

I remember the times when most of my clothes were hand-me-downs from older cousins. My folks bought me one pair of tennis shoes and one pair of jeans each fall before school began. I also recall that Mom often had to "stretch" the food for our

construction on our building began in the early spring, before my husband, Peter, and I returned from Mexico. When we arrived, scaffolding had been set up all around the building and blue plastic had been taped over our windows to protect them from flying debris. Funny Bone Farrell, a

former professor of mathematics at Butler University and creator of what is considered by many to be the greatest crossword puzzle ever, didn't know either, so he hedged his bet.

Jerry passed away in 2022, but he left behind what Hoosier Will Shortz called his favorite crossword puzzle of all time. This is quite a compliment from a man who edited and created thousands of these brain teasers.

The puzzle appeared in the New York Times on election day in November of 1996, the day of the Bob Dole and Bill Clinton presidential match-up.

Professor Farrell, an accomplished puzzle solver and creator, had done more than a few Sunday puzzles for The Gray Lady (The New York Times' nickname) and dozens of other publications. All Times' puzzles are carefully edited and scrutinized; and certain rules, both written and unwritten, must be followed.

That's why Jerry's entry caused quite a stir. One of the clues (39 across) read: Lead story in tomorrow's newspaper. It was a prediction of who would win. The uproar came from both Democrats and Republicans. It seemed like intentional bias, whoever they picked.

BOBDOLE or CLINTON. Note that both answers had seven letters. But how could they both work? That's where Jerry's genius was evident, as former colleague Professor Lacey Echols told me, "He was brilliant and always festering with ideas."

The puzzle had two correct ways of being solved. "BobDole elected" and "Clinton elected." All the down clues were designed so that two different solutions would work. Shortz called it an "amazing feat, possibly the most creative crossword ever."

Here are the clues:

39 Down: Black Halloween animal (Could be Cat or Bat)

40 Down: French word (Lui or Oui)

41 Down: Provider of support (IRA or Bra, and that's my favorite)

23 Down: Sewing shop purchase (Yarn or Yard)

27 Down: Short writings (Bits or Bios)

35 Down: Trumpet

(Boast or Blast) 42 Down: Much debated

Most people who did the puzzle did not realize there were alternative answers that could spell BOBDOLE\_ELECTED or CLINTON\_ELECTED. As noted, many complained that this was an inappropriate clue, showing favoritism by the puzzle creator and The Times.

I created something similar with DTRUMP and HARRIS. Here's what I came up with.

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# **Montgomery Medicine: Norovirus**

This term, however, can be misleading. Unlike the seasonal flu that affects the respiratory system, the stomach flu, also known as viral gastroenteritis, impacts the digestive system. It's important to know that the flu shot only prevents respiratory influenza and doesn't protect against viruses that cause stomach

Norovirus, the leading cause of viral gastroenteritis in the United States, is responsible for about 21 million cases annually, resulting in roughly 70,000 hospitalizations and around 800 deaths each year. Norovirus got its name from a 1968 outbreak at a school in Norwalk, Ohio, where it was first identified. The virus is remarkably hardy, able to withstand freezing temperatures, heat up to 140°F, and even resist low levels of chlorine in drinking water. This resilience makes it difficult to eliminate with standard sanitation, and noroviruses can even survive steaming, which is why they sometimes persist in foods like shellfish if not properly prepared.

Norovirus infection often comes on suddenly, with symptoms that include nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, and stomach pain or cramps. Diarrhea tends to be especially severe in children, and the resulting dehydration can be dangerous, particularly for the young and elderly. It's crucial to watch for dehydration signs such as dry mouth, dizziness, and reduced urination in those affected.

Norovirus spreads quickly and easily, especially in crowded places like schools, daycares, nursing homes, cruise ships, and hospitals. When an infected person vomits

or has diarrhea, billions of virus particles are released, and swallowing even a small number-as few as 100 particles—can cause infection. The virus is transmitted by direct contact with vomit or stool from an infected person, by touching contaminated surfaces such as doorknobs, toys, or utensils, and by eating contaminated food or drinking contaminated water. Shellfish, in particular, are a common source. Additionally, infected individuals who handle or prepare food can spread the virus to others, leading to outbreaks in places

like restaurants, school

cafeterias, and at

catered events.

Symptoms typically start 24 to 48 hours after exposure to the virus. Although most people are sick for only one to two days, norovirus can remain in the body for much longer. An infected person can be contagious from the moment they start feeling sick until at least three days after symptoms subside, and in some cases, they may remain contagious for up to two weeks after recovery. For this reason, children who have been ill should stay home from school for at least three days after symptoms improve, and anyone who prepares food should avoid working during this period as

There is no specific treatment for norovirus, but symptoms can be managed. The primary focus is to prevent dehydration. Drinking water is usually sufficient, but if the illness persists beyond a day, an oral rehydration solution like Pedialyte® may be helpful. A simple homemade solution can be made by mixing two teaspoons of salt and eight teaspoons of sugar into a two-liter bottle of water. Drinking small sips frequently is recommended over

gulping large amounts at once. Fever can be managed with medications like acetaminophen or ibuprofen, but it's always best to consult a healthcare provider, especially when treating children, the elderly, or if symptoms are severe.

Preventing the

spread of norovirus mainly involves practicing good hygiene. Regular handwashing with soap and warm water for at least 20 seconds is essential, especially after using the restroom, changing diapers, and before preparing food. If someone in your home is infected, surfaces should be disinfected with a bleach solution made by mixing one part bleach with nine parts water; allow the solution to sit for 10-20 minutes before wiping. Clothing or linens soiled by vomit or stool should be washed in hot water on the longest cycle and then dried in a dryer. Proper food handling is also important: wash fruits and vegetables thoroughly before eating or cooking, and ensure shellfish is

from norovirus on their own. However, it's essential to seek medical advice if you notice signs of dehydration, such as dry mouth, dizziness, or reduced urination, or if the affected person seems unusually fatigued or has severe abdominal pain. Dehydration can be serious, especially in young children and older adults. While norovirus is unpleasant, understanding how it spreads and taking simple hygiene precautions can help reduce the chances of catching or spreading the virus.

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

Whether you call it "MX-5" or "Miata", and either is fine, you know what it is: A classically inspired roadster with the reliability and efficiency of a Japanese compact. But, this generation's more aggressive styling gives off vibes that are more MX-5 and less Miata.

Classic long hood, short deck proportions remain, but this Miata

looks to be harboring some anger issues behind its squinty adaptive LED headlamps. The hood's a little swoopier, fenders wrap more sensuously around 17" wheels, and the voluptuous rear ports inset round taillamps. It's still friendly, beautiful, sexy, but also a little bit mischievous. I specially enjoy it in Aero Gray

Once you fold yourself inside, our Grand Touring edition makes you feel special. Tan Nappa leather seats with cross-stitching, Frenchstitched dashboard, and body color door tops that simulate sheetmetal are pretty fancy – as are automatic climate control, Bose audio with headrest speakers, and heated seats. Safety tech includes blind spot, lane departure warning, and rear cross traffic alert

There's nothing better

than looking beyond the classic analog gauges, out over the flared fenders, with hands grasping the perfectlysized leather-wrapped steering wheel. Mazda's decrepit joywheel infotainment controller remains, but you can also touch the dash-top screen for commands. Unlike many modern sports cars you wear like a scarf, the Miata's low beltline still welcomes a relaxed arm. Given the tiny trunk, though, I'd pack a couple of duffels and little more.

Going for a drive brings my favorite part of the Miata: Its manually folding top. You don't even have to get out of the driver's seat to deploy it - any stop light will do. Flip the one header latch, toss it over your head, and hear it click. The top forms its own flush tonneau. Easy

You can get the Miata with an automatic transmission, but I'd



lose a lot of respect for you if that's what you chose because the sixspeed manual is one of the most enjoyable click-click snick-snicks in the business. A light clutch is engaging during on backroad stress relief runs, but won't wear you out in traffic.

So, put down the pumpkin spice café, click the stick, and rev out your aggression. Miata won't mind.

The 2.0-liter DOHC fourcylinder engine whizzes out 181 horsepower and 151 lb.-ft. of torque. It has plenty of power for a lightweight sports car, but you'll have to work to get it to the rear wheels. Fuel economy is rated a frugal 26/34-MPG city/highway, so feel free to grab another latte and take another

That's when you'll understand what's been the fuss over Miatas for the past 35 years. They aren't Corvettes; ripping

racetracks isn't the point. They're about feeling the car around you, the tight steering, delightful gauges, and feeling at one with an automobile. And, if that's what you need to relive a little stress, then you deserve it.

You know what makes this dream even better? The Miata is no more expensive than a sporty Japanese compact like the Subaru Impreza or

Honda Civic. Base models start at just \$28,985, coming to \$36,200 for our luxurious GT. Competitors include the Subaru BRZ, Toyota GR86, and BMW Z4.






