- Attorney General Todd Rokita has issued civil investigative demands to the Seymour and South Bend police departments seeking information on whether their immigration policies comply with state law. Rokita's office is asking for information regarding both police departments' immigration-related communications, cooperation and enforcement policies. Rokita is also suing the Monroe County Sheriff's Department for its refusal to rescind what he calls unlawful immigration policies. He recently sent demand letters to officials in Lake and St. Joseph counties warning them of impending legal action if they fail to come into compliance with



It Was Late for Corn A Very Bad Oxidant

Because their house is located so

deep in the woods, my mother has had no luck getting vegetables to grow. When my parents heard there were garden plots available in town, they signed up for one, and have had a garden in town for several years.

The rhubarb was already up when they were told there was a garden plot next to theirs that was not being used.

"Use it!" the manager of the community garden told them. I'm not sure where the idea came from, but my dad decided to plant corn.

It was late for corn, that far north. But my dad got three different kinds of seeds, and he soaked them overnight to give them a head start, and when I was visiting last spring, we stuck them in the ground and hoped for the best.

My mom sent a photo mid-summer. "The corn is up!" she wrote, with a photo of the little green stalks in three neat rows.

"How's the corn?" I'd ask when I called.

"It's coming, but we still don't have any cobs ready."

The stalks grew tall, and they tassled out, and there were ears clinging to the stalks. A raccoon or similar invader knocked a cob off the stalk and my dad peeled it open. "Still not ready to eat," he reported.

I visited this past weekend and, late in September, the weather was still warm, although the days were shorter, that far north. I took the garden hose at the community garden and gave the corn a good watering, and I wondered if my parents would get any corn to eat.

While I had the hose out, I also watered the

rhubarb. My mother told me that folks said harvesting rhubarb late in the season prevented a good crop from being produced in the spring. But I could tell my mother was skeptical. She has been growing rhubarb almost all her life and knows a thing or two about rhubarb by now. She had given the last of her rhubarb to a friend and wanted to make one last batch of sauce, so we pulled out a pile of big, healthy stems, late in September, and brought them home. "I don't think it hurts them a bit!" my mother

But the corn was not yet

There was still corn at the corn stand. The farmers know what they're doing, planting the corn very early and very late and keeping the sweet corn season going as long as possible. It made me hopeful that those cobs, even if they were a little small, might turn into something edible before the first

On this last visit to the garden, I saw that most of the gardeners have packed up for the summer. They had pulled out the last of the beans and tomatoes and raked out their beds. They had piled cow manure on the top of their beds and taken off for Florida or Arizona. One of them was there while I was watering the corn.

"See you next year!" he told my parents.

My parents are still watering the corn. And I'm glad we planted it, no matter what happens.

Maybe nothing will come of it. Probably nothing will. But planting late corn has given us something to hope for It's like rooting for a losing team. It's like starting a new dream late in life. I admire my parents for planting corn after the rhubarb was up and hoping for the best.



2025 Genesis GV80 3.5T is the Luxury Crossover with a Touch of British Flair





WILLIAMS luxury

Many of us would love to drive a Bentley Bentayga Auto Reviews Crossover, but virtually

none of us will ever rise to a station in life to afford one. Its big mesh grille, gleaming headlamps, chiseled bodysides, and giant wheels convey a sense of presence and potential. While I completely get it is no Bentley, the 2025 Genesis GV80 has just a touch of that panache to make you feel and look special.

And, it is clearly a Genesis with its large chrome mesh grille flanked by more chrome and four strands of tiny LED headlamps. The side view presents a strong shoulderline, gently sloping roof, a sweep of chrome to break up the lower bodysides, and upturned rear window all planted over 22"



wheels. Faux front fender vents hint at The Old World, but are not the best work of Genesis' talented designers. A wide concave plaque across the foot-operated hatch connects the GV80 to other Genesis models with thin lighting elements and GENESIS

spelled in chrome.

Get inside. You may first notice the 22" OLED dash screen, but your eyes will soon acknowledge diamondstitched Nappa leather seats, matte finish wood, and microfiber headliner...just like a Bentley. But, you might also enjoy Bang & Olufsen audio, panoramic sunroof, heated/ventilated front seats, and tri-zone automatic climate control. Even the steering wheel and front armrests are heated. Rear seats power adjust too. Wireless Apple CarPlay, Android Auto,

keep devices connected.It all works well, though it's easy to confuse the gear selector with the infotainment controller - nothing like putting your car into satellite radio instead of reverse.

Check the safety list and you may suspect some latent Swedish heritage. A head-up display seemingly hovers over the hood to keep speed, navigation, and safety status in eyesight, but there's also adaptive cruise, automatic emergency braking, lane keep assist, and rear cross path detection with braking. Add to that a digital rearview mirror, rear seat reminder, and Safe Exit Assist that keeps passengers from stepping into traffic.

There's no V-12 engine beneath the bonnet, but our GV80 runs the asphalt rapids with a 3.5-liter twin-turbo V6 engine that tickles the all-wheel-drive system



with a stout 375 horsepower and 391 lb.ft. of torque.An eightspeed automatic transmission keeps the engine in the right range to deliver wonton power wherever you request it, but it comes at the price of fuel economy: 16/22-MPG city/highway.

The Brits have never been just about surging power.Riding in a Bentley or Jaguar is about the serenity of seemingly butter smooth roads and hushed crowds beyond the vehicle's confines. In the same spirit, the GV80 is near silent inside - whether rolling up to a drive-through or slapping down miles on the Interstate. An electronic suspension and adjustable drive modes let pilots control the level of comfort or sportiness for the chassis, steering, and throttle response. Even the seat tightens its bolsters when it detects

you want to play.



The GV80 is no Bentley, but it is a very gratifying way to travel. Every part of it reeks of style, performance, and pleasure. And while it doesn't carry a sticker to match upper crust Brits, it isn't cheap either. Base models start at \$57,700, but our Prestige trim came to a loftier \$81,300. At that, competitors include the

BMW X5, Mercedes-Benz GLE, Audi Q5, Lincoln Nautilus, and if you want to go all-electric, the Cadillac Lyriq.

Oct. 8 marked the final clean up for the Nicholson Grade School vegetable and flower garden.

The second and third grade students actively participated again this year with the planting of their garden in May; and after dismissal for summer break ... there was the Summer Garden Club where students continued planting, and learning how to care and maintain their garden. Harvesting in July and August had the students picking the ripened produce to take home and also share with the local Fish Food

This season kohlrabi was introduced and most everyone was anxious to give it a taste. Also new to the garden this year were the wax beans that were planted in one of the raised beds. These beans were great performers and we found how delicious they were when cooked along with the ever productive green beans.

With the support of the Master Gardeners of Montgomery County, the volunteers teach the students how to plant different vegetables, care for them once they sprout; when to harvest them; and then how to save seeds for next year's garden.

Students learned how the weather is a major factor with regard to the success of a garden, how to water properly and to keep the weeds

This was a very unusual season with a very wet start and ending with drought conditions,

making the harvest only half as good as last year a total of 547 pounds of vegetables were harvested out of the garden.

Sprinkled into this season were many wonderful moments with the students; like making garden crafts, taking home bouquets of zinnias, digging for potatoes, lamenting at the chipmunks raiding the sunflower bed; and receiving award certificates for their participation.

Every year is special and very rewarding to see the excitement and interest from the students as well as the parents for the "Growing Together" project ... and know that the Master Gardener volunteers always come away with a bigger "harvest" than just vegetables.


The seasons may change but the need for blood donors stavs the same. Give blood or platelets and make a big


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
