THREE THINGS

You Should Know

1 American Legion Auxiliary members across the country will be distributing red crepe paper poppies in exchange for donations on National Poppy Day (May 24) and throughout the Memorial Day weekend. All donations directly benefit local veterans.

2 State and local law enforcement agencies have increased patrols as part of the national "Click it or Ticket" high-visibility enforcement effort. From now through June 2, officers will be out in full force making sure drivers and passengers are buckled up and children are properly secured. Since the "Click It or Ticket" initiative began more than 20 years ago, seat belt use has gone up 30 percent in Indiana to 93.2 percent, higher than the national average of 91.9 percent. Despite making progress and advances in vehicle safety, in 2023, 390 unbuckled vehicle occupants lost their lives on Indiana roads. Nationally, there were 11,813 unbuckled vehicle occupants killed in crashes.

3 The unemployment rate of the State of Indiana in April stood at 3.6 percent, according to the Indiana Department of Workforce Development. By comparison, the national unemployment rate for April stands at 3.9 percent. Private sector employment in Indiana increased by 300 jobs over the last month, resulting in a gain of 36,400 jobs from this time last year. Indiana's April private employment stands at 2,848,500.

LWV Shares Conversation With Karyn Douglas

Karyn Douglas has long deserved the "Making Democracy Work" Award, which the League of Women Voters bestowed upon her during the

annual meeting on May 14. Douglas worked in the county clerk's office for 17 years, with the last seven as the county clerk.

Douglas started her job in Montgomery County the day before the November election in 2007 when there were 27 precincts, so she showed up at the courthouse at five in the morning.

"Here's how you log in. Here's how you do a voter search," Jennifer (Bentley) Pursell showed her. She took a paper with the location of each precinct's voting site on it and a list of people she could call. That was her training.

Douglas grew up in California, "the total opposite when it comes to Midwest political thinking," she said during her acceptance remarks. But she grew up in a bi-partisan home.

"My dad's from the Midwest. He's very Republican. He had a woodshop in the back yard and a Ronald Reagan poster on the inside. My mother and I were raised Catholic, which of course, that's JFK territory. She was a Democrat. They always said, 'We're going to go vote and we're going to cancel each other out.' My parents both always voted, and to this day, they never miss an election. And back then we would vote in neighbors' garages and poll workers were stationed in the driveways. My mom and my dad were very big on privacy for voting. So we couldn't stand there, but we could sit down at their feet and wait on them. When we were done, we got so excited because my brother and I each got to take one of their ballots and put it in a cardboard box."

As much as she loved those moments, she didn't foresee going into public office or working in government. Her high school government class fell in first period and she was always running behind, so she missed a lot of that class. Her teacher, a first-year instructor, made the class write letters to the person they'd be in 10 years.

"There I was writing the letter saying, 'this is really stupid. Why is she making me do this?' Yet I finished the letter. That woman mailed the letter to my father 10 years later – I'd already moved here to Indiana. I am not sure if she's still living, but I really wish I could say to her now, 'OK, you had a kid who didn't even care the least about government."

It's the time of year when families transition from a school schedule to a summer schedule, and my family couldn't be more ready. But for many parents, it's also a time when child care is even more challenging.

Last year, I made increasing access to affordable child care for Hoosier families one of my legislative priorities. While challenges remain, I am proud of what we accomplished.

The process started in the summer with stakeholder meetings and an interim study committee. Those led to Senate Bill 2, a bill on which I was a lead author, that passed the Senate 45-2 and the House 98-1.

The reforms passed this session will:

- Cut red tape that drives up the cost of operating a child care facility; and
- Reduce overly burdensome regulations for some child care providers.

While I truly believe nothing can or should replace a loving home environment, these reforms matter because parents need the flexibility to find employment if they are to provide for their families, and our economy needs the services working parents provide.

As your state senator, I will continue to find ways to support our Hoosier families. I welcome your

thoughts how our state can better do that.

Don't Forget to Wear Your Poppy!

Begin your Memorial Day weekend by remembering the meaning behind the day, and supporting the needs of our veterans, military, and their families. The Friday before Memorial Day is National Poppy Day.

You may be wondering: What is National Poppy Day? The tradition of wearing a red poppy began following the deadly battles of World War I. It's not just a symbolic flower in the United States, but around the world. It all started after red poppies bloomed on the battlefields in France and Belgium. Canadian Lt. Col. John McCrae, M.D., wrote the poem "In Flanders Fields" while serving on the front lines. Moina Michael of Georgia, read the poem and vowed to always wear a red poppy as a sign of remembrance. Michael urged groups to adopt the poppy to honor and support veterans. She was joined in these efforts by others in Europe, Canada, and Australia.

up much of their spare time.

A few weeks later I asked the boy if the school counselor had administered any reading tests . . . "No, I haven't taken any tests." Thinking it may have slipped the counselor's mind, I spoke with her. "Well, I talked to the principal, who then contacted the superintendent, and they told me not to do any testing with that boy." She had no clue why they had reached that decision.

I taught at another school the next year. I wondered how the boy would do when he was in high school. Four years later I met up with him at the mall in Lafayette. "How did you get along

in high school?" I inquired . . . "Great! . . . I made all A's and B's and graduated in the top 25 percent of my class . . . didn't even have to study that much," he chuckled. "I was elected senior class president, and I am going to Purdue this fall."

Needless to say, I was happy for him, but also somewhat shocked. I also knew the boy could be a great "bluffer" at times. After his first semester at college, I saw him again and asked how he was doing. "It's going great . . . I made the Dean's List!" Then after his first year, "Guess what? I am taking extra classes, and I will finish my degree in three years instead of four." As a former police officer

who has interrogated hundreds of people, I can usually sense if someone is telling the truth. I was certain the boy was lying.

I was correct. He had failed every subject his first semester, and during his second semester he didn't even attend classes, loafed around the campus all day, and dropped out at year's end. Of course his parents were stunned to learn what had transpired. A few years later, I discovered why this boy's reading skills were never tested . . . and how he made such good grades in high school.

The boy's father was a long-time member of the school board and a "you

help me, and I'll help you" schmoozer with the school superintendent. The kid never had a chance.

Why do I need to know this stuff about running for an election? But here I am in that position and loving every minute of running at the clerk's office."

Douglas' job as clerk was to help everyone get what they needed. "As the deputy, I needed to always be on top of anything election-related or the election for the voters would not be correct or accurate. As the clerk, if the job was not done correctly, it could have affected the judicial system within the county. If you are a person who works for the public, their needs as relates to your job should be taken seriously."

Douglas had to run for the office and in turn encouraged other citizens to run. She also supported their efforts. "It is one of the most stressful and exhausting things that a person can do, mentally. All of the information about how to run is public but some people do not know where to find this info. Some people do not know which offices at the state level are over our elections or what info they have available. It is the job of the clerk and the staff to explain where to find this out."

Douglas said the job has been the most rewarding and the most challenging at the same time. "You deal with all kinds of people with all kinds of viewpoints. You're never going to find two people, not even a husband or a wife, who are going to agree 100 percent on religion and politics. They just need to agree to disagree. People will be passionate about whatever they want. As long as they're educated about what they believe in."

Douglas admitted it was quite a change, waking up on the day after the election not being privy to the results. For the first time in 17 years, she had to turn to the internet.

Douglas is now city clerk-treasurer, a very different role that entails more on the

accounting side of government. On primary Tuesday she couldn't help showing up to help do whatever grunt work was needed.

Anyone who worked with Douglas knew her to be efficient, accessible, and transparent. The three months leading up to elections, but particularly the final days, required her to spend long hours at the clerk's office, arriving early to open voting sites and staying late to supervise counting and tallies. It's a little-known reality that Indiana legislation prohibits counting any ballots until after the polls open at 6 a.m. on voting day. All the early votes waited to be counted with ballots cast the day of the election.

Douglas ran a smooth, well-oiled machine, and she worked hard to ensure that those who wanted to cast a ballot would be able to do so. Only in 2020, a year of high voter turnout, with a number of mail-in ballots, did she work well into the night. She even had her family as well as family members of the staff come into the office to help slice open envelopes.

"I am passionate about voting in general," said Douglas. For years, she worked closely with Myra Dunn Abbott, head of Montgomery County's LWV Voter Services. Dunn Abbott and her husband have long served as stalwart powerhouses in voter outreach. For years, they helped residents register, or re-register if they'd been cleaned off the rolls, but a large number of county residents registered to vote failed to show up and cast a ballot, even though it only takes five minutes of their time, and even though they can vote early on their own schedule, or, if they qualify, from home.

"Finally, I told Myra, quit trying to register these people to vote. We got to get them to show up. They started the count sheet on the front of the courthouse where it said this is the

percentage of people who had come in."

People noticed. It gamified voting, making it a challenge to be one of the people who showed up. After decades where fewer than 50 percent of registered voters made it to the polls, in 2020, the county's turnout broke records at 69 percent.

"I'm grateful because it's a lot of work," said Douglas. "It is not one day. It's three months per election."

Often Dunn Abbott and her husband Paul came to the clerk's office early or late, obtained that day's tally and posted it on the banner outside.

Douglas has long told her daughter that one of the most important responsibilities of being an American is voting. "I have told her that it is her job to vote. Do your research and choose the best person you think to do the job. I will not tell her how to vote other than she just needs to vote. And that's all you can do. Tell other people to do their research on who they think is the best person for the job.

"We've been given this opportunity to vote. So let's go ahead and do it."

Watch for signs of human trafficking at Indy 500

As the Greatest Spectacle in Racing, the Indianapolis 500 is unparalleled as an international sporting event. Unfortunately, large events are known to create increased demand for trafficked individuals providing manual labor, sex for hire and other services. Attorney General Todd Rokita asks Hoosiers to know the signs, stay alert and report any suspicion to law enforcement.

"Spectator events of such grand scale are ripe for human traffickers looking for opportunities to carry out their heinous crimes," Rokita said. "As we excitedly participate in the greatest spectacle in racing, we need to keep our eyes and ears open for human trafficking as well. By reporting suspicions to local law enforcement, we can help authorities nab these predators and save victims."

Following are signs that someone might be a victim of trafficking:

1. They appear submissive or fearful.
2. They are prohibited from speaking alone to strangers.
3. They give answers that appear to be scripted or rehearsed.
4. They show signs of physical abuse.

"Human traffickers can prey on anyone, regardless of their age, race or background," Rokita said. "It's up to all of us to play a role in shutting down this devastating criminal enterprise."

People in certain job roles — such as medical professionals, restaurant workers, and hotel employees — are particularly likely to come into contact with trafficking victims.

If you have suspicions that someone is being trafficked, call local law enforcement immediately. You may also report suspicions to the National Human Trafficking Hotline at 1-888-373-7888.

In addition to raising awareness, Attorney General Rokita and his team are engaged in other efforts to combat human trafficking.

The Office of the Attorney General operates the Address Confidentiality Program, which helps protect victims of certain crimes — including those who have been trafficked — by concealing their residential address from the public and thereby their victimizers. Learn more about the program at the Attorney General's website.

In February, Rokita announced all K-5 students in Indiana would receive a child ID kit in 2024 — free of charge to Indiana families. Child ID kits give parents a tool to provide detailed information, a photograph, fingerprint, and DNA to law enforcement quickly. Completed kits are kept in a safe place at home, out of a database, so parents are prepared if the unthinkable happens. Kits will be distributed by superintendents and school resource officers to students this fall.

As it happens, this year the Indianapolis 500 race weekend coincides with National Missing Children's Day, which is May 25. The day is intended to encourage parents, guardians and communities to make child safety a priority — and as a reminder to continue our efforts to reunite missing children with their families.

AG Shares List of Products Recalled in April

Attorney General Todd Rokita is alerting Hoosiers of important consumer protection concerns for products recalled in April. The office encourages consumers to take advantage of opportunities available for those who purchase recalled items that could be harmful to their families.

“Keeping children and Hoosiers safe is my top priority,” Attorney General Rokita said. “If you have one of the recalled products, stop using it immediately and pursue resolution from the manufacturer. If you have difficulty finding a solution for your recalled product, call my office immediately.”

According to the Consumer Product Safety Commission, the following consumer products were recalled in April:

2024 Genesis GV60 Electric Crossover Brings Unexpected Freedoms – Despite Limited Range and A Lofty Sticker

It seems when we talk about electric vehicles, it’s mostly a conversation about limiting freedoms.

But I don’t see it that way. EVs can be about enhancing freedom of design, freedom of performance and freedom from fossils. By completely changing technology, Genesis was able to completely change what we appreciate in compact luxury crossovers. Unfortunately, freedom from charging stations isn’t unlimited.

Going electric puts batteries beneath the floor, and without an engine to stuff under a hood, designers have more freedom. There’s a lot of Porsche in the car’s curvy hood, arching roofline, and wrap-around taillamps, but also a lot of Genesis in the twin swaths of LED lights, unnecessary grille, and large winged logos. I especially like how the lower body appears to fold over the rocker panel and the rear glass tabs around to the sides. Accentuated fenders cosset 21” wheels.

When the car was delivered, the driver asked if I needed help setting up the facial recognition and fingerprint systems. I said, “The what?” Yep, there’s a camera in the door pillar and sensor on the starter that allows owners to enter and start the vehicle without keys. He should also have mentioned how the car can back into a garage while its owner stands outside with the key fob. That’s only a first impression.

Designers clearly took the freedom to create a modern clubroom with wide flat floors, high arching ceilings, and carnal luxuries. Twin 12.3-inch screens for gauges and infotainment get the attention, but look closer to see the high console with the rotating orb gear selector, infotainment joywheel, and deep storage. It feels sumptuous with Nappa leather seats, aluminum trim, and sueded headliner. Just settle in and drink up the Bang & Olufsen audio system.

Going further, devices are easily connected through Apple CarPlay, Android Auto, and wireless console

charging while seasons are tamed by heated/ventilated front seats, heated rear seats, and a heated steering wheel. Luggage is swallowed by a foot-operated power hatch and split-fold rear seats. And, if safety is a concern, check the head-up display, adaptive cruise, and lane tracing to relive drivers while automatic emergency braking, blind spot avoidance, and lane keep assist amp active safety. Safe Exit Assist prevents passengers from stepping into traffic.

Beyond a way too brief 235 miles range, the electric powertrain provides lots of freedom for quick acceleration (0-60 mph in 4 seconds), fast charging (10-80% in 18 minutes), and cleat traction (all-wheel-drive). Fully charge in about 7 hours on 240v home or commercial chargers, but you’ll wait 68 hours using a wall socket. Buy a charger!

Beyond quick recharge, the GV60 is a delight to drive with 429 horsepower and 516 lb.-ft. of torque

underfoot. Step down for instantaneous response. You may not need that to get the kids to school, but don’t you want it? Heavy batteries sit low in the chassis and work with the electronic suspension for both a heavy driving feel on the highway and quick reflexes when requested. Just don’t expect a super smooth ride. Click drive modes for Eco, Comfort, and Sport to conserve or consume electrons.

Engineers need to dig deeper to find a bit more driving range, something approaching 300 miles, but the rest of the GV60 mostly exhibits the best of what happens when designers and engineers are set free to reimagine the luxury crossover. Given all it offers for a base price of \$52,000, or \$71,320 as-tested, it compares favorably to the Volvo XC40 Recharge, Mercedes-Benz EQB, Lexus RZ450e, and upcoming Cadillac OPTIQ.

MONTGOMERY COUNTY PLAN COMMISSION MINUTES

The Montgomery County Plan Commission met on Wednesday April 24, 2024. Those members present were Jordan Burkett, Randy Denhart, Tom Cummins, John Frey, Steve Loy and Steve Canfield. Staff present were Marc Bonwell, Tyler Nichols and Don Orr.

The meeting was called to order at 4:00 PM. Steve Canfield made a motion to approve the February 28, 2024 meeting minutes. The motion was seconded by Steve Loy. Motion carried 6-0.

Marc Bonwell introduced the proposed Comprehensive Plan Update. The Comprehensive Plan acts as the guiding document for decisions related to growth and development. The Plan identifies five focus areas for the plan. Including business retention/expansion, business attraction, talent attraction/development, community marketing/messaging and community development/economic growth. The plan embraces smart growth principles to ensure sustainable development, focusing on efficient land use, development around existing infrastructure, transportation connectivity and technological integration. It also recognizes the importance of preserving the County’s agricultural heritage and natural landscapes. A unique aspect of the update is the integration of health and wellness into the plan which reflect a proactive and community-centric approach to building a healthier and more resilient future.

Alaina Shonkwiler of KSM gave a slide presentation.

The public hearing was opened at 4:16 PM.

John Smillie, 1014 W Main St., Crawfordsville – Spoke on behalf of the local League of Women Voters and himself. They object to solar energy generation being listed as undesirable development.

Toni Woodall, 2975 W 950 S – Stated she had questions regarding the data sets used in the comprehensive plan.

Nancy Grimes, 8865 S 200 E – Asked the Board to make sure they consider the previous discussions regarding windmills and solar energy and still protect the farmlands.

Helen Hudson, 170 W 150 S – Had several general comments.

Brent Sillery, 8611 S 200 E – Stated he is pro agriculture and against hazardous solar panels on ag-related ground.

Kathy Watkins, 10756 N 575 E – Had general comments.

There being no further public input, the public hearing was closed at 4:31 PM.

After a few comments by the Plan Commission members, Steve Loy made a motion to approve the Comprehensive Plan. Randy Denhart seconded the motion. Motion approved 6-0.

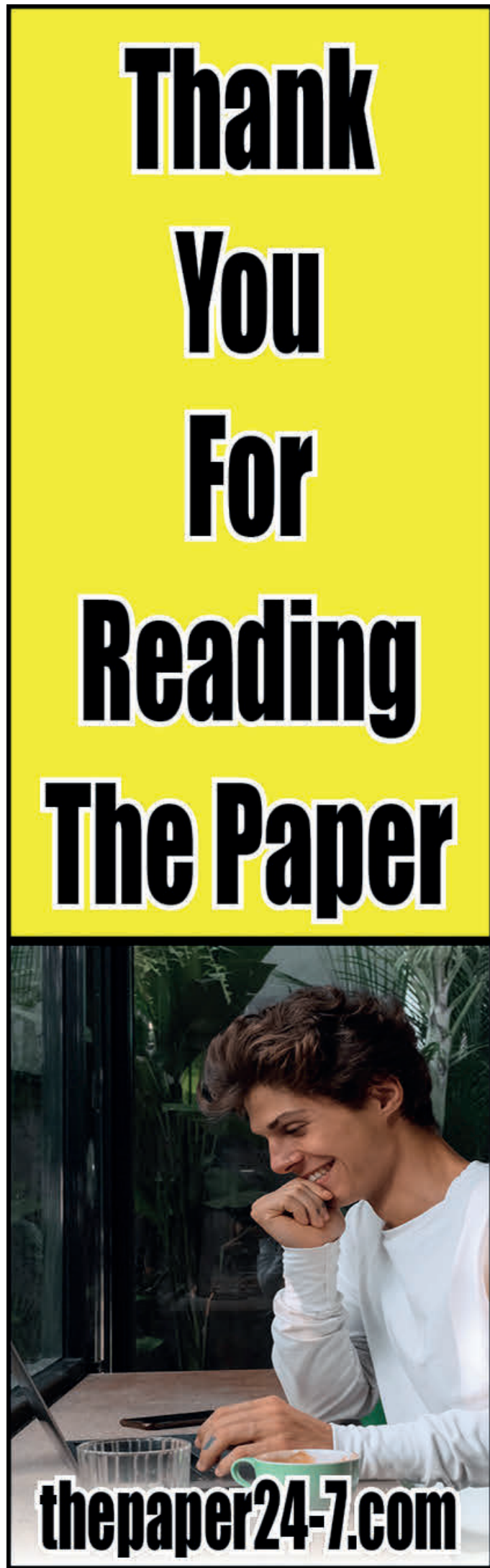
