms. Dainty refreshments were enjoyed in the dining room and two parlors (one decorated in greens and white, the other pink and white with roses throughout the home). They honeymooned in Chicago and returned to their home at 610 Liberty Street (which is now the northside of Wabash's baseball field), although they lived many years at 618 E. Wabash.

Frank noted not long after he began carrying the mail that some of his patrons took five daily papers plus monthly magazines and wrote/received many letters. "The rural patrons read much and are well posted on all current news.

Frank's brother, Charles Ira "Dutch" served during WWI in the YMCA work having been described at 5'10", brown eyes, straight, medium nose, scar under his pointed chin with black hair and fair complex. Judge Jere West wrote, "I have known Charles Clements all his life and he is well-educated, moral in every way, has no bad habits, his character and reputation above reproach. He can be trusted in every occasion. His family are loyal and patriotic to this

he was a couple inches shorter and had blue-eyes. Dutch worked in France and Great Britain. He later was in the grocery business.

Their brother, Harry moved to Lakewood, Ohio where he was a manager in an auto factory. He and wife, Crystal Carter had Evelyn and Frank, named for our Frank. Their brother John Henry "Jack" was a cement contractor here and was the father of Pauline, Ray, Elizabeth Ruth and John William. The oldest brother James (b 10 May 1869 here) married Tessie Grimes and they had at least two sons, James and Fred. He too was a grocer. There was one sister, Jennie who married at an older age to William Clarence Dodds and lived in Greencastle and later in Wright, Greene County. They had one daughter Erma.

Frank and Roxie were active in St. John's Episcopal Church and were parents of but one daughter, Thelma "Faye" who married Norman McDougall in Benton Harbor, Michigan. They mainly lived in the Chicago area and had one son, Norman A. Roxie was very sick for several years, unable to do much of anything. Frank cared for her every need. However, when he passed at age 88 in December 1966, after decades of working as one of the first two county rural carriers, all of his family had passed and he was cared for in Bowles' Nursing Home. He, Roxie and his brother Frank are buried together at Oak Hill (thanks to R&S Fine for the FindAGrave photo). ### **GOP Leaders Say Changes In Lt. Gov. Selection Unlikely**

Conservative pastor Micah Beckwith's bid for Indiana's second-highest office has rankled some Republican politicos — but don't expect changes to the lieutenant governor selection process, according to party leaders.

Although everyday Hoosiers vote for their party's gubernatorial nominee, it's party delegates that select that person's second-in-command. Still, delegates typically fall in line with the gubernatorial nominee's preference.

But in June, Beckwith went public with his bid for the post — and a direct campaign to the Indiana Republican Party's roughly 1,800 delegates.

Now some Republicans including on the party's central committee, according to multiple people familiar with the organization — want to put the power to choose more firmly in the hands of the gubernatorial nominee. Though Indiana Code commands political parties to conduct state conventions and nominate candidates for lieutenant governor, it also gives state party committees the power to determine nominating procedures.

lieutenant governors separately but Indiana isn't one of them. Instead, the lieutenant governor nominee is the gubernatorial nominee's running-mate, and they appear as one ballot selection on general election day.

"I think that, you know, those folks who are electing their governor candidate are entrusting them with that ability to choose their lieutenant governor," Hupfer said.

He was one of four of the party's current executive officers and central committee members to respond to Capital Chronicle requests for comment.

Jon Winkler, the party's District 8 vice chair and Spencer County's chairman, said letting delegates make the choice keeps power closer to "the people."

"Our system's been working really well the way it is, for the most part. A lot of times, your (lieutenant governor) will be the governor's DICK anyway, winkler acknowledged. "... Still, it's not taking the voice of the people away.' Party Secretary Mary Martin said she expected the process to "go just the way it is: delegates get to choose." She separately works for U.S. Sen. Mike Braun, who is also a gubernatorial candidate. "I live in the farthest corner of northeast Indiana — I live in Angola — and up in our area, people don't even discuss that. It's just a moot issue," said Martin, who advocated for a greater focus on upcoming local elections. Amanda Lowery, the party's District 9 vice chair and Jackson County's chairwoman, said she hadn't yet formed an opinion on how the process should work. "We'll see how it goes," she said of Beckwith's bid.

Asked of her wait-andsee approach, Lowery added, "We're in uncharted territory here."

### Governor candidates reassure delegates

The party's four most prominent candidates for governor were largely supportive of the current selection process, although to varying degrees.

Senior Adviser Josh Kelly called Braun an "outsider" in a recent statement — "just like the hundreds of grassroots Hoosier conservatives that serve as convention delegates."

Braun, he continued, "looks forward to working with the delegates next summer to find a Lt Gov candidate that shares his conservative values and can help further his agenda to make Indiana a beacon of freedom and opportunity."

Indiana's current Lt. Gov. Suzanne Crouch said she's "not in favor of any changes" in a statement to the Capital Chronicle. And she pledged to maintain "a fair and open convention delegate process," if elected governor. "While I've had discussions with various Hoosiers about being a potential running mate when I become the Republican nominee for governor, I want to be clear - I respect our delegates and their role in this process," she said.

"... We intend to announce our choice for running mate ahead of the primary, so as to give the voters the fullest understanding possible," the campaign said.

But because the nominees are eventually partners, the campaign said that "the convention delegates should give deference to the nominee's selection, as has historically been done."

'I think it would backfire'

For his part, Beckwith said he'd gotten overwhelmingly positive responses from likely delegates with whom he'd met — even if a conversation with one central committee member hadn't gone quite as well.

"She was not very kind ... she did not like in any way shape or form what I was doing," he said. And on Monday, Beck-

And on Monday, Beckwith challenged Pence to embark on a similar run for lieutenant governor.

He said he was all-in on his campaign, but didn't fear rule changes regardless. "They already don't want the people to have a voice," he said of what he described as "elite ruling class" politicos "masquerading as Republicans." "I think it would backfire if they tried to do something like that, but let them try," he added.
