Dear Rusty:

ASK

My wife and I are going to be taking Social Security at 62. She will be 62 on April 15, 2025. I will be 62 August 7, 2025. When should we apply for Social Security? Signed: Ready to file

Dear Ready:

Social Security recommends you apply for benefits about 2 - 3 months prior to when you want your benefits to start (to get them time to process your application). You will specify on your application when you wish your benefit to start, so applying early isn't a problem. Just a few things to keep in mind:

Your first month of eligibility will be the first month you are 62 for the entire month. In your wife's case, her first month of eligibility will be May 2025, and in your case your first month of eligibility will be September 2025. Your wife's benefits will be paid on the 3rd Wednesday of every month, and your benefits will be received on the 2nd Wednesday of every month (payment

dates depend on when your birthday falls).

Social Security has an earnings test for those collecting early benefits (before your full retirement age). If you are working and exceed the earnings limit, SS will take away some of your benefits. The earning limit for 2024 is \$22,320 and, if that is exceeded, SS will take away \$1 in benefit for every \$2 you are over the limit (the limit changes annually, so the 2025 limit will be more). Thus, if you plan to work after collecting, you must stay aware of the earning test. If you earn substantially more than the earnings limit, you even may be temporarily ineligible to collect benefits (until you either earn less or reach your full retirement age (FRA) when the earning test no longer applies).

Did You Know About Massive Medical Record Theft?

In the wake of a massive and under-reported cyberattack, Indiana Attorney General Todd Rokita is warning Hoosiers about the steps they can take to prevent the potential theft of their personal health care information.

Rokita said that for months, the nation's largest electronic data clearinghouse, ChangeHealthcare / UnitedHealth, failed to inform the likely 110 million affected Americans about the potential theft of their health insurance records, banking information, Social Security numbers, and medical records that are typically kept confidential between doctors and

You Should Know

- Attorney General Todd Rokita and Iowa Attorney General Brenna Bird are co-leading a 22-state letter calling on Congress to pass the Safeguard American Voter Eligibility Act. The bill would strengthen our electoral process by upholding the rule of law and prohibit individuals who are ineligible to vote like illegal aliens from doing so. Under the act, individuals must provide proof of citizenship when registering to vote. It also will help states identify and remove illegal aliens from their voter registration rolls.
- The cone zone will create temporary lane closures on I-74 westbound near Brownsburg, beginning this evening. According to INDOT, crews will reduce westbound I-74 to one lane between the westbound entrance ramp at Ronald Reagan Parkway to just east of the 56th Street (C.R. 600 N) underpass. 

State Rep. Jeff Thompson (R-Lizton) will serve as chair of the Budget Committee, Interim Study Committee on Fiscal Policy, Interim Study Committee on Pension Management Oversight, and the State and Local Tax Review Task Force. patients. Rokita's Data Privacy and ID Theft team is urging Indiana residents to be on the lookout for strange changes to their health plan statements and billing information, and to take advantage of Change Healthcare offering free credit monitoring and ID theft protection services. To enroll in credit monitoring through IDX, call 1-888-846-4705.

"The protection of your private medical records and personal health care information is of utmost importance to our office, and you have the right to request a credit freeze and numerous other preventative ID theft services - free of charge - from this irresponsible health care handler," Attorney General Rokita said.

Change Healthcare processes 15 billion health care transactions each year, and the company reported one-in-three Americans may be affected by this latest BlackCat ransomware attack. The attack itself enabled the shady hacker group to obtain millions and millions of private medical records stored by Change Healthcare.

"Our office will continue to pressure companies like Change Healthcare to hold Hoosiers' data privacy at the highest standards -- and know that we will hold all health care operators accountable for any and all breaches."

Timeline of Attacks &

Companies like UnitedHealth are legally required to report all data breaches involving protected health information (PHI) to the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services. But Rokita's office reiterates that the depth and scope of the breaches are still unknown - so even if you don't think you're affected - it can't hurt to take proactive steps to protect yourself.

Consumers should be aware of potential warning signs that someone is using their medical information. The signs include:

- A bill from their doctor for services they did not receive;
- Errors in their Explanation of Benefits statement like services they never received or prescription medications they do not take;
- A call from a debt collector about a medical debt they do not owe;
- Medical debt collection notices on their credit report that they do not recognize;
- A notice from their health insurance company indicating they have reached their benefit limit; or
- They are denied insurance coverage because their medical records show a pre-existing condition they do not have.

If consumers are concerned that their data may have been impacted but prefer not to use the free

Although Don was the last born he passed away three years prior to his brother on 29 November 1993.He worked at a Farmer's **Produce Association** for Amos Hayes at his WWII registration. Later, he was supervisor on the county highway and sadly passed with throat cancer. Know he was father of at least two sons. Think the twins took after their hard-working dad as he was the water engineer at the light plant for many years as well as maintenance foreman at MidStates.

Sadly, our sweet lady passed away of breast cancer after having been ill two years and very sick for five weeks - 18 March 1960 - lacking just two months of being 65 years old. Raymond had left his Lyda three years prior at only 62. They were buried in Oak Hill South or in other words, the Masonic Cemetery in Crawfordsville.

Change Healthcare's Failure to Notify Patients

The company has stated that affected individuals may begin receiving notification letters in the mail in late July, but Change Healthcare first became aware of the so-called Blackcat ransomware cyberattacks all the way back on February 21, 2024.

The ransomware attackers themselves have publicly claimed that patient data was being stolen well before the February 21 date – but millions of patients have not been individually notified in any way that their information has likely been stolen by the hacker group. resources provided by Change Healthcare, they can also consider freezing their credit.

Individuals will have to freeze their credit with each bureau: Experian, Equifax and TransUnion.

Safe Disposal of **Chemicals and Pesticides**

Sometimes some weeds are too hard to kill without some chemical help, and that is OK! Using pesticides can be scary to use for some, and they only get used sparingly. It is pretty common to only buy enough to kill that one patch of poison ivy or Canada thistle, etc. and never using it again until the pesky weed shows up again.

But it is important to know that pesticides have limited shelf life, usually, none retain the marketed efficacy past three years in storage, especially if opened. If you have any insecticides, herbicides, fungicides, and bactericides that are older than three years old, it is time to safely discard of them. If you have any open containers of pesticides that are older than two years, it is time to discard those as well. The Office of Indiana State Chemist is the regulating body for pesticide use in Indiana and every year they host regional sites for homeowners, schools, golf courses, coops, and businesses to safely dispose of chemicals and pesticides. If you do not have the label for the product or it is not in its original container you can still take those items to the clean sweep sites to safely discard. I have heard of some crazy things that get dropped off at these events, like dicamba in a pop bottle.

The closest Clean Sweep

sites this year are on August 22, 2024, at the Hendricks County Fairgrounds (1900 E. Main St. Danville, IN 46122) OR August 15, 2024, at Becks Foundation Seed Facility (6159 West 550 North Sharpsville, Indiana 46068)

To participate with Clean Sweep, you must fill out the "Clean Sweep Pesticide Disposal Participant Form" to the best of your abilities. The form can be found on our county website or the OISC website.

The first 250 pounds of pesticides are free to drop off. Mail, fax or email the completed form to Nathan Davis at 765-494-4331 or cleansweep@groups.pur due.edu no later than Fri., August 9, 2024. Questions may be directed to Nathan at 765-494-7108. Then bring your leak-free and safe-to-transport containers to the collection site. DO NOT mix materials.
