

FSSA Adds Second Round Of Employer-Sponsored Child Care Fund Grants

The Indiana Family and Social Services Administration's Office of Early Childhood and Out-of-School Learning today announced it will extend the Employer-Sponsored Child Care Fund application window and award grants in two rounds. The \$25 million fund, part of Gov. Eric J. Holcomb's 2023 Next Level Agenda, will mobilize employers and communities to create or expand child care offerings that address the needs of working Hoosiers.

Round one of applications are due at 11:59 p.m. Nov. 22. Round two of applications will close at 11:59 p.m. Dec. 15. FSSA will target up to 75% of the funds for round one applications with announcements in December of the awarded employers and organizations.

Any applications not awarded in the first round, and additional applications received between Nov. 22 and Dec. 15, will be considered for the second round. Those awards, utilizing the remaining funds, will be announced

in January. The \$25 million program, a partnership with the Indiana Chamber of Commerce, uses a portion of the state's remaining

federal relief funds from the COVID-19 pandemic and is part of the state's broader efforts to strengthen the early care and education sector, providing support for today's workforce and investing in tomorrow's. The program is also supported by the **Indiana Manufacturers** Association.

Grant funding can be used to support employees' child care needs in a variety of ways, including sponsoring dependent care assistance plans, providing on-site or near-site child care or offering child care tuition benefits. Grants of up to \$750,000 will be awarded. The full list of allowable uses and details can be found here.

To be eligible, employers must be located in Indiana and either a business or corporation employing 20 or more employees, a group of employers with 20 or more employees or a community-based nonprofit applying on behalf of a group of local employers with a combined total of 20 or more employees. Employers must also be willing to contribute 10% of the total amount requested and be able to implement solutions within the first year of the program.

Holcomb Visits Hoosier Soldiers In Kenya Ahead Of Thanksgiving

Indiana National Guard members stationed in Kenya — who will miss Thanksgiving at home and likely Christmas — asked Gov. Eric Holcomb only for more ping pong balls and corn hole bags during a visit this week.

"I think I can do that,"
Holcomb told reporters
of the requests. "(The
soldiers) just ooze duty,
honor, country. They're
so patriotic, they're so focused, they're so trained."

Holcomb flew to Kenya
— a neighbor to war-torn
Somalia — on invitation
from Indiana Adjutant
General Dale Lyles.

About 130 soldiers serving with the Indiana National Guard's Airborne company, headquartered in Seymour, have been deployed to Kenya's Camp Simba since April 2023. They're scheduled to return in 2024.

Asked if the Israel-Palestine conflict had soldiers on edge, Lyles said no—but that soldiers were maintaining situational awareness of that, China, North Korea, Ukraine and more.

"I can assure you that we have trained the men and women of the Indiana National Guard to the highest degrees of readiness ... to ensure that our country remains free," Lyles said. "The soldiers that are serving at Camp Simba right now are focused on their mission at hand, and that's to help rid this particular region of the world of the violent extremist organizations that are seeking to undermine the freedom of Kenya."

The operation, dubbed "Enduring Freedom" has been ongoing in the Horn of Africa since 2002.

On other topics, Holcomb said he doesn't yet have a new pick for the next commander-in-chief after former Vice President and former Indiana Gov. Mike Pence dropped out of the presidential race.

"I've been a little busy and have a lot on my plate," Holcomb said, with a pointed glance at his surroundings. "And we'll see what role Indiana plays in the whole process. But ... I'll be looking for the individual who best articulates a substantive agenda or plan, and more more importantly, how to execute it."

"I'll have my own test that revolves around what I hold myself accountable to, and this administration," he continued. "And that's trying to provide some certainty and predictability, stability and continuity. That's what I'll look for in a partner at the federal level."

Holcomb is term-limited. Six Republicans, a Democrat and a Libertarian are vying to succeed him in a 2024 election.

He also said his administration hasn't been questioned in an investigation of gambling-related wrongdoing. Former Shelbyville Rep. Sean Eberhart agreed to plead guilty last week to a federal felony charge related to a bribe from a casino executive for favorable legislation.

"President Pro Tem (Rodric Bray) and the Speaker (Todd Huston), they're men of very high ethical standards. And I'll leave it to them, as I have in other scenarios, to make sure that those standards are upheld throughout their caucuses," Holcomb said. "We'll continue to make sure that we're transparent and hold people accountable if they cross the line as well. We have a zero tolerance."

On Monday, the governor's office announced the Indiana Finance Authority's water programs team would take over water supply studies, expand the scope of the studies to include watersheds in 13 counties, and install new monitoring devices.

Some of these changes are helpful, but you typically study before you act, and significant work has already started at the **LEAP Innovation District** in Lebanon. The change is two small steps forward when we need at least three or four big ones. The next logical step would be a pause on any action or contract that would push the state even further down the path of this pipeline proposal until independent studies are completed and the Indiana General Assembly can consider relevant issues such as water withdrawal permits, pipeline costs and reform at the Indiana Economic Development Corporation. You can read my full statement on the subject here. You also may want to listen to my thoughts on the next steps as captured by local news media here and here.

My top priority right now is to craft a bill that would start to build the foundation for the state's water policy and protect our area. That's actually the easy part. The hard part is doing that in a way that also has a chance of becoming law in the face of pushback. A failed bill will do nothing to protect the residents of Senate District 23, so that means whatever form the bill takes, it's not likely to go as far as I would like, or you would like, but I will push as hard as I can to not leave any protections on the table.

from the federal government. The creation of Supplementary Medical Insurance (SMI) has had lasting effects on the federal budget.

Because it receives substantial and uncapped subsidies from federal tax revenue, Supplementary Medical Insurance (SMI) is altogether different from Social Security and Hospital Insurance. This has resulted in annual federal budgetary deficits that increase the national debt of the U.S.Federal allocations to Supplemental Medical Insurance in 2023 equal 1.6 percent of total GDP.

Expanding Supplementary Medical Insurance (SMI) benefits has made it politically challenging for Congress to increase premiums or limit expenses. Meanwhile, given that 30.7 percent of the population is now aged 65 and older, the separate Social Security trust fund will be exhausted by 2034. For the Medicare Hospitalization Fund, insolvency is expected in 2031.

What principles should guide Social Security and Medicare reforms? Capretta first suggests getting a handle on Supplementary Medical Insurance (SMI) in order to address a significant portion of the overall federal government deficit. His modest proposal is to prevent the general fund contribution to SMI rising from its 2023 level (1.6 percent of GDP).

Capretta then tackles the rapid depletion of the payroll-financed Social Security and Medicare Hospital Insurance trust funds. Something needs to be done relatively soon with support from the two major parties.

It is now presumed that current law prohibits spending by Social Security (SS) and Medicare (HI) when their trust funds are exhausted. To sustain the principle that Social Security and Medicare

Hospital Insurance payments reflect premiums paid during a person's working career, consider two reforms: 1) Current formulas for payment requests must be amended in order to lower costs; and 2) increased revenue must flow into these trust funds.

Another option being considered rules would transform the programs by raising taxes on taxpayers with incomes exceeding \$400,000 from all sources; this would essentially remove the programs from payroll taxes. Alternatively, policymakers could work with the public perception that payroll taxes fully cover costs and impose no financial burden on the broader federal budget. This would retain the concept of promised retiree payments based on one's previous earnings.

Adjustments will not be popular but procrastination will surely result in a crisis, decreased trust in the program, lower labor force participation, and unsustainable increases in the national debt. Capretta proposes that whenever Social Security and Medicare Part A trust fund deficits are anticipated, half of any adjustments needed be assigned to higher payroll taxes and the rest to benefit cuts. Congress could periodically revise these formulas and protect the lowest-income retirees from any changes.

It would be wise to consider Capretta's suggestions. The architects of U.S. Social Security wanted all American workers to own Social Security by paying for it themselves with the confidence that what was promised will be delivered.

from a legitimate number. Even if you know the sender, it's still important to verify the message's legitimacy before responding, opening an attachment, or clicking on a link that could potentially compromise your device.

Cybercriminals also share stolen credentials and personal information more readily now and work in gangs, ultimately amplifying the threat. Through social engineering of your publicly available information – often gleaned from social media — and private data procured illicitly, scammers are able to craft text messages specifically designed to lower your defenses. This means, communication may look like it's being sent from a known person or number, possibly making reference to shared knowledge. Fraudsters may apply a sense of urgency or other scare tactic that prompts you to react quickly instead of taking the time to

scrutinize a request. Additionally, the ever-growing capabilities of generative artificial intelligence (AI) tools have made it easier for scammers to develop smishing attempts that closely mirror conversation, making it simpler and more affordable to distribute cyberattacks successfully to a large audience.

"Whereas previous smishing and phishing messages often didn't make sense, as generative AI advances, these messages contain fewer grammatical or spelling mistakes. As a result, users are less able to distinguish them from legitimate communications," says Raina Kanakis, a security specialist with PNC's Global Security Fusion Center.

Simple Precautions Can Mitigate Risk

Vigilance is key, especially as attacks become more sophisticated. One way to verify senders' identities is by cross-checking short codes — the five- or six-digit number used by companies to deliver text messages to your phone. Each of these unique codes is used for certain purposes — to transmit

card activity alerts, for

instance.

Many companies, such as PNC Bank, have established resources to enable customers to verify the legitimacy of text messages appearing to come from them. By referencing PNC's Short Codes page for example, you can verify whether a text message originated from a legitimate short code, helping you detect and avoid possible impersonation fraud.

Use these additional strategies to help thwart smishing attempts:

- 1. If you are not expecting the message, proceed with caution.
- 2. Do not immediately respond.
- 3. Do not click on any links within a text message. Navigate to the URL using a different means to validate it.
- 4. If the message appears to come from a familiar company, contact them on a different channel to confirm legitimacy.
- 5. Getting a text and subsequent call does not increase legitimacy. Hang up and call the company or financial institution directly using a known telephone number.
- 6. Screenshot and send any suspicious messages appearing to come from a company to them to verify and alert.
- 7. To report smishing to all mobile telecom carriers, screenshot and send the message to 7726. For added protection, use the "Report Junk" feature on your mobile carrier's system.
- 8. Visit the FCC website for more information on how to avoid smishing scams.

SS retirement amount (only the spousal portion of her monthly amount would be suspended).

You will be able to restart your benefits at any time by calling Social Security again and asking that your benefits be resumed. You can suspend and restart your benefits as needed (no restriction on how many times), but they will only start/ resume the suspension effective with the month following the month you call. And, as you likely already know, for each month your benefits are suspended you will earn

Delayed Retirement Credits (DRCs) resulting in a higher payment amount later.

Just for clarity, voluntary suspension of benefits is only available to those who have reached full retirement age but is an excellent way to increase your monthly Social Security payment. Your benefit will grow by .667% for each month suspended and, if your benefit is still suspended when you turn 70 years old, Social Security will automatically resume payments at that time, at your higher maximum monthly amount.
